Sale of Gaines Co. Oil Lease Brings \$112,000.00 Bonus To

After dickering with several major oil companies in a series of recessed meetings throughout last week, the Schleicher County Commissioners Court on Saturday closed a deal with the Sinclair Oil & Gas Co., for lease of mineral rights in Gaines county and collected a cash bonus of \$112,000.00.

The deal involved this county's one-half mineral interest in 4428 acres of school land in League 284 in Gaines. It seems that years ago Schelicher County sold this particular block of land, but in selling it, they retained one-half of the mineral rights. It was the lease of this one-half interest which brought the handsome cash bonus last week. The lease is a regular 5-year commercial lease, calling for \$1.00 per acre rental per year.

The money thus obtained will go into the Schleicher County permanent school fund, where it will be invested. The interest earned each year will be available for local school expense. Invested in safe securities at $2\frac{1}{2}\%$ interest, it is pointed out that the sum rreceived last week will earn \$2,800 per year. Also the \$1.00 per acre rental will bring this county a total of \$2214 per year.

Before last week the permanent school fund here contained about \$99,500.00—now increased to a total of \$211,500.

Schleicher County still owns about 800 acres in another league in Gaines County-having title to the land itself as well as all of the mineral rights.

According to the Texas Almanac it was the Texas constitution of 1876 which provided for the distribution of part of the public domain to various counties as a perpetual public school fund. Schleicher county was given title to a block of land in Gaines county. At one time Concho county owned a large block of land in Schleicher. Over 42 million acres of Texas public domain were distributed for school purposes down through the years ..

Full attendance of all members of the court was required at each of the recessed meetings held last week. There were two major oil companies involved in the bidding and one of the commissioners remarked "We just had to sweat it out."





Former Superintendent Dies At Age of 82

J. B. Smith, 82, former superin-tendent of the Eldorado Schools, beginning in 1905, died at his home in San Angelo Friday. Funeral services were held Saturday with burial in Fairmount.

Surviving Mr. Smith, who was onnected with the Great Southern Life Insurance Co. in San Angelo since 1925, are his wife, the former Jessie M. Kersey, a brother, J. A. Smith, of Dallas, a sister, Mrs. Dessie Dukes of Luling, three half brothers and a half sister.

He had been a teacher from the age of 18 until he entered the bus-iness world in 1925. He started teaching in a country school, and taught in Christoval, Eldorado, Ozona, and other places, going to San Angelo from Brady. He was a Shriner, a Mason, and a member of he Baptist Church.

Standardized Local School Mr. Smith's work as an educator in Schleicher County is generally recognized as of great importance. He became superintendent when the school was practically a rural school, and in his six years' stay

graded educational institution. A thorough worker, he is remembered with respect and affection by his former pupils. In 1907 he graduated his first class, and in 1909 had another group ready for graduation. Mrs. Smith taught music while the couple lived here, and was active in club work also. Mr. Smith joined the Baptist church in Eldorado in 1910. When he left this city, he took over administration of the

larger Ozona school system. The Smiths were honorary life members of Mias Amigas.



Sheep and lambs were generally steady, the kinds considered. High quality and highly finished kinds were very scarce or absent.

In seeking reasons for the recent drop of prices, the trade believes: Persistent refusal of normal demand for stockers and feeders to develop has been a tremendous factor in the slumping cattle and calf trade. However packers again pointed to sharp reductions of wholesale prices of most kinds of calf meat and reiterated their inability to work out from under the inventories even at reduced prices. Cow beef, grasser steers and boned out beef was moving sluggishly in the meat channels because of large supplies.

Good and choice fed steers and yearlings drew \$24 to \$30. Plain and medium kinds sold at \$15 to \$24, with cull yearlings \$12 to \$15. Fat cows sold from \$14.50 to \$19.50, with canners and cutters at \$10 to \$14.50. Bulls sold from \$13 to \$20. Good and choice fat calves cleared at \$21 to \$28.25, with common and medium sorts from \$15 to \$20. and culls at \$12 to \$14. Stocker calves ranged from \$18 to \$27.50 and stocker yearlings bulked at \$15 to \$26. Stocker heifers sold at \$24 down, stocker cows drew \$14 to \$20.

Fat lambs sold from \$20 to \$25 stocker and feeder lambs drew \$10 to \$19, and culls sold from \$8 to \$10. Fat yearling wethens sold from \$15 to \$19 and stocker yearling wethers sold from \$10 to \$14. Yearling ewes sold from \$17 down. Slaughter ewes sold for \$6 to \$7 and old wethers drew \$10 down. Two- and three-year-old wethers sold from \$12.50 down. Old bucks old for \$6 to \$6.50.

Hog top Monday was \$19.75 and packing sows ended the week at \$15 to \$17.





Drouth Relief Hay Now Being Received **To Benefit Stockmen**

Schleicher County has been delared a disaster area under Public Law 875 because of the continued drouth, and a program is being carried out under which farmers and ranchers may buy hay at more reasonable prices.

By Mondav morning, 92 applicaions had seen received in the local PMA office, and the first two crders for nay had already been shiped-one from Iowa and another from Illinois. A total of 1228 tons had been applied for at that time Hay is of three grades:

No. 1-Legume hay, containing at least 705 legumes, principally clover—\$36 per ton.

No. 2-Legume and grass hay mixture, containing at least 33% egumes-\$32 per ton.

No. 3-Mixed grass hay, containng no legumes-\$28 per ton. All prices are on the car at Elloardo and are the established rates which purchasers will pay at

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Soil Conservation District News

W. O. "Whip" Faull, cooperating with the Eldorado-Divide Soil Conservation District, is taking advantage of the continued drought by constructing level wide base terraces on cropland he leases 9 miles southwest of Eldorado.

Faull is constructing the level terraces with his farm tractor and disc plow. To date with the terraces nearing completion 70 man hours, 180 gallons of gasoline and 10 quants of oil have been used to construct the .8 mile of terraces.

Terrace construction with farm tractor and disc plow is not new to Faull. The construction of 2 miles of level wide base terraces. with farm tractor and disc plow was completed by Whip on the J. H. Faull farm last year.

Faull states the increased vields the first year following construction of level terraces for soil and water conservation more than pay for the cost of construction.

Robert and Jim Martin, coopera tors of the Eldorado Divide SCD. who ranch 28 miles east of Eldorado on the Rudd road, have just recently had contour lines laid out on their 76 acre field and bedded
