



**Ozona Roundly Defeated**

Whitten carried eight times for 50 yards.

Scoring was dramatic. In the first quarter, Gary Whitten scored on a 32-yard tour of Ozona vital territory. The Eagle kicking team, Tip Finley, Jackie Mackey, and Captain McGregor tabbed the extra point. Then McGregor utilized a long Eagle march downfield and drove over from the 2-yard line. This time the kicking team failed the test. In this quarter, Ozona's Leroy Cooper put lights worth six points on the Ozona side of the clock. The quarter ended 13-6 for the Eagles and that was all for the first period.

The second quarter saw the Eagles pummel the Lions unmercifully, unleashing an impressive display of fiery play. Captain John McGregor added piracy to his repertoire and captured an Ozona pass which should not have been thrown. He picked up some strong support and sailed some 20 yards for a touchdown. The kicking team added insult to injury and McGregor booted the ball between the goal posts for the extra point.

Then "Mauling" Mack McAngus crunched his way six to 12 yards at a time with a final two-yard lunge over the goal for another six points. Try for extra point failed this time.

Captain Lynn Meador then capitalized on the breach Captain Dennis Jurecek and associates opened in the Lions defense and sped 19 yards past despairing Lion backs to score. Again the kicking team failed the test.

The third quarter saw Ozona's Pete Montgomery score his only touchdown. But Captain Lynn Meador for the Eagles took the ensuing kickoff and by using some enthusiastic blocking by Jurecek and Company, he flashed back down the field for 70 yards to score his second touchdown of the night. The kicking team passed the test and the point was good.

The fourth quarter saw Ozona's Richard Vargas capitalize on Coach Earl Barnett's sending in many reserves and he scored Ozona's third touchdown of the game after stubborn Eagle resistance from a few yards out. The Eagles quickly retaliated and Captain McGregor climaxed the effort by driving over from two yards out for the final score. Mackey, Finley, and McGregor scored the extra point and the score was 45-20 for the Eagles.

Captain Dennis Jurecek and Big Jackie Mackey racked up 13 tackles each in bottling up the potent Lion offense—principally their stellar back, Pete Montgomery. Line backer Captain McGregor tabbed 15 stops for high honors in this department. Other Eagles recording 10 or more tackles were Clyde Thackerson with 12, Ray Ballew with 11, and George Draper and Jim O'Harrow with 10 each.

There were many brilliant bits of play. George Draper's driving headon tackles which not only stopped Lion ball carriers but forced them back up their own paths thrilled Eagle fans as did Larry Blair's fine catch-run of Mc-

Gregor's pass, Meador's all-the-way run back or a kickoff, McGregor's potent passing which caught the Lions flatfooted, "Mauling" Mack McAngus's developing power as a fullback, the way Jurecek and Company bottled up Lion Pete Montgomery, and on and on.

In fact, it was a fine night and troubles such as the breakdown of the band bus on the way over were mere trivialities in comparison to the pleasure of watching the Eagles administer a long overdue and shattering defeat to the Lions. Incidentally, it was the first time Captain Barnett's lads have defeated Ozona since he has been Eagle mentor.

The Eagles' fiery attack and fired up determination along with the solid fan support made the night one to remember.

Some business men have been contacted and others will be. We want to advertise Eldorado and Schleicher county.

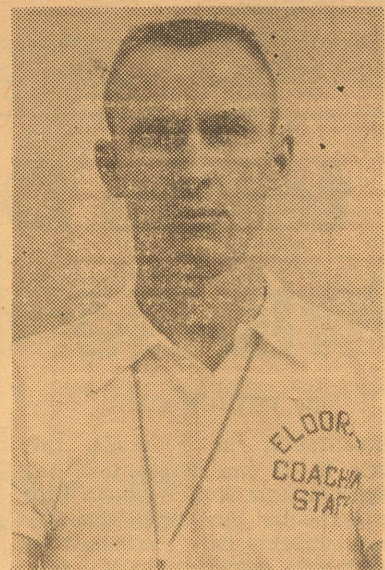

Austin.—Republicans have turned Texas into a two-party state.

The heavy vote for Jack Cox against John Connally, election of two members to the national House of Representatives and seven members to the Texas House, plus substantial Republican votes in nearly all areas, are being interpreted by many State Capitol observers as meaning that never again will the Democratic nomination be tantamount to election.

Dallas County elected every Republican candidate for county and legislative office they had on their ballot, and gave Cox a 25,000-vote lead over Connally. Tarrant and Harris were close. Bexar, El Paso, Travis and Nueces, the next four of the big counties, went Democratic.

