THE GOVERNOR'S TRICK

Add together all the bare-faced political tricks old Texas has seen, and you won't find one to equal this new little gem dutifully cranked out by Governor Shivers' "Democratic" state executive committee.

The committee voted, without any dissent or even a question, to count all votes received by Allan Shivers for governor in 1952, in allocating each county's voting strength in the September state convention.

In other words, the votes Shivers got on the Republican ticket (you recall that he took no chances, ran on both tickets in 1952) will count in determining how many votes each county gets in the all-important state Democratic convention.

The governor's hand-picked committee may or may not have followed the letter of the law in its action, but it clearly and deliberately destroyed the spirit and meaning of the law. And surely this, if anything could, will awaken the people of Texas, make them aware that their politics are being run with an iron hand by one man—Allan Shivers.

This is the same Allan Shivers who last week, in his opening campaign speech, boasted of how good a Democrat he is. He's such a good Democrat that he has run in Republican votes in his attempt to retain his slipping hold on the machinery of the Democratic party in Texas.

This maneuver is exactly as honest as trying to count Houston votes in a Dallas city election. It is also just that obviously dishonest. The people of Texas have been patient—very patient—with this man. It is impossible to believe their patience will go this far.

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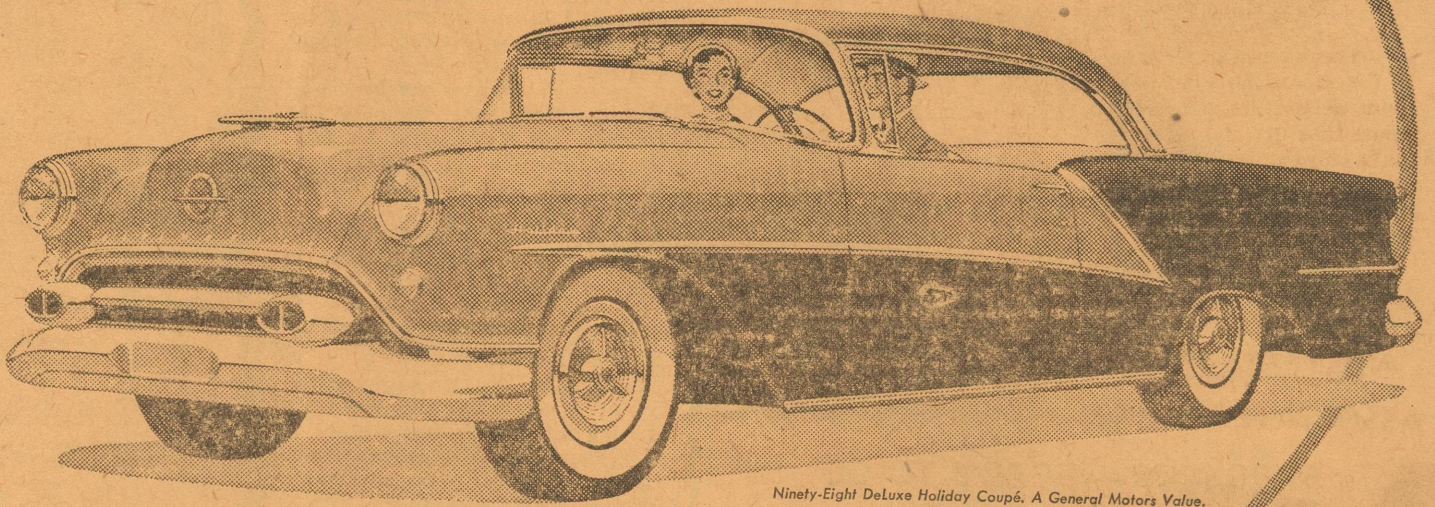
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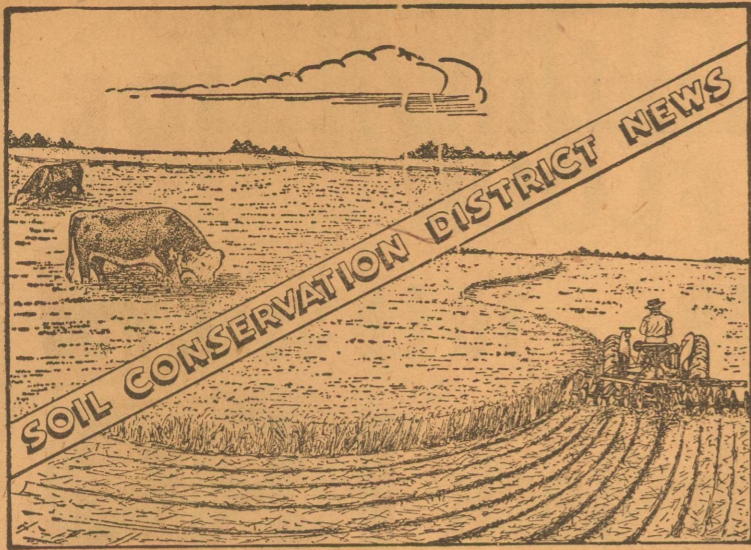
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A rain gauge may fail you, if you take it too literally.

