## FHA NOW OPEN FOR BIG DROUGHT LOAN PROGRAM

Applications are being taken now for the 150-million-dollar livestock emergency loan program approved two weeks ago by Congress and President Eisenhower.

That announcement was made last week by Howard C. Warner, unit supervisor, of the Farmers Home Administration office in San Angelo.

FHA personnel will begin working up the loans immediately. Secretary of Agriculture Benson's announcement of membership on the three-man committees which will administer the program is expected soon.

The committee of three is not to be confused with the already existing USDA drought relief committees which is administering the feed program. It will be the job of the new committee to pass on loan applications after the papers have been prepared by personnel of the FHA unit offices.

This new disaster credit will be extended to established producers and feeders of cattle, sheep, and goats who have a reasonable chance of working out of their difficulties but who temporarily cannot obtain the funds they need from private or cooperative credit sources.

Loans will not be made to enable a man to go into the livestock business or to carry on commercial feed lot operations.

**No Refinancing**  
Loans under the new program, as under the similar disaster program which has been in effect here more than a year, will be for feed, lease payments, property and personal taxes, necessary repairs, living expenses, and other essential uses. They will not be for refinancing of existing debts.

The smaller farm and ranch disaster loans and regular production loans will continue on the same basis as always. These are primarily loans under \$2,500. The new program covers only loans of \$2,500 or more. The regular disaster loans will be administered by county committees as always. Only the larger loans under the new program will go through the special committees appointed by Benson.

Information received by Warner indicates that committees will be set up in San Angelo, Pecos, Lubbock, Amarillo, Wichita Falls, and Edinburg. R. B. McLeish of Edinburg, new national FHA chief, said last week that if the initial number of committees proves insufficient, more will be set up.

Application blanks for the new loans will be available from the FHA office, on the third floor of the Tom Green County Courthouse. In areas of heaviest demand, banks, production credit Association, National Farm Loan Associations, as well as Production and Marketing Administration offices, will have the blanks.

The area committees will handle loans between \$2,500 and \$50,000. Any loans above the latter figure will have to be approved first by the committee, then by Secretary Benson.

The San Angelo unit of the FHA serves Concho, Crockett, Irion, Reagan, Schleicher, Sterling, Sutton, Tom Green, and Upton counties. Personnel consists of Warner; Johns W. Champion, disaster loan supervisor; and Mrs. Bessie L. Staggs, unit office clerk.

## OIL NEWS

Two new wildcat explorations have been added to the Schleicher County oil exploration program and two abandoned wildcat locations are being re-entered.

C. L. Northworthy, Jr., announced location for a 4,700-combination tool wildcat in southeast Schleicher 23 miles southeast of Eldorado. It will be drilled as No. 1-A Virgil J. Powell, 660 feet from north and 1980 feet from east lines of section 24, block A, AB&M survey. The new test is 2 1/2 miles southwest of No. 1 Powell, Canyon sand discovery.

The Superior Oil Company will drill a 5,500-foot wildcat in central east Schleicher, 24 miles east of Eldorado. It is No. 1-25 Virgil J. Powell, 660 feet from south and 1980 feet from east lines of section 25, block A, AB&M survey. It is 2 1/4 miles southwest of the recently opened Tillery (Pennsylvanian) field.

General American Oil Company filed application with the Railroad Commission of Texas requesting permission to re-enter two abandoned projects in Schleicher, both drilled by Roeco Oil Co.

General is re-entering No. 1 Thad A. Thomson Jr., 1980 feet from south and east lines of sec. 43, block A, HE&WT survey and five miles south of Eldorado. It had been spudded to 250 feet and abandoned by Roeco.

General American has also re-entered No. 1 R. M. Thompson Jr., 660 feet from north and west lines of section 70, block A, HE&WT survey. Roeco had drilled the project to a total of 7439 feet and abandoned it June 17. General American was running casing in this project this week and will deepen to 7500 feet.

Mayfair Minerals, Inc., No. 3 Jeff Harkey has been completed

to extend production in the Butler field one location west. The new oiler was finaled for a daily flowing potential of 144 barrels of 41-gravity oil through a 16/64-in. choke and from open hole at 4825-4837 feet. Tubing pressure was 120 pounds and casing pressure 400 pounds. Gas-oil ratio was 475-1. Completion was natural.

