Mr. and Mrs. Roy Andrews To Be Honored Sunday On Their Golden Wedding Anniversary

This Sunday afternoon Mr. and Mrs. Roy Andrews will be honored with a Golden Wedding reception at their home on South Main street here in Eldorado.

Calling hours will be from 2:00 to 5:00 in the afternoon and hostesses will be the 'couple's two daughters, Mrs. Gus Love and Mrs. Happy Kerr. They state that all family friends are invited to attend.

The couple were married June 21, 1912, in Menard county, by Justice of the Peace Will Eckert, who is now deceased. Witnesses were A. Z. Woodward, also now deceased, and Annie Andrews, sister of the bridegroom. The latter married Jess Hight of London about a month and a half later, and she will be the only surviving member of the wedding party on hand for the open house Sunday.

Roy C. Andrews, the bridegroom, grew up in Menard county eight miles from London. He recalls today that he worked then for \$20 a month, with board. The boots he is wearing in the early-day picture cost \$12.50 when he bought them in Mason as a young man.

The bride was the former Bessie Annie McDonald, who had been reared at Harper in Gillaspy county before moving with her parents to London as a young woman. The McDonald family were engaged in farming and ranching near London when the couple met

The newlyweds made their first home on his father's farm in 1912 and '13. In 1914 they moved to Schleicher county to the Frank Spencer place, arriving in October of that year. 

Austin.—Texas' crime situation looks a little better. FBI reports covering the first three months of 1962, based on statistics from the 12 largest cities, show major crime down 6.7 per cent.

Across the U. S. in cities of comparable size, major crime rates rose one per cent.

Texas' crime rate actually is down in number of crimes reported from 1961, despite a population growth during the year of some

Out Of Jobs

Finding a job in Texas is a little easier these days. Texas Employment Commission reports April unemployment at 4.3 per cent of the labor force as compared to 5.4 per cent a year ago.

Average factory wages rose from \$91.21 a week last year to \$90.10 this April. Range was wide, however, depending on the industry.

Leatherwork was the lowest paid, an average of \$52.13 a week. Oil workers got the most, an average of \$132.07 weekly.

Number of Texans working outside agriculture now has passed the 3,000,000 mark. Houston had 19,800 unemployed: Dallas 16,000.

Too Many Colleges?

Dr. Ralph Green of the Texas Commission on Higher Education thinks the Legislature should quit creating four-year, state-supported colleges. He told a House Committee on Saving Taxes that 20 state colleges are about enough.

Legislators have extended state support to four new colleges in the last four years. Biggest of the new ones, the University of Houston, will enter the state system this fall. This will substantially increase the state's higher education bill. U of H now ranks second in size to the University of Texas.

Water Supply

Texas enters the summer with its major reservoirs 76 per cent full. Texas Water Commission reports that May rains couldn't keep up with use and evaporation, so the water supplies shrunk by 291,000 acre feet.

As June opened, supplies were 76 per cent of capacity, compared with 83 per cent a year ago.





'Pocketful Of Miracles' Is On Sunday & Monday

Bette Davis as "Apple Annie" hawking her apples in the Broadway theater district, in a Depression period setting, is the central figure of "Pocketful of Mircles," the Frank Capra-Glenn Ford fantasy which will be shown Sunday and Monday nights at the Eagle Drive-In Theatre.

Based on a story by Damon Runyon, "Pocketful of Miracles" was produced and directed by Frank Capra. The two-hour-plus movie is in big screen and color.

The picture is loaded with fragrant reminiscenes of an old mas ter's directorial touch and reminder of the guys and dolls who peopled Damon Runyon's fables of the greasy New York pavements 30 years ago.

Some of the characters may seem dated to today's movie-goers. For them the impoverished apple seller, the race-track tout, the gambler, the blonde of uneasy virtue, may be as remote as Little Red Riding Hood.

Mr. Capra may have held a fistful of miracles in his hands. The picture may stack up as engaging narrative, to "click" as does a better Disney film.



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

Cattle grubs cost livestock producers in the United States from 100-300 million dollars each year. Losses to the packer result from the necessary carcas trimming and devaluation and hide damage. On the ranch loses result from skin irritation, nervousness of the animals, below normal weight gains, lowered milk production and excessive running and frequent accidents to caattle feeding in pastures

during the spring.

A well organized county wide grub control program would result in great financial benefits to the cattlemen of Schleicher county. County and individual ranch control cuts down the amount of reinfestation and reduces spring and summer annoyance by troublesome

Effective control of the cattle grub can only be done by recommended systemic insecticides -

Ruelene and Co-ral. All these materials should be used between the time heel fly activity in the spring and before grubs appear in the backs of the animals. In Schleicher county the time to apply systemic insecticides is May 1 to August 1.

Co-Ral Spray

CoRal may be applied effectively as a high pressure, 0.5 percent spray mixed at a rate of 16 pounds of 25 percent wettable powder in each 100 gallons of water. Spray each animal completely; thoroughly wet the entire animal to the skin so the chemical will be adequately absorbed. Power sprayers developing 250 pounds or more of nozzle pressure per square inch are preferred. Large animals each require approximately 1 gallon of spray; smaller animals require 1 to 3 quarts, depending on size. Do not apply Co-Ral 0.5% spray within days of slaughter. Sprays of Co-Ral also control horn flies, lice, ticks and screwworms.

Co-Ral by Pour-On

To apply as a back-line treatment, mix 4 pounds Co-Ral 25W (25% weettable powder) in 3 gallons water or light mineral oil N.F. Pour uniformly down the backline of the animal at the rate of one-half pint per animal.

Co-Ral as a Dip

Dipping vat treatment is very effective. Charge the vat with 8 pounds of Co-Ral 25W powder for each 100 gallons of water used. Thoroughly wet each animal. Do not dip animals in Co-Ral within 7 days of slaughter. Keep the solution properly agitated. Add additional insecticide materials at the same dosage to replace liquid and insecticide carried away on the treated animals. Add insecticide if rain, snow or other added water dilutes the mix. Add water if measurable evaporation occurs. The vat mixture may be used until debris makes it unsuitable for

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
