Candidates Face Run-Off In Second Demo. Primary

Joe L. Mays, county judge of Tom Green county, and Clyde Vinson, San Angelo attorney, face a run-off for district judge of the 51st Judicial district this Saturday in the Second Democratic Primary.

This race is the one in which local interest has been shown, the only other race on the ballot being for Place No. 1, Associate Justice of the Supreme Court. Candidates in that race are Spurgeon Bell of Harris county and Frank P. Culver of Tarrant county. Martin Dies is unopposed candidate for Congress-

In the First Primary held July 26, Mays carried Tom Green county heavily, but later returns from the outlying counties of the district cut his lead to a plurality, necessitating the run-off with Vinson as second place candidate. W. S. Leslie was the eliminated candidate.

Bonds For Mertzon Road Will Call For No Tax Rate Increase

On Saturday, September 6th—a little over two weeks from now—the tax-paying voters of Schleicher County will go to the polls in a special election and vote on bonds for the proposed new Mertzon highway.

In order to get most of the facts before the voters, the publisher has recently talked with the Commissioners, the County Judge and Clerk, and gathered the following information which is submitted for your consideration.

The bond issue will be for a total of \$75,000.00. This compares with \$50,000 voted for the Menard road in 1945, and \$40,000 voted for the west highway in 1950. The explanation for the larger bond issue this year is higher costs of labor and materials. The court members also point out that it is better to vote too much than too little. If the job costs less than \$75,000, the remaining bonds will not be issued.

Some of the things the money will be used for are: Buying land for right-of-way 100 feet wide and 20 miles in length; 40 miles of fence, calling for about 7,000 posts, 21,000 stays, besides wire, gates and some extra-heavy corner posts; also it is estimated that 8 water wells will have to be dug, calling for 8 windmills and 8 tanks and 8 troughs.

Will it increase the tax rate?

Absolutely NO say the members of the Court. The county tax rate last year was \$1.25, and the proposed rate for 1952 will also be \$1.25, as shown by the minutes of the last regular court meeting.

At the regular term of the Commissioners Court on Monday, August 11, 1952, the county tax rate for the year of 1952 was set as follows:

Our readers will notice that the Mertzon road bond (if passed) is provided for by a 5c levy-the last item in the above list. The total was kept at \$1.25 by subtracting a penny here and penny there from some of the other funds. The reason they are able to make these subtractions and still have enough money in those other funds, is because of the increase in oil

The County Clerk's minutes for the month of June shows a list of oil valuations totaling 41 MIL-LION DOLLARS-which list was approved by representatives of the various oil companies at that time. This brings the total (estimated) tax valuation of the county up to over 10 millions. That is the reason the Court will be able to handle the Mertzon road bonds at no additional raise in tax rates.

Another point brought out is this: It is now costing the county about \$2,000.00 a year to maintain the present rough caliche Mertzon road. When the state builds their new highway, we will be relieved of that maintenance expense.

Second: After the county spends \$75,000 as its part in providing the right-of-way, the State Highway Department will spend just about 5 TIMES THAT MUCH to actually build the new road-which should make it a pretty good bargain for this county.

Third: Work on the right-of-way will provide winter employment for a considerable number of people who will need work in this second year of drouth—besides giving us a paved highway to the last remaining county seat town neighboring on

It is urged that the property tax-paying voters study all the facts of the road proposition and be prepared to vote on Saturday, September 6th. A twothirds majority is necessary to pass a bond issue.

Mertzon and Irion County have already provided funds for their part of the highway in a bond issue voted over a year ago.





The cambium, which is the vital growing ensemble, and they carried white zone in a tree trunk, was killed when the kill zone girdled the trunk at any given level, and it was almost inevitable that parts of the tree above the level died.

The fungus that causes this trouble is identified as hypoxylon. Hypoxylons generally have very little real parasitic ability, but are notorious as attackers of trees and shrubs suffering the stress of severe drouth. This situation is tythe county at present.

We tend to notice these troubles only after they have inflicted considerable injury on the tree. The best way to control them, however, is by action beforehand to keep the tree so thrifty that it will resist the attacks of weak parasites.
