

AUSTIN - Texas draft boards have started to tackle-or will soon tackle-the job of reopening and reconsidering the cases of some 8,000 college students to determine their eligibility for further deferment to study.

A point stressed by Brigadier General Paul L. Wakefield, state Selective Service director, is that students desiring deferments for the next academic year should make written request to their local boards as soon as possible.

"If your present deferment is up," he advised students, "and you want to get it renewed, you had better ask for such renewal. A board isn't required to hand out deferments or give consideration to them unless the individual makes

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





Italian Chicken Hunter's Style

2½ to 3½ lb frying chicken 1/2 cup olive oil or other fat

1 thinly sliced onion 8 medium tomatoes

1 clove garlic

11/2 teaspoons salt 1/4 teaspoon pepper

Cook chicken in fat until delieately browned, turning to brown evenly. Add onions and cook until transparent and golden brown. Add tomatoes, garlic, salt and pepper. Cover and simmer until chicken is tender and the tomatoes are reduced to a thick sauce, 40 to 50 binutes. Remove garlic clove before serving. Makes 4 to 5 servings.

Make Every Motion Count

College Station. — Rural home-makers and girls in Texas are finding ways of doing housework more easily and in less time. This is the result of the work simplification program sponsored by the Agricultural Extension Service. The purpose of this program is to encourage interest in management of time, energy and equipment in the home so that work may be done simpler, easier, quicker and safer.

Figures from the annual report of the Extension home management specialists show that 83,505 homemakers and 4-H members in 1951 applied work simplification methods to the improvement of their homemaking jobs. The program commenced in 1946 when the specialists held training meetings for home demonstration agents and adult leaders in counties where interest was shown. Due to increased demands, it was necessary to limit training by specialists to two counties in each Extension district.

Last year in 134 counties, 28,558 families improved housekeeping methods. 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

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
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