Sinclair No. 1 Hall, wildcat in Schleicher, was making hole below 6128 feet in an unidentified sand at last report.

Sinclair No. 6 McClatchey, project in the Huldale field, was being drilled below 4784 feet in shale.

Atlantic No. 1 Thomerson, project in the Toe Nail field, was bottomed at 5313 feet with 5 1/2 in. casing to be run. No drillstem tests have been taken, but operator believes the project can be completed as some sort of producer on the strength of shows found in the Strawn drilling samples.

Texas Crude No. 1 Daughdrill, Schleicher wildcat, was making hole below 5615 feet in lime and shale.

Humble No. 5 Brooks in the Huldale field, was being drilled below 2120 feet in shale.

Skelly No. 7 Davis, another Huldale project, was making hole below 4019 feet in shale and lime. Warren No. 1 Powell, Schleicher wildcat, was cleaning out at 3592 feet after shooting open hole from 3596 to 3616 feet. As soon as hole is cleaned out, operator will continue testing at this indicated new field discovery. No recent gauges have been reported.

Plymouth No. 4 Thomerson, Toe Nail field project, was drilling below 5352 feet in lime and shale. Marsh No. 1 Willoughby, in the western part of the county, was making hole below 9437 feet in lime and shale.

Marsh No. 1 Davis, another fillcat test, was making hole below 6617 feet in lime and shale.

## BEST VARIETIES FOR PLANTING URGED BY AGENT

For farmers who are thinking about planting grain sorghums this late, that will escape frost damage, should consider these varieties listed 1-2-3-4-5, etc.

No. 1 choice for Schleicher County is the double dwarf yellow sooner and double dwarf white sooner which will mature quicker and are more sensitive to the length of day. As the days become shorter these varieties have a tendency to mature quicker than normally.

Early hegari is also early maturing and sensitive to length of day is my third recommendation and it also would be a good variety to plant for bundle feed or hay. Early hegari will be the most popular with most producers.

Fourth choice would be combine 7078 as it is fairly early maturing and sensitive to length of day also. Fifth recommendation, and these are recommended for late planting, are redbine-60 and combine kafir-60.

In general, most crops require a longer period of time for maturing when the weather begins to cool and the same is true for many varieties of sorghum. Thus, the Sooners would be an easy first choice for grain and early egari an easy first choice for roughage.

Your local seed dealers will know sources of seed for these varieties.

## TWO FIREMEN ATTEND A & M TRAINING SCHOOL

Five crowded days of instruction which Fire Chief Palmer West and Training Instructor Robert McWhorter received at the A. and M. course last week will cut the fire insurance key rate here three percent. In addition the men received a great deal of information on fire fighting and safety precautions which they hope to pass on to fellow firemen and the general public.

They went to A and M on Sunday and returned home last Saturday, allowing them five full days for the complete course of instruction. They brought home two pictures in which they appeared, one a picture of the entire group, including most of the 1000 who were present, and the other showing hose advancement—(this gives a good view of Palmer but Bob had gone up a ladder with a hose and had climbed out of the picture.)

Attending the 24 sessions were representatives of 29 states, and 369 towns. Also present was a representative from the Panama Canal zone and another from Nepal, India.

The men stayed together on their courses, taking instruction in combined operations, advancing hose, brush and grass fire fighting, hose loads, pump up, ladders, hose evolutions, and public relations. There was a rest period of ten minutes after each 50 minutes of instruction.

As an example of the type of work they did, the Chief explains that they actually set a transport on fire, by throwing gasoline on the tank and lighting a match, then advanced under instruction and put out the blaze. This was repeated with a burning car from which they rescued a dummy man, using wet water (water in which detergent has been dissolved) to put out the blaze.

Other practical demonstrations included putting out fires in oil pit, refinery, Christmas tree, Butane tank, brush and grass, five room house, magnesium, rubber and other substances.

They learned new methods of working through a curtain of water, and expect to start educating the public on this method this year.

The Eldorado Volunteer Fire Department will attend sessions of the Hill Country Firemen's Association the second Tuesday in August at Eden. It is understood that all of the fire boys will attend.

West and others are preparing information on the Tri-county fire fighting set-up for presentation at this meeting.

Fire Chief West has been honored by being given life membership in the Association.

