Wind and water respect no state, county, or fence line; therefore there can be no adequate conservation without the wholehearted understanding and backing of all the people who live on the land or who benefit by its productivity. So the first thing necessary for a successful conservation program is an enlightened public opinion. Now what is a complete soil

conservation program? It is defined as a "complete and coordinated program for soil and water conservation" . . . treating each acre according to its needs and capabilities.

2.

This may further be divided into four points that may be called the corner-stones of a complete program.

1. Sound land use. Until we learned how to preserve food so we could ship it, we had to live right where it was grown or try to grow things that were not suited to the soil or the region. Because we now know how to preserve food nad ship it fast, a fellow can live anywhere or wherever he can find work and he knows he can get something to eat. He can make sense out of the way he uses the land . . . he doesn't have to grow wheat where it is better to grow grass and he doesn't have to raise cattle where they can't do more than put on skin and bones.

There are four broad groups of land use and this area has been mapped and charts distributed showing its capabilities, so there is no excuse for anyone trying to farm land that he knows definitely is not suitable to till.

2. The right combination of practices. To spend most of the time advocating terracing does not constitute right combination of practices. In the same way, just reducing livestock numbers is not enough . . as the definition said at first it should be a coordinated program. (A) Must protect and improve the land, (B) Must fit the operations of the farm or ranch, and (C) Must be practical.