Unofficial and incomplete returns indicate that Connally carried 204 counties and Cox carried 50. But it was the significant Cox votes in the 204 counties he lost which makes this election significant.

Connally is conferring with legislators and with state boards and commissions. He will not make complete budget recommendations, since outgoing Gov. Price Daniel is required, under the Constitution, to make budget recommendations to the Legislature in January.

But Connally will make his own budget proposals in his message to the Legislature.

Industrialization, tourism, higher education and water conservation are the areas of state activity which Connally stressed most in his campaign. He will propose the creation of a Bureau of Commerce to take over tourist and industry-attracting.

The new gov. with a 120,000-vote margin of victory under his belt, said he holds no ill will toward areas which voted against him, and he will be governor for Republicans as well as Democrats.

**Campaigns Too Long**

After the longest political campaign in Texas history there is a desire—on the part of many candidates, newspaper reporters who travel with the candidates, and the voting public—to return to the

shorter campaign periods.

The old late-in-July, late-in-August and early-in-November voting months were far less strenuous than the present early-in-May, early-in-June and early-in-November dates.

Campaigning in the heat of the summer now is very much preferred over the cold winter months and the long, tedious battle period that extends from December to November.

Don't be surprised if there is a big demand to return to the old election dates. They consumed only about 120 days, compared with this year's long, drawn-out, pace-killing, man-killing, more-than-300-day battle.

Governor-Elect John Connally has been quoted as saying he would favor moving the primary elections to August or September, as they are in most two-party states.

Under the present system the

various party organizations close shop during the summer. Then it becomes necessary to re-organize and re-vitalize each setup for the General Election campaign. Herebefore the momentum generated carried them through to the November election. They got it all done in one big swoop.

Another reason for reverting to the old dates is that the cost of maintaining a long campaign naturally is much greater than the expense involved in a short one.

**Employment Up**

Unemployment in the state dropped in September to its lowest level since October, 1959. September showed 155,400 unemployed, compared to 170,000 in August.

Employment increased from 3,471,300 hired workers to 3,472,800. Texas Employment Commission predicted an over-all gain in employment between September and

November, with a heavy concentration in nonfactory industries.

**Farm Income Down**

Between 1929 and 1961, farmers and farm laborers' incomes showed a percentage decrease of 12.8 per cent, according to the Bureau of Business Research.

Percentages are up in mining, contract construction, manufacturing and retail trade, but down in transportation, property income and proprietors' income.

**Tourist Traffic Rising**

Reports to the Texas Highway Department indicate tourist traffic into the state is on the rise. Travel promotion is credited with ending the five-year decline.

### County Extension News

W. G. Godwin, Co. Agent

The purpose of recreation is to have fun and relaxation. We are facing the greatest outdoor recreation that Schleicher county has to offer: hunting.

Safety is just as important in outdoor recreation as it is around the ranch or home. Keeping the commandments of safety will prevent accidents from marring your recreation.

The ten commandments of safety while hunting:

1. Treat every gun with the respect due a loaded gun. This is the cardinal rule of gun safety.
2. Guns carried into camp or home must always be unloaded, and taken down or have actions open; guns always should be encased until reaching shooting area.
3. Always be sure that the barrel and action are clear of obstructions.
4. Always carry your gun so that you can control the direction of the muzzle, even if you stumble. Keep the safety on until you are ready to shoot.
5. Be sure of your target before you pull the trigger.
6. Never point a gun at anything you do not want to shoot.
7. Unattended guns should be unloaded; guns and ammunition should be stored safely beyond the reach of children and careless adults.
8. Never climb a tree or a fence with a loaded gun.
9. Never shoot at a flat, hard surface or the surface of water.
10. Do not mix gunpowder and alcohol.

Officials last week announced a change in the sterile fly release pattern. The area that has been added is bordered on the north by a line running west along the Schleicher-Sutton county line, passing just south of Sheffield and continuing westward until it intersects with a line that comes north from the US-Mexico border and passes through Sanderson.

The number of flies to be dispersed in each part of the release area has been changed, to get the maximum value of sterile flies in all areas. The new area will get 600 flies per square mile per week, while the southern part of Texas will average 400 flies.

The number of flies to be released in each area will be determined largely by the number of samples sent to the Mission laboratory which are identified as screwworms. It is up to the ranchers of the county to check livestock regularly and send in samples, so that the proper number of flies will be released in their area.

It's easy to find what you are not looking for.

