schools) are operated on a different basis than Independent districts. Rural high schools are administered through a board of trustees in co-operation with a county board and Co. Superintendent (the County Judge.) Whereas Independent schools operate thru thers, Lewis, Tom and Robert, of awarded the contract for service an independent board of trustees who often delegate all authority to an individual principal or super intendent to administer, hire and fire and disburse funds.

Any confusion and delay in mai in the Eldorado school is due to lack of co-operation, and not using proper channels for requests, etc. Not many years ago, the change to County Rural High School was

made to decentralize power, and give more people more say-so in the administration of our school. The same reason is still valid.

It has been said that the proposed change will not effect the tax valuation or rate. It should be remembered that the authority to raise or change taxes is in the board of trustees of an Independen district. In County Rural High School District this power is vested in the county board.

County Extension News

Peach and Pecan Tree Damage Several people have reported damage to pecan trees. The symptoms have been the wilting of some branches, and spots which look wet at various places on the branches of the tree. A small bore, causes the damage. He bores into the cambium layer of the tree thus making the tree bleed. This explains the wet spot on the bark. These bores attact almost any kind of tree, especially peach and pecan trees. They breed in mesquite trees and in their life cycle enter pecan

and other trees. Treatment on the pecan trees is as follows: Dissolve one oz. of wettable DDT in one gallon of water. This should be sprayed or brushed on the trunk and limbs that are infested. This does not completely control them because they breed in the mesquite, but does kill the ones present at the time. However the treatment will have to be repeated every three weeks or 30 days as needed.

Peach trees should be treated the same as pecan trees if there is langer of killing the tree this year. However a better control is to wait intil winter and prune the tree. Then treat the tree as recommend ed above next summer.
