The Big Bend Country lost one coyote and three Schleicher County men cut their trip short, because of a fight-tothe-death struggle between men and beast.

An open adobe house near the weather bureau man's quarters looked like a good lodging place, so they bedded down there for the night.

At about midnight Godwin was awakened by a noise in the room, and in the dim light could make out the form of a coyote getting ready to spring on Rountree.

The resulting fracas awakened Johnson, who had been asleep on the porch, and among them the three barefoot men managed to beat the vicious animal to death-fighting in the dark because no one could find the flashlight.

Godwin, who is groggy and considerably below par as the full force of the shots is felt, says he has re-lived the scene several nights as it has come back in the form of nightmare!