Edwin Cooper, wildlife specialist of the Texas Extension Service, after 2 years study of the white-tail deer situation, told 37 businessmen and ranchers last Thursday that a \$900,000 business is possible for Schleicher county from hunting. Mr. Cooper stated that three things are necessary: (1) the co-operation of businessmen, sportsmen and landowners, (2) the understanding and promotion, and (3) proper harvest. Of the three, most important is harvest. Game cannot be "stock-piled" but must be taken before becom-

ing too crowded. "Die-off" and disease always result in overcrowded conditions, resulting in loss of capital, recreation and meat. Both sexes must be taken to prevent over-crowding in areas where deer are multiplying rapidly.

Successful hunting! The quality of the meat depends upon how you handle from the time of kill until served upon the family table.

### Home Demonstration Agent's Column

Occasionally big companies send samples of products which will be on store shelves soon to Home Demonstration agents all over the United States.

Recently I've had advance trial packages of three dandy items. A most effective deodorizer and germicide has been put in a spray can by the Lysol company. A desperate friend called the other day to ask what might remove the odor of spilled milk in a car. This time the old adage was disregarded. This spilled milk was something to be cried over. The Lysol spray was used and there was considerable improvement. The next day the whole car got another shot—more improvement. The last report was that it worked. The children had pulled their heads back into the car while riding.

Armstrong Cork Company has developed a one step floor care liquid. It too, works beautifully. A floor is cleaned and polished in one operation. It is made especially for vinyl, linoleum, terrazo, sealed wood, asphalt tile, rubber tile and cork tile. The gloss is said not to yellow.

This product does not remove old wax but the company advises this method to take away ground in dirt, old wax and stains: Use ½ cup heavy duty detergent and ½ cup household ammonia in one gallon warm water. For really tough spots use a very fine steel wool for scrubbing. Rinse and let dry. Then use the one step material.

Campbell Soups have come up with something which was bound to come. The soup essence is packed, dry, in tiny aluminum cans two per box. The cans make four servings of very good soup and the

flavors will suit nearly everybody: onion, potato, vegetable, noodle, beef, mushroom and maybe one or two I've forgotten. The method of vacuum dehydration is new and the taste is a vast improvement on former products. Makes the grocery sack a lot lighter and I like that.

Watch for these three items; they will be available soon.

As a nation we don't eat enough meat. And that's bad. Meat furnishes protein and the body uses protein to build muscles and repair the wear and tear which everybody experiences.

People say that meat is too high to eat. Actually, meat is pretty well in line with other food prices. And every rancher at least, knows that steers are not all steak. In fact 1,000 pounds of beef on the hoof turns out to be 550 pounds of hide, waste, bone, fat, heart and liver. But back to the meat prices.

Try this once and see if it isn't maybe an answer to the high cost of meat:

#### Chuck Roast DeLuxe

Buy a four or five pound chuck roast. Place in a shallow container and pour over the meat this mixture:

½ cup salad oil mixed with ½ cup vinegar (any kind); one teaspoon salt, and pepper to taste. Let meat stand in refrigerator for 8 or 10 hours. Turn occasionally.

Place meat in low oven, 300 F. Leave in oil-vinegar mixture to roast and cook until tender, about 2½ or 3 hours. Adjust temperature to lower setting if the meat cooks too fast. Do not cover.

The oil adds fat, taste and color and the vinegar helps to tenderize the chuck by breaking down the connective tissue. Chuck roast usually sells for about 59c per pound as compared to 98c per pound for rump, standing rib or loin roast cuts. Try it; leave off any preconceived notion that it is not going

to be good and I believe that for 39 or 40c per pound you can grow to like a chuck roast deluxe.

For once, do what you were going to do for years. Start baking to freeze the holiday goodies.

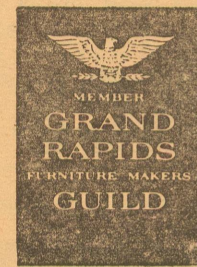
Yesterday I chanced upon a small box in the freezer which had in it, instead of pecans as marked, a square of fruit cake and a square of fudge from last Christmas. Both were delicious. It's not too early—in fact it's just the right time.

A fast little cake to be made for supper goes like this:

Sprinkle bottom of a greased 9-inch cake pan with 2 tablespoons sugar and 3 tablespoons chopped nuts. Pour on one cup caramel sauce made by heating 28 or 30 caramels in ½ cup water or milk. Place one can of biscuits, overlapping, on top of sauce to fill pan. Bake at 425 F. for 20 minutes.

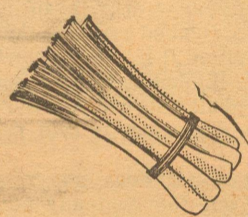
