"Ram Progeny Test" Saturday, May 17

The 4th annual "Ram Progeny Test" Field Day will be held on Saturday, May 17, at the Ranch Experiment Station (sub-station 14), south of Sonora.

The morning will be spent in examining the rams and their records. The afternoon program will be highlighted by an open panel discussion, led by Dr. J. C. Miller, head of the Animal Husbandry Department, Texas A&M college. A ranch style barbecue dinner will be served by the Sutton County 4-H

This test wes designed to help take some of the guesswork out of sire selection by using the scales, ruler, and scouring vat to help support visual selection. By testing sires, breeders hope to locate outstanding rams or blood lines that are prepotent for higher profit producting characteristics. This test shows promise of doing the same thing for sheep that trap nesting has done for poultry, the Babcack test and scales have done for dairy cattle, and the race track has done for running horses.

Five different breeds are represented in this 4th test: Rambouillet, basement by women of the church Delaine, Corriedale, Columbia, and and by some of the men. Rev. Roy Suffolk. There are some 220 registered rams entered by 20 registered preeders, Texas A&M College, Bluebonnet Farm, and the Ranch test this year will closely approach 1/2 pound per head daily gain for the 224-day period, on a ration of

In addition to gaining ability, other major profit-producing characteristics closely checked are clean wool production, staple length, and

efficiency of gain. Records of previous tests show the test is producing the desired results. Each year a greater number of higher producing rams are located. These high testing rams are going back as stud sires in the breeders' flocks. Many of the lambs on test this year were sired by rams that were also tested. Many of these rams will go back to sire lambs from ewes whose

sires were tested. This Test is of great importance to commercial sheepmen, for as a result, they may soon be able to purchase higher producing range rams-rams whose sires and dams are of tested and proven blood lines.
