New Discoveries Assured In Southern Schleicher; Shallow Explorations Being Continued

E. O. Meadows and Ira Glasscock will drill a shallow test on Thomson Brothers land. Location is SE corner of SW quarter of section 68, block A, AG&WG survey, ten miles southeast of Eldorado. The road is practically completed, and pits will be completed by tomorrow. Rig owners are completing surface hole on Vander-Stucken's in Sutton County, about seven miles away, and are moving that rig to the Thomson test, later this week, with the expectation of starting on the hole during the week end. The new test will go to about 1000 feet.

Another shallow test location about two miles away is under consideration.

A showing in the Strawn Monday night is reported in Plymouth Oil Co. No. 1 Thomson, section 37, block A HE&WT survey, ten miles south of Eldorado in south central Schleicher County. This is the second showing in this test, a showing having been encountered earlier in the Wolfcamp. A drill-stem test is being taken.

L. E. Scherck No. 1-A D. C. O. Wilson, wildcat in southeast Schleicher, has logged oil and gas shows in the Strawn. Operator took a 90-minute drillstem test between 4580 and 4656 feet. Recovery was 20 feet of slightly gas-cut mud and 150 feet of heavily oil and gas-cut mud. There was a strong blow throughout the test. Flowing pressure was between zero and 430 pounds and shut-in pressure, after 15 minutes, was 500 pounds. The Strawn line was topped at 4580 feet on derrick floor elevation of 2364 feet. Operator is now drilling ahead. There was no water in the above test. Wildcat is 20 miles southeast of Eldorado.

Rotary is on location for the Panuco Oil Leases, Inc., No. 1 Henry G. Moore, 8,000-foot wildcat in west central Schleicher. It is 13 1/2 miles west of Eldorado.

Mid-Continent Petroleum Corporation No. 1 Ethel Williams, one

location north of the discovery well of the Brown-Cox (Strawn) field of north central Schleicher, was to be completed on total depth of 5585 feet. Drillstem test was taken from 5490 to 5515 feet. Tool was open two hours. Recovery was 50 1/2 feet of gas in drillpipe and 40 feet of gas-cut mud, with a slight show of oil. Another test was taken from 5515 to 5555 feet. Tool was open 30 minutes. Gas surfaced in six and oil in 13 minutes. The well flowed for 17 minutes at the estimated rate of two barrels per hour. Operator will set pipe and attempt to complete the project. Location is in section 78, block M, GH&SA survey.

Humble No. 6 Annie May Brooks project in the Huldale field, flowed 106 barrels of oil through a 24/64-inch choke in five hours. Production was through perforations at 5700-5735 feet. Operator was waiting for potential test on last report.

Sinclair has spotted location for No. 8 McClatchy Estate in the Huldale field. It is to be drilled to 5,800 feet, 1820 feet from south and 660 feet from east lines of the southwest quarter of section 42, block M, GH&SA survey and nine miles northeast of Eldorado.

Phillips Petroleum Company was installing pump for completion at No. 1 Reiley, discovery from the Strawn in northeast Sutton. During the last 10 hours of swabbing, the project made 79 barrels of oil through perforations at 4172-4220 feet. The discovery is in section 21, block 5, TW&NG survey and 25 miles northeast of Sonora.

Cox No. 3 Runge was pronounced a dry hole early this week.

Humble No. 6 Brooks, in the Huldale field, has been running a potential to gauge production, which seems assured.

Atlantic No. 1 Roberts, 10 miles southwest of Eldorado, was drilling in granite wash below 7740 feet at last report this week.

WORLD COMMUNITY DAY OBSERVED WITH PROGRAM ON THEME OF PEACE AT FRIDAY AFTERNOON'S SESSION

World Community Day will be observed in Eldorado with a program of prayer, meditation and world mission emphasis, Friday afternoon at 3:30 (tomorrow) at the Methodist Church, with church women of the city in attendance.

The program on world peace will include congregational singing, address by Rev. Doyle Morton on the subject of peace, solo by Mrs. Lewis Jordan, and other program numbers.

This special day is observed throughout the world by Christian churches, under the sponsorship of the United Church Women of the National Council of Churches.

The group, which is composed of members of the participating churches, meets three times each year, in some church in the city. Mrs. Bert Page is president, and Mrs. Edwin Jackson is program chairman.

Gifts To Be Offered

It is stressed that the offering is always voluntary, and everyone is urged to attend, to hear the program and take part in the world observance. For those who would like to give toward the cause, there will be a collection of material gifts.

Recipe of the Week

Sweet Potato Pie

1 1/2 cups mashed sweet potatoes
2 egg yolks, beaten
1/2 teaspoon ginger
1/2 teaspoon ginger
1 1/2 cups milk
1/2 cup cream
1 teaspoon vanilla
1 lemon, rind and juice
3/4 cup pecans or black walnut meats (optional).
1/2 teaspoon salt
2 egg whites

Combine sweet potatoes with all ingredients except salt and egg whites. Add salt to egg whites and whip them until they are stiff and fold them into the combined ingredients. Fill the pie shell. Bake the pie in a hot oven (450F) for 15 minutes, and in a moderate oven (325) for an additional 30 minutes. This is a very light filling. If you prefer it heavier use only 1 cup of milk and cream in all.

