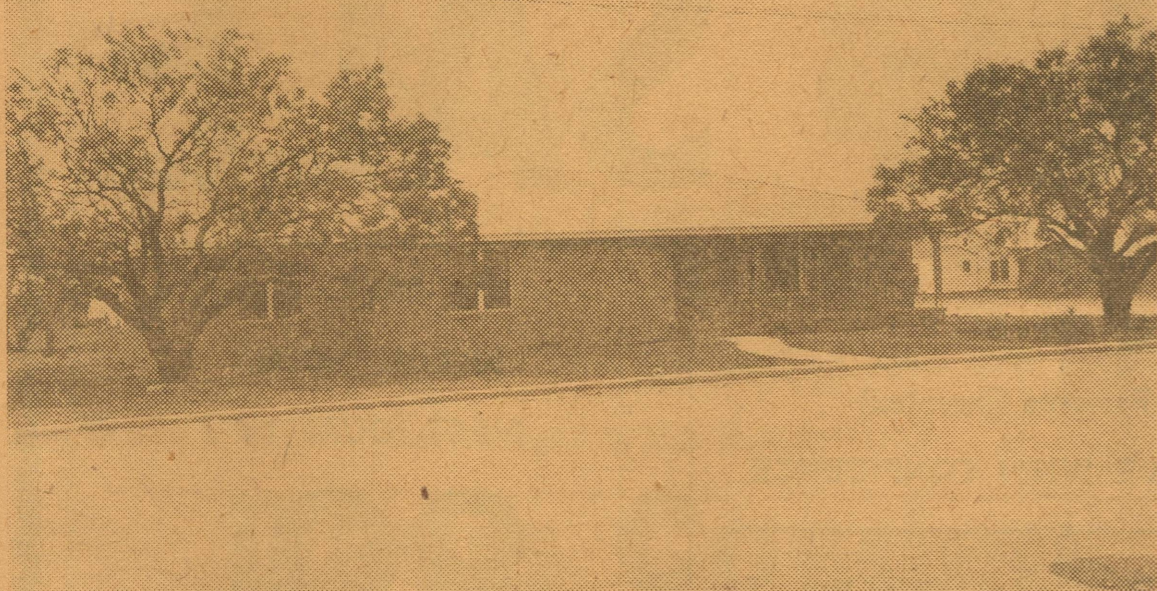


New Baptist Parsonage Which Was Inspected Sunday

Oil News

L. E. Scherck of San Angelo will drill a 5,000 foot wildcat with rotary, one mile south of his no. 2 Minnie Wilson, opener and only producer in the Nancy S. (Canyon) field of this county 21 miles east of this city. It will be called no. 1 Mrs. C. R. Judkins.

Location is 330 feet from north and east lines of 14-A-GH&SA. Delaware Drillers has drilling contract.

Daily pumping potential of No. 2 Wilson, finished May 7, is 211 barrels of 31.5 gravity oil. Production was from 4033-49 feet in Canyon sand. The prospector is ½ mile from J. B. Randle No. 1 Mrs. C. R. Judkins, wildcat failure abandoned June 16.

Hulldale Extended

In the Hulldale field of Schleicher County, production has been extended a location east with completion of Sinclair No. 3 Dwight McClatchy. Daily flowing potential is 203.96 barrels of 39.4 gravity oil, no water.

Perforations were between 5616-655 feet in 5½ inch casing, set at 5659 feet, on total depth of 5690. Top of pay was picked at 5616 feet. Pay was treated with 500 gallons of acid. Tubing pressure was 350 pounds. Location is 31-M-GH&SA, northeast of Eldorado.

Swabbing and testing of Humble Oil and Refining Co. No. 1 M. M. Reynolds continues. Location is section 42, block 1, GH&SA, 17 miles northeast of Eldorado.

Liedke & Liedke et al No. 1 Williams, sec. 38, block 1, five miles southeast of Butler Canyon sand pool, was being deepened.

Tucker Drilling No. 1 B. M. Boyd sec. 7, block C BS&F, was abandoned at 5972 feet.

J. B. Randle No. 1 Judkins, sec. 14, block A GH&SA, was quit at 4307 feet.

Opening of this store will celebrate the 10th anniversary of the Topliffe business. Starting with one old model truck, and no storage facilities, they drove to Coleman after the gas at night, and delivered in the daytime. One week after the business opened, Slim (N. A.) Green, was employed and has been on the job ever since.

