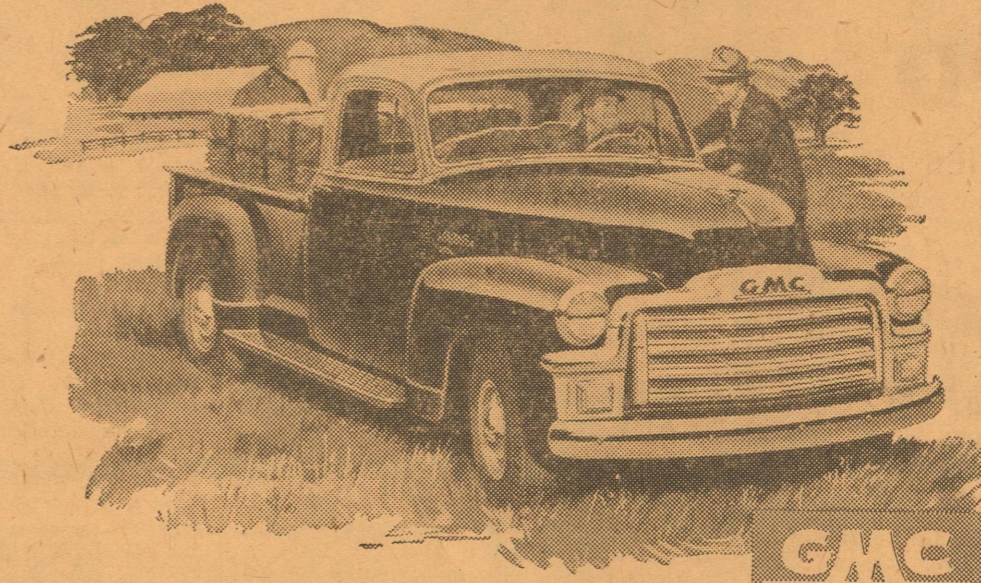

Jorgi Lagow opened the pro-

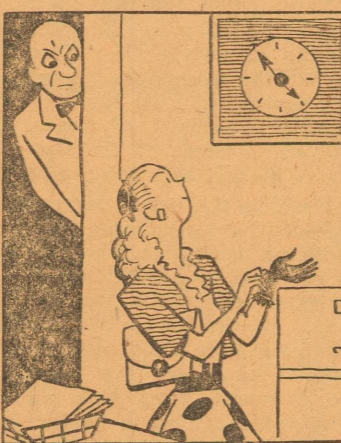

The Eldorado Divide Soil Conservation District has equipment available to farmers and ranchers for their use in doing conservation work. This equipment is purchased with District funds and is required by law to charge a small maintenance fee for its use. Although the fee is small it is important that all who make use of the equipment pay the rental fee promptly so the needed maintenance can be done on each piece of equipment to keep it in good working condition for future use.

Bob Sykes has recently worked out a basic conservation plan on his ranch in the northeast part of the district out on the Toe Nail Trail. Bob came through the winter in pretty good shape, he says, without having to feed so very much. He plans to keep his numbers down in order to let the grass grow. Bob plans to plant a few acres of blue panic grass for grazing purposes this year. Technicians assisting the district worked with Bob in developing his basic conservation plan. This is a long-time plan and worked out to where Bob can get the benefit of most the rain that falls on his rangeland.

Supervisors of the Eldorado-Divide Soil Conservation District have purchased 850 pounds of blue panic grass seed to be sold to

landowners at the purchased price. This was done to encourage buying seed now rather than waiting until planting time and having to pay twice as much.

Howard Derrick has pitted several acres of bare land on his ranch 23 miles east of Eldorado. This was done to break the crust and allow better moisture penetration.

Other district cooperators and landowners in the district who plan to pit and plant are: Truett Stanford, Weldon Davis, Ben Hext and Pete Parker.

Henry Mittel, Bill Hixson, ranchers, and Lloyd B. Johnson, technician of the Soil Conservation Service made a trip to the Soil Conservation Service nursery in San Antonio recently to get several different kinds of grasses to be tried in this section of the country. The nursery is being discontinued and the grasses are being given away through districts only for the asking. Some of the species received by Mittel and Hixson and set out on their places are: Klein-grass, silky bluestem, pretoria bluestem 90, medio bluestem, Australian bluestem, and blue buffel-grass.

Vernon Pfluger spent some time recently maintaining his terraces and end-closures. He has also been

making some fills in his terraces. Are you a supporter of your soil conservation district?

**NEW PREFERRED STOCK BIDS ARE ACCEPTED**

Abilene.—West Texas Utilities Co., has accepted the bid from Harriman, Ripley & Co., and associates of New York for the underwriting of its 60,000-share (\$6 million) issue of new preferred stock, \$100 par, Price Campbell, WTU president, said last week.

Campbell said the Harriman, Ripley group lowest of five bidders, named an offering price of \$105 a share for stock with a \$4.40 dividend, less an underwriting compensation of \$2.25 a share.

A total of 47,370 shares of the new senior equity issue will be offered on an exchange basis to holders of the utility's \$6 no par preferred stock. The other 12,630 shares will be put on the public market by the underwriters, also at \$105 a share.

Campbell reported that of the 47,370 shares offered on an exchange basis to holders of the utility's \$6 par preferred stock that 62 per cent of the stock was in Texas and that 65 per cent of the holders were also in Texas. "We are going to try to keep this stock in Texas," he said.

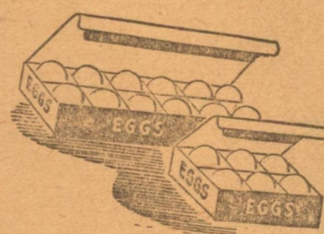
