**School News**

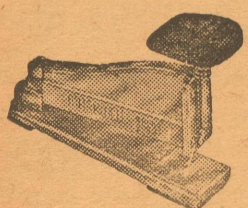

### Post Script

In this, our first issue of the New Year, the Eldorado Success carries a number of political announcements from county candidates, and once again politics is beginning to be the main subject of conversation.

New in the column is the name of Dick Bearce, who will oppose the present incumbent, E. W. Craig for the office of County Judge. The other office holders have all announced for re-election: Mrs. Mabel Parker for treasurer; Greasy Sweatt for Sheriff; and Patton Enoch for County Clerk. The four county commissioners are yet to be heard from.

From the Soil Conservation office come 1953 rainfall totals as recorded on the official gauges of the county:

Eldorado 16.7 inches.  
Forrest Runge 12.8 inches.  
Ford Oglesby 7.85 inches.

A report by months is now being worked up, and will appear in print later.

Interesting to our readers will be this week's First National Bank ad on page four, in which their first statement in 1907 is printed alongside their new statement. At the close of business on the last day of 1953 the new statement reveals for the first time that the assets of the local institution have pushed up into the 3 million dollar bracket.

From the city office comes news that the Schleicher County school district taxes are 90 percent paid by early this week—and that city taxes are paid about 75 percent. This is considered a good record.

At the courthouse we learn that 294 had paid poll taxes by early this week—and there is only the month of January to go. Two years ago 1170 paid their poll taxes and there is probability that that number will be reached again. There are more people in the county to vote but this may not do more than offset the fact that two years ago was a presidential election year in which interest ran high.

The office of the tax assessor & collector reports that people are still buying cars, and that they are nearly out of plates and will re-order.

### JANUARY 15th INCOME TAX DEADLINE FOR MANY

Have you planned on waiting until March 15th approaches before doing any thing about your 1953 Federal income taxes? If so, it might be wise to make a quick check right now. For practical purposes January 15th, rather than the March deadline, is the last day of grace for many individuals.

This is due to the Federal laws requiring certain persons to file declarations of estimated income tax—or the pay-as-you-go plan. Under those laws several million people are required each year to estimate their total annual income in advance, making quarterly tax payments based upon such estimates. The final quarterly payment for 1953 is due on or before January 15, 1954.

come Tax must be filed by every citizen or resident who receives annual wages (subject to withholding) in excess of \$4500, plus \$600 for each exemption claimed.

Those falling into the required category who have failed to file declarations at quarterly intervals during 1953 may make amends by filing either a final declaration or an income tax return by Jan. 15. At the same time they should pay any balance of tax owed the government on their entire 1953 income.

Now, if paying the entire balance of your tax prior to January 15th is going to be a difficult matter, due to a quirk in the tax laws you may avoid penalties by paying at least 80% of your total tax at that time and the remaining balance by March 15th. This would involve filing both a declaration (by Jan. 15) and a tax return (by March 15).

The first quarterly declaration on 1954 income is due on or before March 15th.