For less than a year a main street building housed the office, but a building was then erected near the residence and the business moved there in 1946. The first storage tanks, located at the depot, were later moved to a site on the San Angelo highway.

Changes have taken place over the years. They relinquished their Sonora customers when a Sonora company moved in, and later bought out the dealer at Mertzon. There are Topliffe customers in Irion, Schleicher, Sutton and Tom Green counties.

The wholesale business, operating as Butane Transporters, was added three years ago, and A. C. Jeffrey is now in charge. Vernal Sudduth is in charge of the new store and will help with the book-keeping.

Among the improvements the Topliffes have made are providing of storage facilities at Mertzon as well as at Eldorado, building of garage for truck repairs, with machinery needed to equip it, and, recently, completing the 20x50 ft. building for the new store.

The Topliffes will welcome callers at their open house next Thursday, and urge the general public to mark down the date and pay the new store a visit.

Babson Expects Few Changes In Last Half of Present Year

Babson Park, Mass., June 24 — While most of the columnists and business counselors last December forecast a depression for 1954, I constantly insisted that 1954 would be a "fair business year." This you will find in my forecast which then appeared in this paper.

General Business

(1) Despite my general optimism with regard to prospects for business during the last half-year, there will be many crosscurrents. The improvement over the first six months will be no one-way street. Some industries will lag, or fall behind. Others are slated for betterment. Building has held up well, and was the backbone of business in the first half of 1954. The momentum generated should carry through the balance of the year.

(2) Also deserving of attention as in line for continued high activity, or for improvement, are the following industries: Electric power output, aircraft production, rubber manufacturing, household equipment, electrical equipment, petroleum, natural gas, shoes, and textiles. Even the sick coal industry will enjoy some pickup from the very depressed levels experienced during the first six months of 1954.

(3) Due to slip further down, or slated to show the least improvement are the following industries: Machinery, machine tools, railroad equipment, metal fabricating, steel and iron, and autos and auto parts. In particular, auto output will not match the first half, with competition keener in the last half than at any time since the 1930's.

Sales and Inventories
(4) As in the case of general business discussed above, sales prospects will rule selective. With purchasing power holding well,

demand for food products and soft goods will remain at a brisk pace. The public, however, have learned something about watching their pennies. They have become more price-conscious. For this reason, I predict that the mass distributors, such as the grocery and variety chains, will run ahead of the others saleswise, during the last half-year.

(5) Retail sales in general, although about 4% lower dollar-wise, have held up during the first half in terms of physical volume as discounts and other concessions reduced the actual receipts. This is encouraging since it shows that consumers are still willing to spend if the price is reasonable. In terms of units, retail sales will hold up through 1954. Inventories will constantly be reduced during 1954. The retailers who do best in 1954 will be those with the best parking facilities for their customers.

Political Outlook
(6) I forecast that the more liberal attitude on the part of the Eisenhower Administration will surely continue through November and perhaps until the 1956 elections. During the past six months rumors have been spreading to the effect that President Eisenhower will not run again; but there is no agreement at this writing by either party as to who the next candidates will be.

(7) The President has won his conflict with Senator Bricker; the House approved his Tax Bill; the Taft-Hartley Labor Bill has been shelved, to the relief of all; and he has so far kept out of the McCarthy-Army row. I forecast that for the balance of the year he will leave domestic affairs to his associates and devote most of his time to helping Mr. Dulles ward off trouble with Russia and China, and

avoid another "Korea."

(8) During the first six months of the year a "New Look" has developed in connection with defense expenditures. Appropriations for foot soldiers and certain classes of airplanes have been cut in favor of items for atomic warfare and guided missiles. Best authorities agree that we will get more protection and fighting strength from this change with less cost. As a promise "to get our boys out of Korea" was a great factor in electing Dwight Eisenhower as President, he naturally will hesitate to send U. S. foot soldiers into Indo-China, at least before the coming November elections.

War and Peace

(9) There will be no World War in 1954 started by Russia or the U. S. A. In the last half of 1954, however, the United States will move closer and closer to the position occupied by Great Britain during the 19th Century. The United States will prepare to engage in small wars anywhere in order to prevent outbreak of a world conflagration.

(10) I predict that the United States in the last six months of 1954 may by-pass the United Nations and try to form a "defensive" league of nations interested in Southeast Asia. The purpose: To keep the rice, tin, and rubber of that area from falling into Communist hands. Most of the arms and military know-how needed by such an alliance will be furnished by Uncle Sam. This means that cuts in arms expenditures, already scheduled for the last half of 1954 by the Administration, may not be put into effect. The Korean situation will remain about as is—"much talkie, no shootie," but Indo-China will constantly become a greater threat.