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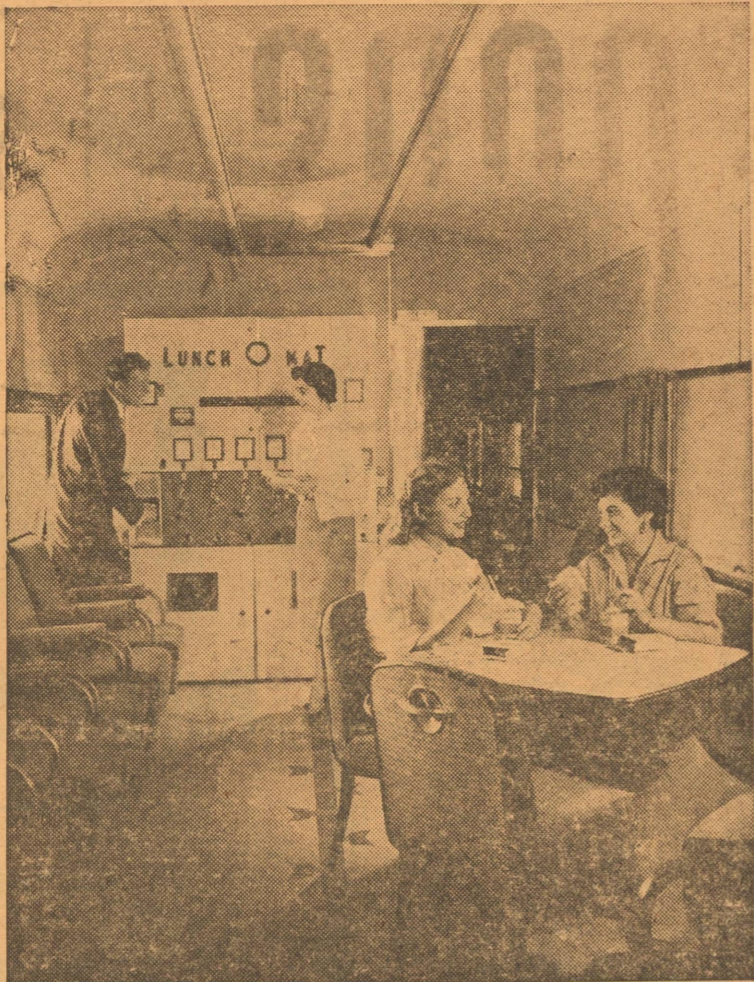

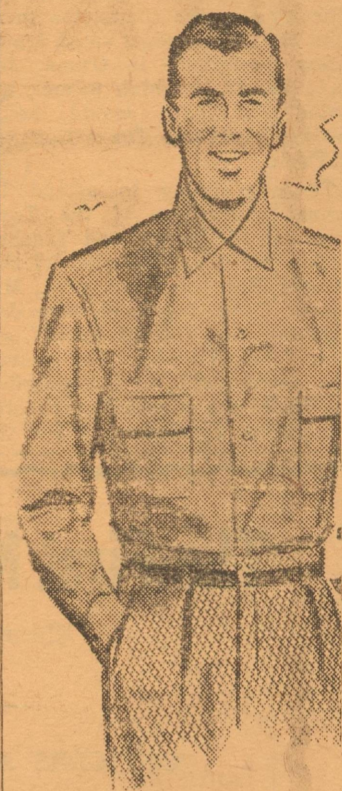

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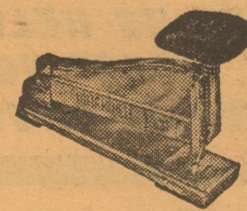

LET'S TALK LIVESTOCK BY TED GOULDY



Ft. Worth.—The movement of cattle and calves to market in the United States reached a new high-water mark as the first market day of November became history last Monday.

Most observers had felt that probably the peak of the fall runs had been reached a couple of weeks ago, and that numbers would moderate in the weeks ahead.

However, the nation's 12 major livestock centers reported 162,000 cattle, nearly 35,000 more than a week ago on the same day. Monday's cattle runs were more than 49,000 head above the same date a year ago.

The 12 major markets reported 33,000 calves, about 1,000 above a week ago, but 6,500 ahead of the same date last year.

The tops of the cattle market at Fort Worth was bearish from the outset and bids and sales of 50c to \$1 lower were the rule at Fort Worth with many sales fully \$1 below last week's close. Exception was choice stocker calves, which ruled steady.

Good and choice drylot fed steers and yearlings cashed at \$17 to \$23, and common to medium grassers sold largely from \$9 to \$15.50. Some rannihan kinds of yearlings and steers cashed at \$7 to \$9.