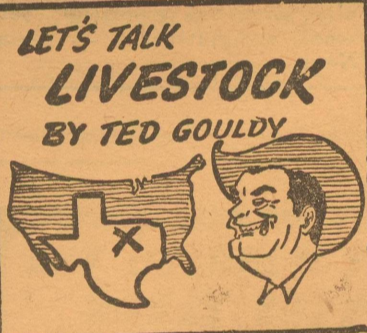

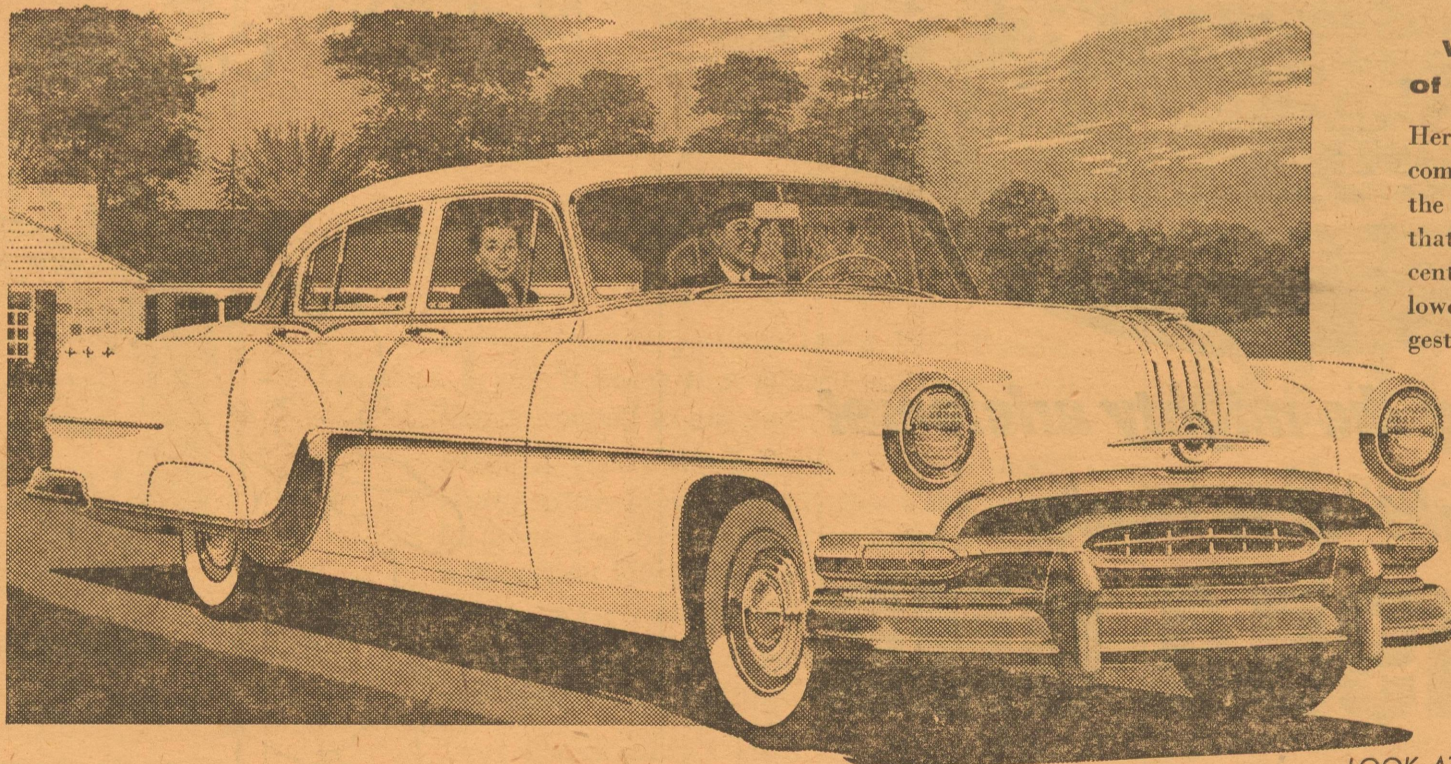

Fort Worth.—Fed steers and yearlings and heavy weight calves were fully 50 cents and most late sales \$1 lower at Fort Worth Monday. The pressure on beef cattle followed the reports of heavy cattle runs over the nation. The 12 major markets reported 6,000 more cattle than a week ago and 12,000 cattle more than on the same date a year ago. Fed beefes predominated in the runs at all markets.

At Fort Worth cows were mostly steady, and bulls sold at fully steady prices. Stocker cattle and calves of good and choice quality were steady, but those of loss quality waded dull and usually sold at their butcher value. Slaughter calves drew weak to 50 cents lower prices, some heavyweights off more.