(11) Do not forget Europe and the Middle East. France is torn by internal dissension and a blow-off could come there any time. West Germany is growing more impatient with French bickering over the Saar and over the formation of a Western European army including German participation. Russia will strive mightily to widen the split between France and Western Germany by holding out the bait of reunion between East and West Germany.

(12) Friction between the Jews and Arabs in the Middle East is being encouraged by Communist agents. The smoldering fires there could break into flame at any time, requiring a hurry-up call for Uncle Sam's fire department.

Stock Market Outlook

(13) Of course, some day the market (especially the Dow-Jones Industrials) will get a bad walloping with very much lower prices. On the other hand, this may not come during the next few months. Up to this time the high yields of stocks have not appealed so much to investors, owing to the personal tax on both dividends and on income in general. Although stock yields compared with those of twenty years ago are higher if personal taxes are not considered, yet when these personal taxes are deducted, today's yields have not been attractive.

(14) The new Tax Bill and the increased buying for pension funds and investment trusts have, however, increased the demand for common stocks and could hold the market up for some months to come.

(15) Automobiles will continue to be hard to sell and easier to buy during the last half of 1954. Both the automobile stocks and the cars will be less in demand. There will

be more bargains in used cars, discounts on new cars, especially cars of the "independent" manufacturers.

(17) Canada will continue to boom during the second half of 1954, but this may be a good time to take profits on Canadian investments.

Money and Interest Rates

(18) When Mr. Eisenhower assumed the Presidency with his Cabinet of "9 millionaires," they proclaimed a new monetary policy which would increase the value of the dollar and raise interest rates. Either fortunately or unfortunately the economic situation caused a reversal of this policy. The value of the dollar shows no increase over January 1st and this has been hailed by Wall Street as a sign of further inflation. Interest rates during the second six months of 1954 should average about as at present.

(19) The fear of involvement in Indo-China is strengthening the commodity markets. This takes some of the pressure off of Secretary Benson and those who have been resisting increased tariffs. I forecast an upward movement in many commodity prices — other than farm prices—during the balance of 1954.

(20) Money supplies are on the rise again now. They will continue to expand during the last half. Inflationary effects on the price level will be limited as our capacity to produce is now large.

(21) Any psychological inflationary flare-ups that may take place as a result of war scares, big or little, will not be long-lived. Warning: Don't get drawn into any speculative moves in commodities or stocks based on the outbreak of a small war.

(22) As to unemployment, I will

say that this has increased some over last year, but if considered on a per-capita basis, it is even less than that of five years ago. Look for a moderate reduction in the ranks of the unemployed during the last six months of 1954.

(25) My forecast as to the various classes of real estate is as follows:

Large commercial farms will experience a further sag in their land values the last half-year as farmers' gross income dips lower. Small farms on the fringes of big city suburbs should hold or rise in price as people get further away from city centers.

I look for vacant land in the suburbs to hold its value well. Demand for more shopping centers will be noticeable during the months to come.

Home property (especially the older houses, particularly in the cities) will continue sagging in price.

In the last half-year, construction will still be a powerful support to our economy as it has been for so long.

Conclusion

I cannot end this forecast without reminding readers that we are living in a truly New Era, comparable only with the year 1 A. D., 1954 years ago, or the invention of printing 500 years ago. The H-Bomb, in the hands of any ambitious dictator, could bring about unparalleled conditions. These changes could make the things, about which I have written above, of little value or consequences. Only a great spiritual awakening can save us.

