

Their expressions of regret that Johnston had been wounded were halted by Johnston's discovery that he had lost his sword and pistols. The sword especially meant a great deal to Johnston who asked if someone would go back to the place he had fallen and bring both it and the pistols to him. "I would not lose it for \$10,000" he is

reported to have said. Lee and Davis waited while a courier went back under fire to recover the precious items and then set off in search of General G. W. Smith, now the ranking general on the field. General Johnston was removed from the battlefield and, after a period of recuperation, became commander of the

Army of Tennessee. Having found General Smith and informed him of Johnston's wound, General Lee and President Davis rode back to Richmond. No one knows what passed between the two on that ride back, but by the time they reached the outskirts of the Confederate capital. Lee was the new commander of the Army of Northern Virginia.

Lee's first action was to send Jeb Stuart's cavalry on a reconnaissance ride that took the horsemen completely around McClellan's army and furnished much needed information as to the enemy's positions and the condi-

tion of the countryside. Then on June 25, the famous Seven Days' Battle began at a place called Oak Grove, Virginia, and in succeeding days names like Mechanicsville, Gaines' Mill, Savage Station and Frayser's Farm became names of battles rather than names of towns and villages dotting the Virginia countryside around Richmond.

On July 1, the final drama of the Seven Days' was played out

at Malvern Hill. Two days later, McClellan's army was entrenched at Harrison's Landing on the James River-the point from which they would board ships to take them from the scene their unsuccessful campaign capture Richmond.





Washing Electric Bedcoverings

As you take your electric bedcoverings out of storage, you may want to wash them again before putting them to work for another season. Automatic electric blankets and bedsheets should be wasned, not dry-cleaned, according to extension home management specialists of Texas A&M College Dry-cleaning fluids may injure the wiring system.

Before washing be sure to disconnect all controls from the electric blanket or sheet. If there are spots or stains, wash these first gently with solution of soap or detergent and water. Use luke warm water for washing---about 100 degrees F. Wash one blanket at a time. Here's Why Wiener Prices Vary

Have you noticed the variation in prices of a pound of wieners or hot dogs? Here's some information for food shoppers on the subject by Mrs. Gwendolyne Clyatt, Extension Service food marketing specialist at Houston.

The list of ingredients on the label of wieners will tell you why some are higher-priced than others. Ingredients on the label are listed in order and according to the amounts included—such as ground beef, pork, cereal, dry non-fat milk and soy flour.

These ingredients—other than -absorb and hold water thereby increasing the weight, Mrs. Clyatt points out.

"They're also lower priced than meat, so the cheaper packages of wieners will have larger amounts in relation to the meat content. The federal meat inspection mark is the shoppers' guarantee that the product is wholesome, suitable for human consumption, and is honestly labeled," she said.

The mark is a round purple stamp with the words "U. S. Inspected and Passed" printed within the circle. The stamp also has a code number that identifies the packing house that processed the