Hog prices dropped sharply. Butcher hogs were 50 cents to mostly \$1 lower, and top hogs sold at \$24 to \$24.50. Sows were \$1 to \$1.50 lower at \$22 down.

Slaughter lambs were highly uneven. Some sales of fat lambs were steady, while others were 50 cents lower. Fat lambs topped at \$18.50. Feeder lambs were strong to 50 cents or more higher. Some shearing type feeder lambs topped at \$18.75. Old sheep and yearlings sold at strong prices.

Good and choice fed steers and yearlings cashed at \$16 to \$21, a few nigner. Common and medium slaughter steers and yearlings cashed at \$10 to \$10, with cutter grades from \$8 to \$10. Fat beefes were sold Monday at prices in accord with the low time in the pre-Christmas trade.

Fat cows sold from \$9 to \$11, a few heiferish kinds to \$12. Canners and cutters cashed at \$9 to \$9.50, with some thin, emaciated lightweight canners down to \$8. Bulls sold from \$8 to \$13, individuals up to \$13.50.

Good and choice fat calves sold from \$15 to \$19, a few tippy heavy weights to \$20 and above. One load of 564-lb. calves sold at \$20.50

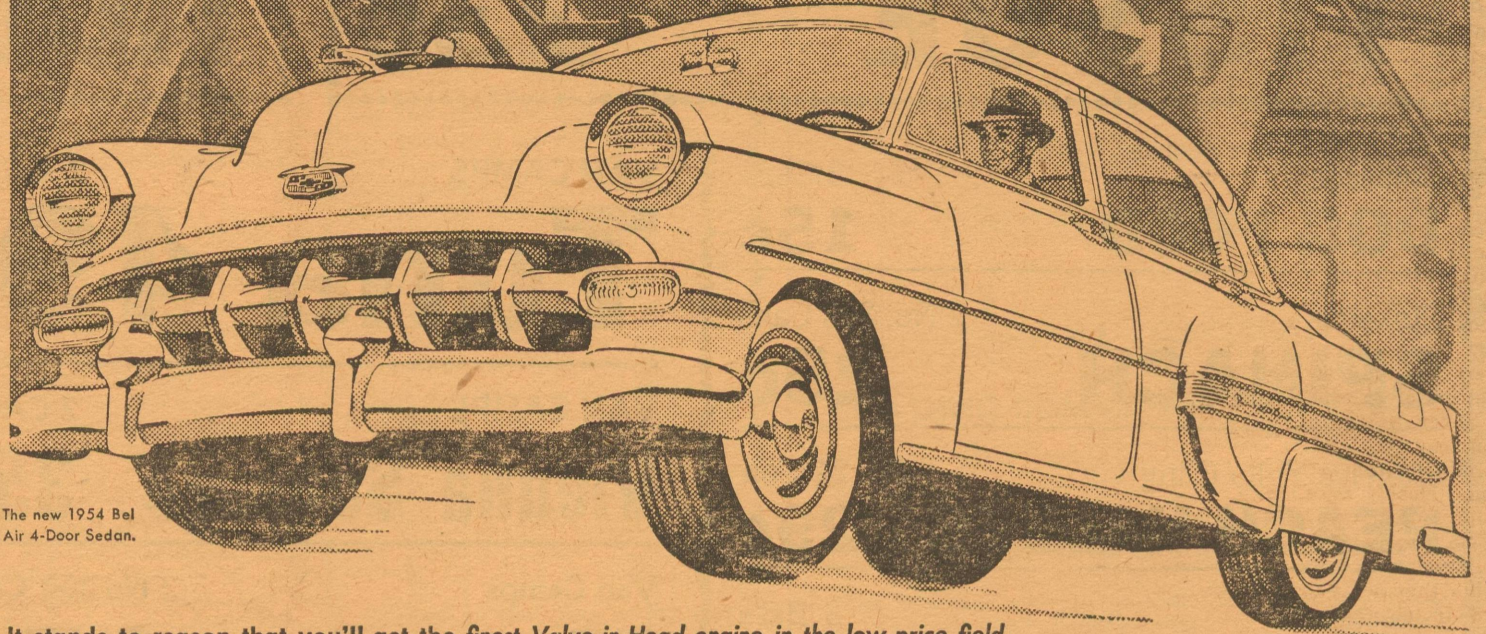

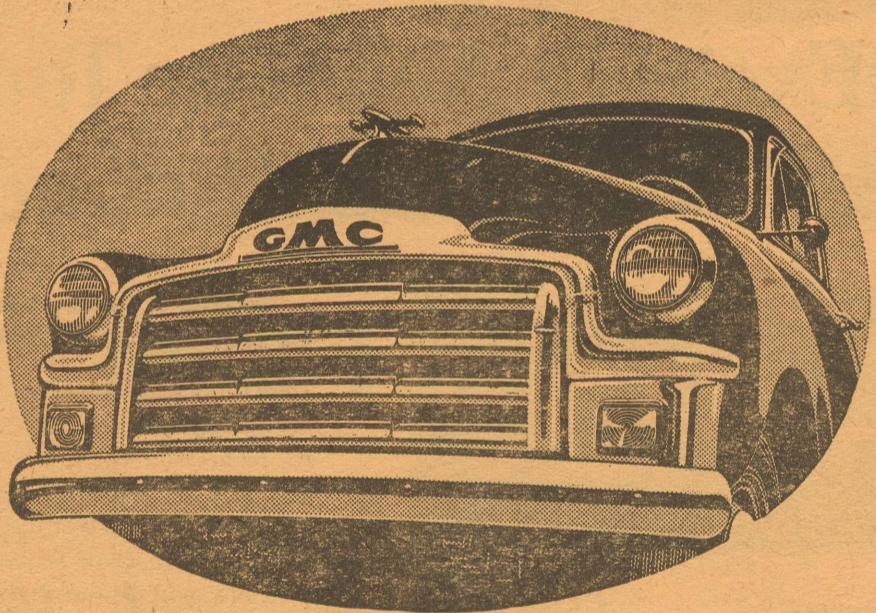

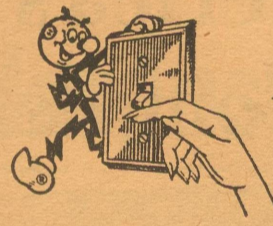

**GOVERNOR DECLARES MONTH OF JANUARY AS HAND SIGNAL MONTH**

Governor Allan Shivers again has designated January as Hand Signal month in Texas and he urges automobile drivers to cooperate in the campaign to promote "more courtesy and greater safety on the thoroughfares of this state." Theme of the traffic safety project is "Right turn—hand up. Left turn—hand out. Slow or stop—hand down."

This is the third consecutive January that Governor Shivers has called for the hand signal campaign which is a part of his continuing state-wide program of traffic safety education. It is sponsored annually by the Texas Safety Association, Inc., and is patterned from the hand signal campaign conducted jointly each year in Dallas by the Citizens Traffic Commission and the Dallas Civitan Club.

"The highways of Texas," said Shivers, "are constantly improving, except in one vital respect—too many accidents continue to occur on them, resulting in needless loss of life and destruction of property."

"As modern engineering perfects our highways, the need for the individual driver to be alert, careful and courteous, increases. A few seconds of thoughtfulness on the part of a driver sometimes can avert not only an accident, but a lifetime of grief. A minute gained is never worth the risk of a life. Courtesy and safety are not optional, but imperative, and they are bound closely together in the psychology of driving."

"So many vehicles now are equipped with directional signal lights that some drivers feel justified in discontinuing the use of hand signals. Safety experts emphasize that, particularly in the bright daylight hours, hand signals should be given to insure that a driver's intentions are understood."