If it measures, say two inches, following a good rain, it doesn't necessarily mean that your soil has received the benefit of two inches of water. Because a rain gauge measures how much has fallen, and that's not nearly as significant as what your soil does with the rain after it falls.

This was found to be the case on the Matthews-Bledsoe Ranch, cooperated with the Eldorado Divide Soil Conservation District, 9 miles south of Eldorado, following the rain the last of June.

Sonny Matthews stated, "The 2.70 inches we got couldn't have fallen any better. We didn't get much in any one shower, and it was slow in falling." It's after rains like this that you usually hear people remark, "It sure fell good, every drop went into the soil."

This was not found to be true on the Matthews-Bledsoe Ranch. Checks made by Max K. Schrader and Lloyd B. Johnson of the Soil Conservation Service, accompanied by Matthews, showed that some areas held a small percentage of the rain while others held all they received.

Sufficient time was allowed after the rain stopped to give the moisture a chance to penetrate as far as it would. Four test spots were selected in deep soil with the same slope but with different cover and treatment.

Digging down in a pit in a pitted area with no grass cover, it was found that moisture had penetrated 30 inches. In a deep

soil site with good grass cover alone, the moisture had penetrated more than 36 inches. In the same area with no grass cover, the rain penetrated to a depth of only 12 inches.

The 2.70 inches in rain will obviously be worth more on the areas with good grass cover and on the pitted areas. In fact, the rain was worth only about 1/3 as much on the areas with no cover as compared with the areas with good cover and the pitted areas.

Matthews and Bledsoe have long realized the need for range management to get their rangeland in a good condition to hold all the rainfall possible and to produce the maximum amount of forage. They realized that they needed to do something other than depend on rainfall alone to get their rangeland in a good condition to hold the maximum amount of rainfall and thereby produce the maximum amount of forage.

Some of the conservation practices used on the Matthew-Bledsoe ranch are pasture deferment, keep livestock in balance with forage produced, and pitting and planting in bare areas.

To help speed up the recovery of their rangeland they have bought several different kinds of grass seed and scattered them in the bare areas. They have also gathered by hand, several hundred pounds of sideoats grama seed and scattered them in the pitted areas and bare areas. Most of all the 100 acres pitted this spring was

planted. About 100 pounds of sideoats grama used to plant the pitted land areas was gathered by hand.

"Some of the benefits of practicing good range conservation," says Sonny Matthews, "are good grass cover holds moisture where it falls and stores it in the soil for future use, good grass cover means less moisture lost by evaporation. This gives the grass plants a better chance to grow, the better grasses that produce the most pounds of good feed per acre increased and more grazing per acre is realized."

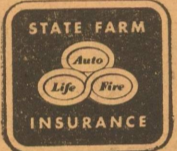

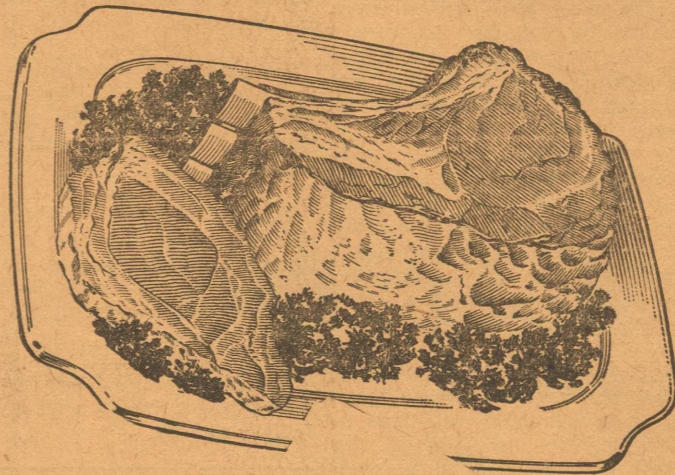
