
The Eldorado track team will participate in an invitation track meet in Ozona, April 9th. The district track meet is scheduled for April 15 in Ozona.

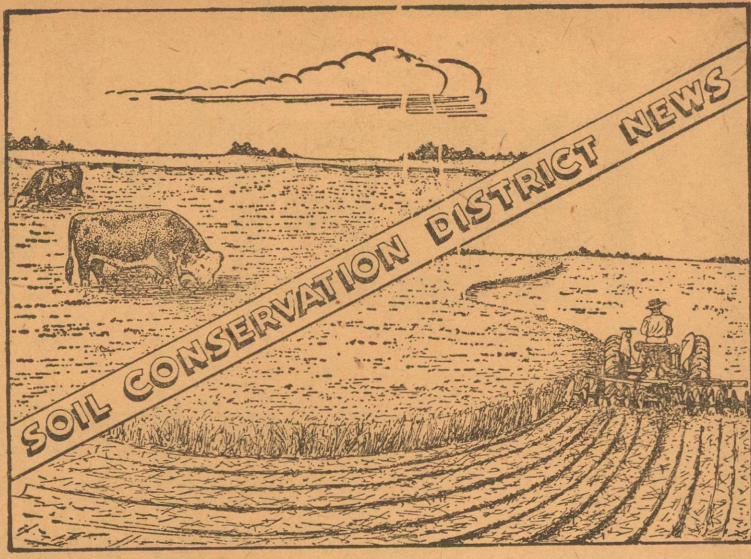

WIND EROSION

Observations made of the various methods of controlling wind erosion show that any form of crop residue left on the surface of the soil is more effective than mere mechanical treatment. This method is most effective in controlling erosion due to runoff also.

Many different means of achieving control of wind erosion are practised. Most of these methods are mechanical. They merely employ different implements to achieve the same goal, namely that of bring cloddy subsoil to the surface or breaking up hardened soil. Any implement which will do this is suitable. Among the most suitable methods to control erosion when there is insufficient crop residue is contour listing. However, unless the soil is cloddy it will give only temporary and short-lived protection. Strip listing is another means employed. Only narrow strips crosswise to prevailing winds should be worked. This leaves areas that can be worked when the others are filled and no longer effective. Disk plows, spring tooth harrow, duckfoot cultivator, chisel, and lister are implements which do a suitable job of preventing wind erosion. Many commonly used farm implements create a bigger erosion problem when used. Any piece of equipment which tends to pulverize and stir the soil prepares it for wind erosion. It must leave the soil in a rough, lumpy condition. The wheatland plow, offset disk, and many others pulverize the soil leaving it in a condition susceptible to wind erosion.

In regard to any mechanical means of control it must be said that the condition of the soil is the controlling factor. None of the mechanical means listed are effective in soils that tend to pulverize. Soils that are low in organic

matter naturally tend to pulverize and blow more easily. Also any row crop that is cultivated during the hot dry season has lost its moisture and pulverizes easily. The nature and condition or past treatment of the soil is therefore the one thing that should be considered in controlling erosion. Soil that has plenty organic matter and crop residue will not tend to pulverize and will also retain its moisture over a longer period of time.

If you really want to control blowing you must plan for it the previous growing season. Any mechanical means of tilling the soil is only temporarily effective and will not be effective under prolonged windy spells. If your organic residue is left on the soil you have a very effective control. It costs less to stubble mulch your land than it does to plow it in an effort to control blowing after it has started. In these areas where rainfall is undependable, advantage must be taken of the spring and summer rains to prepare for the following year.

Other means of control are planting your crops in strips whereby a row crop is alternated with a close-growing crop. These are ordinarily planted crosswise to the wind and one serves to protect the other. On land that is sandy or blows easily a good grass is often the only effective control. This not only provides surface cover but the roots also bind the soil below. Leave your stubble.

Let's leave some for next year —this year.
