Ronnie, interested in livestock, joined the 4-H club at the age of ten, starting with five lambs and winning the county show his first year in club work. He has fed lambs every year winning consistently in major shows, repeating in 1953 by winning top honors at the local show.

In 1952 Ronnie started in the registered sheep business with ewes purchased under the Sears-Roebuck Foundation Sheep Program. He has consistently added to this flock and has won his share of honors by exhibiting fleeces of wool, ewe and ram lambs in 4-H shows both local and area shows.

In addition to his sheep projects Ronnie has participated in judging of wool and mohair, plant identification and soil conservation con-

He was a member of the State wool judging team winning third in the State in 1950 and a member of the same team that won the state contest in 1951. He was third high individual in mohair and second high in wool in the state contest.







LET'S TALK LIVESTOCK TED GOULDY

Fort Worth.—Fed steers and yearlings and heavy weight calves were fully 50 cents and most late sales \$1 lower at Fort Worth Monday. The pressure on beef cattle followed the reports of heavy cattle runs over the nation. The 12 major markets reported 6,000 more cattle than a week ago and 12,000 cattle more than on the same date a year ago. Fed beeves predominated in the runs at all mar-

At Fort Worth cows were mostly steady, and bulls sold at fully steady prices. Stocker cattle and calves of good and choice quality were steady, but those of loss quality wede dull and usually sold at their butcher value. Slaughter calves drew weak to 50 cents lower prices, some heavyweights off more

Hog prices dropped sharply. Butcher hogs were 50 cents to mostly \$1 lower, and top hogs sold at \$24 to \$24.50. Sows were \$1 to \$1.50 lower at \$22 down.

Slaughter lambs were highly uneven. Some sales of fat lambs were steady, while others were 50 cents lower. Fat lambs topped at \$18.50. Feeder lambs were strong to 50 cents or more higher. Some shearing type feeder lambs topped at \$18.75. Old sneep and yearings sold at strong prices.

Good and choice fed steers and yearings cashed at \$16 to \$21, a few nigner. Common and medium slaugnter steers and yearlings cashed at \$10 to \$10, with cutter grades from po to \$10. Fat beeves were sold Monday at prices in accoru with the low time in the pre-Christmas trade.


