# Elgin Methodist Pastor Gets Local Church Job

The Rev. Doyle Morton, former missionary to Brazil, pastor of the Methodist church at Elgin, is moving to Eldorado today, succeeding the Rev. Roy Shilling, pastor here for four years, who moves to Big Lake today to become new pastor of the Big Lake church.

Lawrence Steen was the official delegate of the Eldorado Methodist church, officially representing the local congregation at the conference which closed Sunday at San An-

Rev. Morton was reared in Rotan, was graduated from High School in Stephenville, and received his college work at Stephenville and McMurry. In 1939 he received his pastor's BD degree, and in 1945 his Master's, at Perkins School of Theology, Dallas.

From 1939 to 1945 he and Mrs. Morton represented the Methodist church as missionaries in Brazil, and since their return to the States the pastor has served churches at Sabinal, Port Lavaca, and Elgin.

Mrs. Morton, the former Mary Archer, of Floresville, was graduated from North Texas State College at Denton in 1936, with a major in home economics, and in 1939 the couple were married, after she had taught several years.

The Eldorado delegation, composed of Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence Steen, Mr. and Mrs. Frank Meador, and Mrs. Ed Hill, in addition to Rev. Shilling and family, met the new pastor, and report that he comes to this city with the best of recommendations-and that he is well qualified to serve the local church as new pastor.

The Elgin Church has produced two Methodist bishops, Bishop A. Frank Smith of this area, and his prother Bishop Angie Smith, of the ahoma-New Mexico area.

The Big Lake charge represents an advancement for Rev. Shilling, as it has a membership of twice that of Eldorado's Methodist Church. The new charge will bring the pastor a larger salary also. There is a new church building and a new three-bedroom parsonage, to provide favorable working and living conditions.

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



But when articles are left on a train or bus, in a public hotel room, or even when dropped on a shop floor, under circumstances indicating that the true owner will later return to claim them, such items are not considered lost. The proper custodian to hold them for the owners return would be the proprietor or other person in charge. Remaining unclaimed, the property sometimes goes to this custodian sometimes to the finder. The distinction here appears to be whether the place it is found is private or semi-private, or a place used by the general public.




