#### Health Department **Urges Clean Community**

Every Texas family needs the assurance that it is living in a clean and healthy community, according to Dr. Henry A. Holle, Commissioner of Health. The family needs the assurance that when disease threatens, there will be a local health agency ready to combat it on a community wide basis. Texas now has 47 full time city and county health units covering 57 counties. These 57 counties have 62% of the state's population.

An adequately staffed and financed local health department provides six basic services to the citizens of the town or county. It keeps public health statistics, controls communicable diseases, motes maternal and child health, enforces environmental sanitation, operates a public health laboratory and works to educate the community for better health. Each local health department will of necessity differ from the others and the most effective public health program must be tailor made to fit the particular health needs and problems of its own community.

At present 197 counties in Texas do not have full time health protection. Dr. Holle has as one of his goals complete health protection in every county of the state. Some counties now have a large enough population to provide this service but for counties having sparse population, two or more could pool their resources and have the advantage of up to date public health

Dr. Holle points out that giving full time health service to the entire state will require a substantial increase in the expenditure of funds for public health purposes. In his opinion this is the best investment any community can make. Although great strides have been made in maternal and infant health and in disease prevention, Texans cannot be content with less than complete eradication of preventable deaths.

### Texas Sage Recommends Old Pioneer Beef Dish



J. Frank Dobie historian of Texas folk-lore says of "jerked" beef: "It has always seemed especially wholesome and is certainly nourishing.

"My way of cooking it is to chop it up and boil it with potatoes, plenty of onions and a few Mexican peppers. It makes a whole, satisfying and balanced meal."

"Jerked" beef, not to be confused with dried or corned beef, is a cured meat which is still very

a cured meat which is still very much in evidence around cow camps, even in this era of refrigertion. During round-up time, cow

meat supply.

To preserve freshly killed beef by the "jerking" technique, it is boned and stripped in one-half inch lengths, seasoned and stretched over wire or rope to dry in the sun. The sun-cooked beef, celled "inchy" keens indefinitely to some supply about one hour.

The House passed a Reserve training bill and a foreign aid measure last week before recessing for the July 4 week-end. The reserve bill had been bogged down because of an amendment offered several weeks ago to the original bill. The amendment offered by the negro Congressman from Harlem, which would have forcer desegregation of National Guard units, was tentatively adopted and that forced the bill to be pigeon-holed. In the meantime the President appealed to the colored member not to persist in his move; but the latter flushed with initial victory, said Eisenhower had bad advice and didn't know what he was talking about. The President had insisted that a civil rights amendment to the bill was "extraneous" and was the wrong time and place for that issue to be fought out. He said the move jeopardized national seems ity. Anyhow, the new attempt to wreck the National Guard, which except in time of national emergencies is under control of the respective Governors, failed when the Harlem member's new attempt was voted down this time by a two-to-one margin.





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
