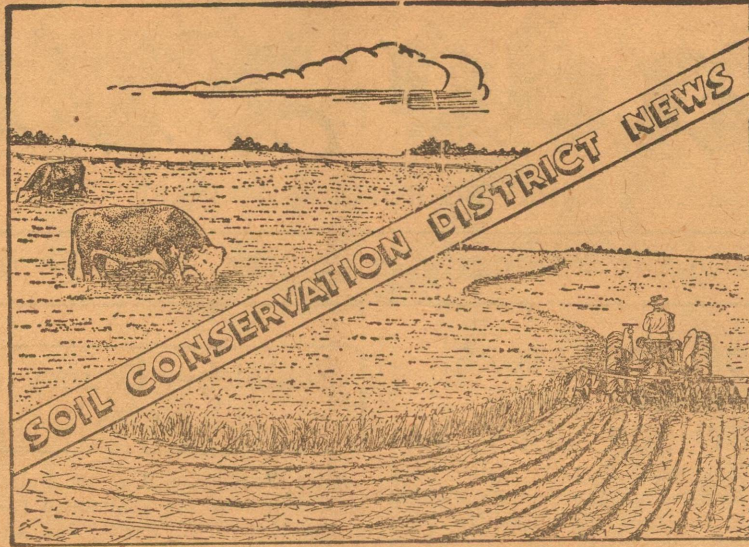

FLOOD CONTROL

Cities and industries have been asking whether soil conservation being carried out by thousands of farmers and ranchers through soil conservation districts will reduce the amount of water available for municipal and industrial uses.

H. N. Smith, state conservationist for Texas, says that for all practical purposes the answer seems to be "no".

The Soil Conservation Service has been studying this problem at the Blacklands Experimental Watersheds project near Riesel, since 1940. The studies include measurements of rainfall and runoff from two similar watersheds. They are still in progress.

Similar farming practices were being followed on both watersheds at the beginning of the study. Conservation practices were established on one of the watersheds in the spring of 1943. These practices included changing part of the cultivated area to grassland; the use of improved crop rotation; and the construction of terraces on land in cultivation. No change was made in the farming practices on the other watershed.

During the first five years rainfall was slightly above normal and the runoff-producing rainfall averaged 17.4 inches annually. The following five years, 1948 through 1952, were drouth years and the run-off producing rainfall averaged only 4.8 inches yearly. The total rainfall during the drouth period was two-thirds the amount for the normal five years, but most of it fell in such small amounts or at such slow rates that it produced

no runoff.

For the normal rainfall period there was almost no difference in the runoff from the untreated and treated watersheds, Mr. Smith reported. The annual average was 10.3 and 10.4 inches, respectively. During the drouth period the average yearly runoff from the untreated and treated watersheds was approximately 1.4 and 0.9 inches.

The fact that there was a difference of one-half inch in the annual runoff from these two watersheds during the drouth years is not the significant point, said Mr. Smith. This minor difference in rate, even over a period of several years, would amount to so small a volume of water that it could not be considered in the planning of a dependable municipal water supply. The important point is that the total runoff from the untreated watershed during the five drouth years was only about two-thirds of the average of one year during the normal rainfall period.

Mr. Smith emphasized that because runoff during drouth years may be very small, water supply reservoirs must have enough capacity to catch the water during years of normal to high runoff and store it for use during drouth periods. A city cannot depend on the runoff during a drouth to maintain its water supply. This is a fact which needs to be widely understood.

Although soil conservation practices on a watershed will not have a significant effect on water yield they can help greatly in protecting

water supplies from loss of storage space by sedimentation. Conservation practices reduce erosion and the rate of reservoir sedimentation. By slowing down the rate at which reservoirs are filling with sediment, Mr. Smith said, more storage capacity will be maintained in which to store water for use during

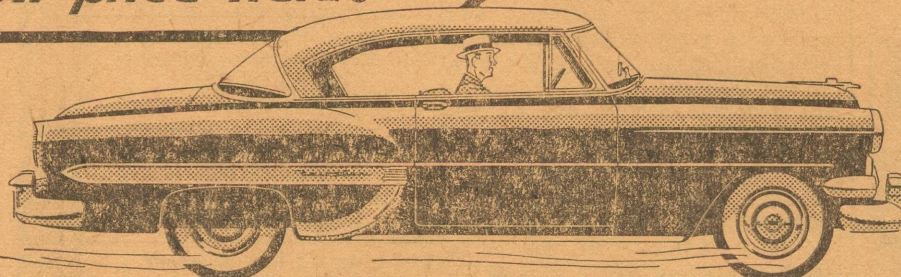

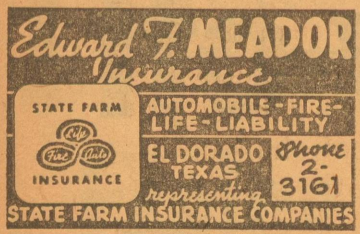

Ft. Worth.—The increased tempo of the movement of grass cattle to market in the Southwest resulted in some weakness on most kinds at Fort Worth Monday.

The cattle offerings included large numbers of cows and grassy steer and heifer yearlings of the plain or common quality. However, the cow market withstood some effort on the part of the buyers to lower prices. Mature steers were fully steady to strong.

Virtually all slaughter and shipper interests appeared in need of some numbers, and local packers were stepping up their killing floor activity to near peak levels. This broadening of demand resulted in mostly steady market on cows. Bulls were weaker, some sales 25 to 50¢ lower. Grassy yearlings and heifers drew weak to 50¢ lower. Calves continued under heavy pressure and sold weak to 50¢ lower along with most of the stockers and feeders.

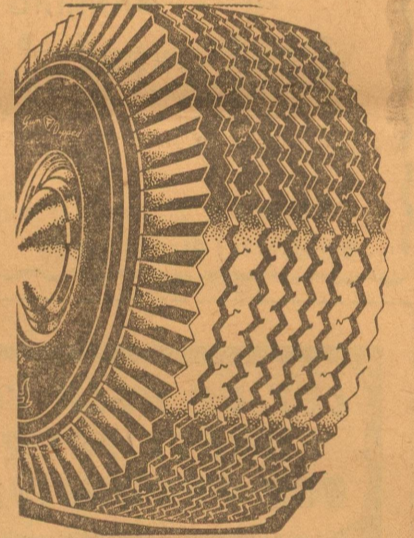



NOTICE

The following Ordinances have been adopted by the Eldorado City Council—

ELECTRICAL ORDINANCE

An Ordinance creating the office of Electrical Inspector; defining the qualifications, duties and powers of such office; establishing rules and regulations governing the installation, operation and maintenance of electric wiring and apparatus, requiring electricians engaged in the business of installing electric wiring and apparatus to be licensed, furnish surety bond and pay license, permit and inspection fees; repealing conflicting provisions of all other ordinances; providing a penalty, not to exceed \$100, for violating any of the provisions of this ordinance.

PLUMBING ORDINANCE

An Ordinance governing the use of and manner of making connection to the Sanitary Sewer and Water Systems of the City of Eldorado, Texas; governing the installation of plumbing; requiring all plumbing work to be done by licensed plumbers; creating the office of Plumbing Inspector; providing for permit and inspection fees; providing that any person, firm or corporation who shall omit or refuse to comply with, or who violates any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be fined in any sum not more than \$100 for each offense, and each day such violation shall exist shall constitute a separate offense; and repealing all ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance.

Adopted May 13th and to take effect July 1st.
