





3 cups pared, sliced apples

½ cup sugar 1/4 cup water

1/4 teaspoon cinnamon ½ teaspoon nutmeg, if desired 11/2 tablespoon lemon juice

Grated rind of 1 lemon. Frease baking dish. Butter bread rumbs. Place 1/3 of crumbs in ottom of dish. Add half of apples, ugar, spices, lemon juice, and rind. Repeat. Cover top with remaining third of crumbs. Cover. Bake 30 minutes in a moderate oven (375). Remove cover, bake 30 minutes onger or until apples are tender and crumbs are brown. Serve with thin cream. Serves 4.

Timely Tips \_ 1. Apples are noted for good keeping qualities, but it takes a ittle care to hold them at their best in home storage. If storing a few days to 2 weeks, keep firm apples in a cool place, 60 to 70 degrees. Keep mellow-ripe apples in the refrigerator.