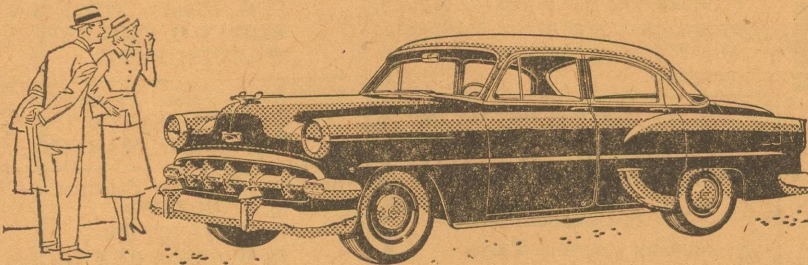

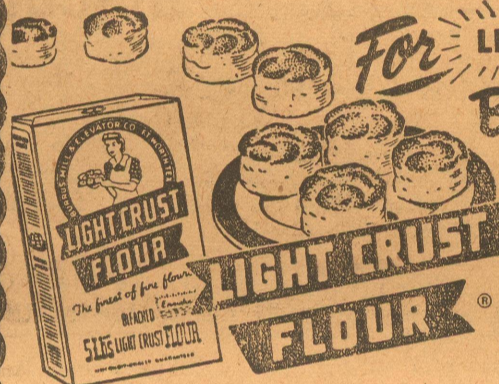

Be On Alert For Screw Worms

College Station—Texas stockmen are advised to look out for screw-worms and to treat all livestock wounds to prevent worm infestation. Mild winters, similar to the one just past, induce an early worm build-up, says Neal M. Randolph, extension entomologist.

To prevent and curb infestation Randolph recommends EQ-335 smear. It contains lindane which gives a lasting killing effect. One application a week, except in severe cases, will do the job. Screw worms increase rapidly once present. If headed off from the start, a lot of trouble can be avoided, the entomologist says.

NOTICE

The following Ordinances have been adopted by the Eldorado City Council—

ELECTRICAL ORDINANCE

An Ordinance creating the office of Electrical Inspector; defining the qualifications, duties and powers of such office; establishing rules and regulations governing the installation, operation and maintenance of electric wiring and apparatus, requiring electricians engaged in the business of installing electric wiring and apparatus to be licensed, furnish surety bond and pay license, permit and inspection fees; repealing conflicting provisions of all other ordinances; providing a penalty, not to exceed \$100, for violating any of the provisions of this ordinance.

PLUMBING ORDINANCE

An Ordinance governing the use of and manner of making connection to the Sanitary Sewer and Water Systems of the City of Eldorado, Texas; governing the installation of plumbing; requiring all plumbing work to be done by licensed plumbers; creating the office of Plumbing Inspector; providing for permit and inspection fees; providing that any person, firm or corporation who shall omit or refuse to comply with, or who violates any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be fined in any sum not more than \$100 for each offense, and each day such violation shall exist shall constitute a separate offense; and repealing all ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance.

Adopted May 13th and to take effect July 1st.

Notice to Absentee Voters

Any qualified elector of this State who is absent from the county of his residence, or because of sickness or physical disability cannot appear at the poll place in the election precinct of his residence on the day of holding any general, special or primary election, may nevertheless cause his vote to be cast at such an election by compliance with one or the other of the methods hereinafter provided for absentee voting.

1. Application For Ballot—Elector shall make application for an official ballot to the County Clerk, in writing, signed by the elector, or by a witness at the direction of elector in case of latter's inability to make such written application because of physical disability.

If the ground of application be sickness or physical disability by reason of which the elector cannot appear at the polling place on election day, a certificate of a duly licensed physician certifying as to such sickness or physical disability shall accompany the application.

2. Voting Absentee By Personal Appearance: At any time not more than 20 days nor less than 3 days prior to the date of such election, such elector may make his personal appearance before the County Clerk of the county of his residence at his office and deliver to such clerk his application, to an official ballot, which ballot is then and there, in the office of said clerk, in the presence of said clerk, marked by the elector in secret; and said elector shall write his home address,

together with the number of the voting precinct in which said ballot is to be cast, on the back of said ballot, and shall write his name on the back side of the perforated stub and detach the perforated stub and place same in the stub box and place the ballot in the ballot box.

4. Voting Absentee By Mail: At any time not more than 20 days nor less than 3 days prior to the time of such election, such elector who makes written application for a ballot as above provided shall be entitled to have his ballot cast on compliance with the following provisions: The application shall be mailed to the County Clerk upon receipt of which the County Clerk shall mail a blank official and ballot envelope to elector. Such elector shall mark the ballot in the presence of a notary public or other person qualified under the law to take acknowledgements and in the presence of no other person. The elector shall sign his name on the back of the perforated stub and said ballot shall then, in the presence of such officer, be deposited in the ballot envelope, the envelope securely sealed, the endorsement filled out, signed and sworn to by the elector, certified by such officer, and then mailed by said officer to the County Clerk.

Printed forms for Application for ballot and Physician's Certificate are available from the County Clerk's Office.

(Note: Under the Texas Election Code the voter is designated as the "Elector.")