Fat cows sold mostly from \$9 to \$11 at Fort Worth, a few higher. Cannors and cutters drew \$6 to \$9. Bulls sold from \$7 to \$11, with best heavies around \$12.

Good and choice slaughter calves sold largely at \$13 to \$16.50, and common to medium offerings drew \$9 to \$12, and cull sorts sold from \$7 to \$8.

Good and choice stocker calves sold from \$13 to \$17, a few \$18.50. Stocker and feeder steers and yearlings sold from \$9 to \$15.50. Stocker cows drew \$8 to \$11.50.

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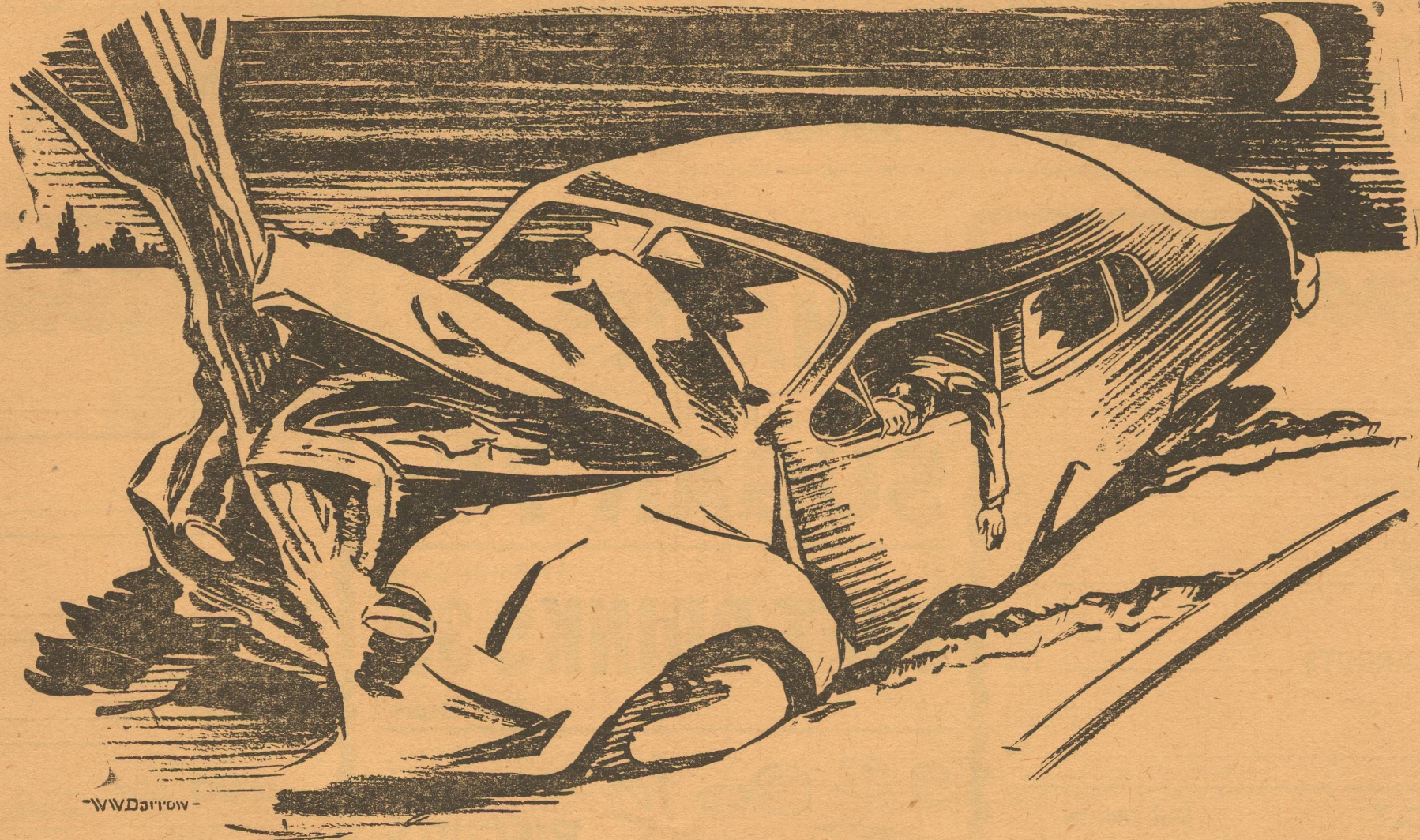

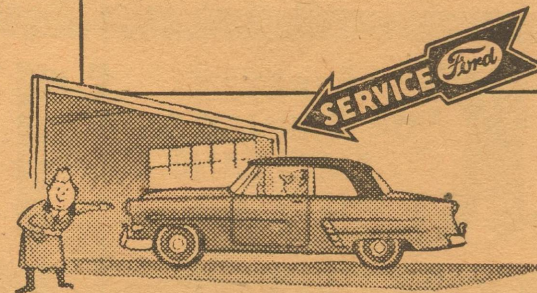