Clarence Warren, assistant coach will attend the Texas coaching school to be held in Houston from August 3-7. Approximately 3,000 coaches are expected to attend this school. Interpretations of rules, fundamentals of the games of football and basketball will be stressed. This school will be climaxed by the all-star football and basketball games on August 6 and 7. Coach McAllister will be unable to attend the coaching school as he will not be released from the armed services until August 21 and plans to be in Eldorado around August 23.

Fall football practice will not start until September 1 according to a letter recently received from Dr. Rhea Williams, athletic director Interscholastic League.

At this time the Eldorado school faculty is complete with the exception of a commercial teacher which position will be filled at the next regular board meeting.

**PMA Elections Are Important To Farmer**

"To PMA county and community committeemen to be elected in August by Texas farmers participating in PMA programs, will fall the important duty of determining farm acreage allotments on any crops for which allotments are in effect in 1954," said State PMA Chairman Claude K. McCan this week.

Secretary Benson has already set in motion the preliminary work necessary in preparation for possible acreage allotments and marketing quota programs on 1954 crops of wheat and cotton if such controls should be required for these crops.

Urging all farmers concerned in PMA programs to get out and vote, Chairman McCan said, "Establishment and supervision of farm acreage allotments when they are in effect is not the only duty of PMA committeemen. Price support loan programs and purchase agreements are locally under their direction. Storage facility loans available to farmers needing additional storage space for grains and seeds on their farm must be approved by the county committee. These loans are intended to supplement regular means of credit to increase grain storage capacity.

Local administration of crop insurance, with the exception of loss adjustment, is another program under supervision of county committeemen. They are also responsible in co-operation with other agencies for supervising Agricul-

tural Conservation Program practices carried out in their community. Any farmer participating in any PMA program—owner, tenant, sharecropper—is eligible to vote. The county office will announce the time and place of voting.

## Special Election Called For Changing the Name of School

A school official submits the following explanation of the coming election in the matter of changing the name of the school:

An election has been ordered by the County Judge upon the petition of twenty or more qualified voters for the purpose of changing the name of the Schleicher County Rural High School to Eldorado Independent School District to be held at court house August 8. The reasons as set forth in the petition are as follows:

Dear Mr. Craig: We the undersigned qualified tax payers of Schleicher County Rural High School District of Eldorado, Texas submit the following reasons for the change of the name of said District:

Whereas the status of the Eldorado School has been more or less in a state of doubt since the annexation program of 1946, and

Whereas the intent as shown by the acts of annexation of only six districts, being the limit which can be annexed to an Independent District at any one time, and delaying one year to annex Lofton, and

Whereas through the lack of understanding as to the status of the District responsibilities have been assumed and executed through improper channels and responsibilities have not been assumed by duly authorized persons; and

Whereas Eldorado School District is listed as an Independent School District in some departments of the Texas Education Agency and as Schleicher County Rural High School in others, important mail is often delayed and finances, withheld due to this inconsistency, and

Whereas, the name RURAL School appearing on report cards and transcripts of credits of our students entering other schools may create the wrong psychological impression of the receiving school and inconvenience the student from the beginning, and

Whereas the duties required of a County Superintendent would work a hardship on an already over loaded ex-officio County Superintendent and County Judge,

We do hereby petition you to call an election for the purpose of changing the name of Schleicher County Rural High School to Eldorado Independent School District, said election to be called not less than 20 days nor more than 30 days from the date of the filing

of this petition.

This change of name to Independent School District has been under the advisement of the local school board for some time and by a unanimous vote they approved the change as they believe it will tend to centralize responsibility. The school district has operated as an Independent district ever since consolidation in 1946. The Texas Education Agency has made demands that it be operated under laws governing Rural High School due to the fact it is listed in some departments as a Rural High School. This would tend to place a burden on the office of the Co. Superintendent and cause much unnecessary duplication of work and responsibilities. If the district is to remain a Rural High School then it will be mandatory that these responsibilities be placed in the hands of the County Superintendent which according to Article 2693 of the Texas school law list the following responsibilities: approve all purchases, checks, contracts; invoice, store and distribute all textbooks, and make all reports to the State Superintendent.

The change of the NAME of the District will in no way effect the tax valuation and rate or general functions of the school, but will continue as it has been in the past. Your vote on August 8 at the Court House will be appreciated.
