Lloyd D. Ochsner, 58, Santa Fe Railway agent here since 1942, aled unexpectedly at his nome here Sunday atternoon. Apparently in normal health, his sudden death came as a shock to the entire community.

Services were held at 10:00 a.m. Tuesday, Nov. 13, at the Rock Church of Christ. Dwain Ramsey of San Angelo, minister of the Church of Christ, conducted the services, assisted by Rev. Allan Guthrie, associate minister of the First Presbyterian church in San Angelo. A choir, composed of members of several Eldorado churches, sang.

Pall bearers were E. H. Topliffe, Joe Christian, Alvin Farris, Gene McCalla, Jo Ed Hill, Bennie Harkey, Leslie Baker, and Dan Brown of San Angelo.

Interment was made in the Eldorado cemetery under direction of Ratliff-Kerbow Funeral Home.

Lloyd Dorr Ochsner was born April 16, 1904, in Wyconda, Missouri. He was the son of George Ochsner and Pearl Congdon Ochsner, both members of families who originally settled that area. He was a member of the Baptist church.

He and his twin brother, Lucian, went to work for the Santa Fe in Missouri in 1923. He came to Texas in 1925 and married Jewel Shelton of Lockney in 1926. Three children were born to them: Clara Lloyd, now Mrs. Lloyd Scherz of Sonora; John Dorr, District Engineer for Lone Star Producing Co. and George Shelton, Engineering Technician for Tidewater Oil Co., both of Midland.

He came to Eldorado from Tulia in 1942 as Santa Fe agent. He became an amateur radio operator in 1934, having the call letters W5G-DX. He served in many emergencies, relaying messages when necessary and enjoying ham radio as a hobby. As a result of his interest in electronics, he began to repair radioes for friends and gradually developed a radio and T-V service that he operated in his spare time until his death. His favorite sport was golf, and he was a charter and very active member of the Sonora Golf Club. Other than his wife and children, he is survived by five grandchildren: Phillip Dorr and Drew Lloyd Scherz of Sonora, and John Dorr, Robert Frederick, and Julie Kate Ochsner of Midland. Also his twin brother who is with the Santa Fe in Snyder and lives in Sweetwater, and one sister, Mrs. Jim Shultz who is librarian at the University of Arkansas Medical School in Little Rock, Arkansas.


#### **Ozona Roundly Defeated**

The Eldorado Eagles broke a four-year jinx Friday night when they administered a 45-20 drubbing to the Ozona Lions in Ozona before a capacity crowd of fans. The game was a Schleicher county crowd pleaser all the way as game statistics show

First downs were 15 for Eldorado and 13 for Ozona with Eldorado tabbing 63 yards with forward passes, attempting three and completing three, while Ozona hurled seven and completed four for 65 ards. Yards rushing were 310 for Eldorado and 164 for Ozona. Total vardage gave Eldorado 373 to )zona's 229.

The Eagles' passing attack was spectacular. Captain John McGregor's first missile went to Ray Ballew for 16 yards and a first down. His second went to Larry Blair for 36 yards and the third was to Gary Whitten for 11.

The Eagles lost one fumble but recovered three Lion bobbles. Captain John McGregor averaged 37 yards each with three punts while Ozona averaged 33 yards with five.

#### Eldorado Gets 91st Stored Hospital

Eldorado has joined 90 other Texas cities and towns having "packaged" hospitals, ready for almost instant use following enemy action or a major natural disaster. Most of them are located at least 15 miles from assumed strategic target areas.

The hospitals, costing \$21,000 apiece, were provided by the fed-eral Office of Civil and Defense Mobilization as part of a nation-wide stockpile program. They are administered in Texas by the state Office and Defense and Disaster Relief, with technical cooperation from the Texas State Department of Health.

Outgrowths of the mobile army hospitals developed and tested during the Korean War, they can be completely installed by 40 or 50 people in four or five hours. In one test exercise an installation was made in 70 minutes by experienced personnel.

Local civil defense organizations in designated locations store and otherwise manage the hospitals and equipment. Emergency conditions such as the Cuban crisis are occas ions for making sure the hospiitals

are in a high state of readiness. Each unit—already crated for instant shipment into stricken areas, is a complete 200-bed affair with facilities for three operating rooms, a pharmacy, x-ray service clinical laboratory, sterilizing room and central supply room, and elec

trical power supply. Each hospital weighs 24,000 lbs. and contains 8,000 individual pieces of equipment, including a 1500gallon water tank and pump for emergency water supplies. There are also complete medical supplies, from surgical caps and gowns to ether and alcohol which are separately packaged and marked to avoid fire hazards.

Local civil defense authorities provide refrigeration for items such as insulin and blood derivities. Antibiotics and other materials with expiration dates are lab-eled "deteriorative" to indicate they must be periodically inspected and rotated.

State civil defense and health authorities estimate that emergency hospitals will have to provide at least half the total hospital beds following a major emergency, since most conventional hospitals are located in metropolitan centers which may be targets of enemy attack.

Doctors and nurses to staff emergency hospitals will be recruited from the community where the unit is installed for service, according to present planning.
