

pily.







News From Our Neighbors

New Warehouse Started

Work has been started on a new warehouse here for Casner Candelilla Co., located just northwest of the Casner Motor Co. building, in the same block. It is of hollow tile construction, 42x80 feet, and is expected to be completed in 90 days.

The building will be used principally for storing candelilla wax although a small plant will be installed to refine wax brought here in a semi-refined state. The company operates a large refinery at Presidio where most of the products it purchases are refined.

The wax is made from candelilla weed which grows in West Texas and Mexico.—Alpine Avalanche.

Road Work Progresses

Work on the Farm to Market road from Mertzon to the Schleicher County line is advancing rapidly. Most all of the dirt work from the railroad to the five mile hill has been completed and the caliche base applied. From the five mile hill south to the county line the grade is being put up and in many places hard to get over. The caliche base is being applied to the road bed after you pass over the hill, and about one mile has been rolled out ready for the base.

Work on the low-water bridge across Spring Creek has started early in the week and will be pushed as rapidly as possible. The bridge is 13 feet high, 22 feet wide and 28 feet long which will allow it to handle a pretty good size flow of water in case of a rise. —Mertzon Weekly Star.

Ft. Stockton To Try Air Mail Plan
First class mail handled by the
Fort Stockton Post Office is to be
sent and received by air mail for
a trial period. The first dispatch
of regular first class mail by air
was yesterday afternoon on the
Trans-Texas Airways flights to Ft.
Worth-Dallas and to San AntonioHouston.

All cities and towns served by Trans-Texas are to participate in the Post Office Department's test period to determine if the airlines can successfully carry the volume handled on the routes at a cheaper rate. Success of the program will be determined by the volume of mail handled from all stops on

Trans-Texas routes.

Postmaster Wiley said that it is the policy of the post office to send mail by the quickest means and that if mail can reach a destination quicker by surface that it will be used. This will particularly apply to places not on the airway's route where there would be a choice of sending it partly by air and then by surface. — Ft. Stockton Pioneer

The Christmas tree industry is big business in the United States -better than \$50,000,000 an-

The majority of our trees come from New England, New York and Pennsylvania, the north Middlewest, and the Northwest Pacific regions. In recent years, New Jersey has annually marketed around 100,-000 trees.

Most of the trees for Christmas sales are cut early in the fall and the trees are kept green with plenty of water until shipped to distribution centers.

Some mass producers, however, cut trees early in the new year, and treat them with preservatives and coloring solutions for storage in chilled warehouses.

Guard Against Fire This Yule Season

Guard against fire in your home

The average Christmas tree can go up in smoke in only a minute or so and that doesn't leave much time to call for help.

A live tree with roots packed in a bucket of earth is the safest. Be sure and keep the dirt moistened. A small tree is safer than a large one and festive trimmings can make up what is lacking in size.

Don't use lighted candles. (This may seem an unnecessary precaution in this day of electric lights, but lighted candles contribute to tragic fires every year.)

Check the wiring for the tree to see that it's not frayed and is in perfect condition. The switch for turning off and on electric lights should be at some distance from the tree. Don't plug or unplug lights beneath the tree.

Don't leave tree lights on when it isn't necessary and especially when the family is away from home. From time to time, check over the tree and see if needles near the lights are turning brown. If they have, move the lights.

Watch the calendar. New Year's is the day for the tree to go down. If you should extend the time, don't leave the lights on the tree for more than a half hour at a

Place the tree well away from stoves, radiators, and other sources of heat. When you smoke, stay away from the tree. Also be sure that the tree is secured in such a way that it cannot fall. Do not put it near a doorway where it might block an avenue of escape, should a fire occur.




