The Eldorado School will open Tuesday, September 6, at 9:00 A.M. A program will be given in the auditorium and all parents and patrons are urged to attend. Details of the program will be given next week.

All beginning students (1st grade) will need birth certificates showing them to be six years of age before Sept. 1, 1955. Compulsory vaccination for smallpox and diphtheria is required of all beginning students in the first grade. No child will be admitted to the first grade who does not present evidence of having received these shots: a smallpox within the past four years, and diphtheria the last year and a half. First graders who participated and received these vaccinations in the pre-school clinic this summer will not need certificate stating thus.

DR. WM. LINDSEY SELLS TO PARTNER **EFFECTIVE AUG. 31**

In a deal which is being closed out this week, Dr. Wm. Lindsey has sold his partnership to Dr Jack I. Mowrey, to return to the Air Force, where he will start in October on a five-year course under the residency training program, specializing in aviation medicine.

He served five years in World War II as a pilot and came to Eldorado in July, 1952, to open his practice in the Roach building, upon completion of his interneship at San Antonio. Later, Dr. Jack 1 Mowrey came to Eldorado to form a partnership with Dr. Lindsey,

and the men now have their own clinic building. As his future five years are tentatively planned, Dr. Lindsey will go to Randolph Field in October, remaining there until Christmas, then will be assigned to an air base, after which he will go to Harvard or Johns Hopkins for a year's work leading to a Master's in public health work. A year at Randolph, where he will have work in advanced aviation medicine, a year at either Langley or Wright

Field in research study, and a final year at an air base will complete the five-year training period. He will enter this training next month with the rank of captain, and at the conclusion of his five preparatory years will be assigned to a base, with probable promotion

A&M Agricultural Experts Make Tour of Schleicher **County Irrigation Projects**

Under the sponsorship of County Agent W. G. Godwin, two agricultural experts from A&M made a tour of some of the new irrigation projects in Schleicher County Tuesday morning, and staged a public meeting Tuesday afternoon for all who were interested in this new undertaking.

M. K. Thornton, agricultural chemist and head of the Soils department of A&M, and Robert V. Thurmond, agricultural irrigation engineer, arrived in Eldorado Tuesday morning and joining with Mr. Godwin, headed a group that visited three of the irrigation projects. They went first to the Clyde Keeney farm near town, where they made observations of the large new tank which will become a part of the irrigation system soon to be established by Mr. Keeney. The Keeneys have the distinction of having the well with the largest potential production in the county up to this time. It was rated at 825 GPM when tested in mid-July. Pump and motor have been ordered, and the system will be put in operation some time during the fall.

The next stop was at the cotton farm of Mr. and Mrs. Leonard Lloyd in the Reynolds community. The new pump was put in operation for the group, and the visitors were given an opportunity to look over a large part of the 42 irrigated acres.

The next stop was at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Nick Jurecek, who are irrigating some 70 acres of fine-looking cotton. Mr. Jurecek has the distinction of being the first to grow irrigated cotton-having dug his well last year.

Spending the noon hour in town, the delegation returned to Jurecek's at 2:00 in the afternoon for a community-wide meeting for all interested in irrigation. Mr. Jurecek's hangar was used as the meeting placesome 35 or 40 neighbors and townspeople being in attendance-all of whom inspected the irrigation layout before the formal meeting began.

Mr. Thornton lectured on the subject of soils, and took his listeners through an hour's discussion on soil. water, fertilizer, etc., and their relation to irrigation.

Robert Thurmond talked on the technical aspects of irrigation, water wells, pumps, and motors, and brought out some of the problems that will confront the new irrigation farmer.

"When you get the water to the top of the ground, your problems are just starting," he warned; but he also pointed out that there is more interest in irrigation today than ever before.

He stressed the importance of each farmer having a carefully worked - out plan before going into irrigation. IRRIGATION NOTES

Some of the facts brought out by M. V. Thornton, Soil Chemist, in the meeting at the Jurecek farm on Tuesday were as follows:

1. That Schleicher County soils would do well under irrigation provided too much salts were not present in the water.

2. That the addition of nitrogen fertilizer and phosphorus would be profitable for irrigation if applied at the right time.

3. That soil analysis could be secured by sending to soil testing laboratory at A&M College, for \$1.

4. That a water analysis would be made by A&M college for \$3, although the actual cost is near \$20.

5. That a topographical map and a soil and water analysis should be secured before irrigation started.

Mr. Thornton discussed Schleicher County soils from a practicable standpoint from tillage, crop rotation, fertilizer and the many under irrigation; stating that all Conservation District. angles have to be controlled for successful irrigation.

2. That an irrigation well should not be pumped at full capacity but at the capacity without lowering the water level the maximum.

4. Pumps should be installed by companies that can guarantee maximum efficiency of 70% or better; otherwise the investment is large for a higher horsepower motor and the fuel bill larger.





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SECOND LOOK SUGGESTED FOR RANGE LANDS

College Station. A heavy growth of weeds is nature's way of conserving rangeland soils. By filling in bare areas caused by reduced grass cover brought on by the extended drouth, the weeds are the first plants to show up after rains, says Garlyn O. Hoffman, extension range specialist.

USDA Lists Undesirable protein content premium will ap-Wheat Varieties

College Station. A list of 23 wheat varieties designated as undesirable because of inferior milling or baking qualities has been released by the U.S. Department of Agriculture. Because of their undesirability, a discount of 20 cents a bushel in 1956 price-support rates will be made to discourage the planting of the listed varieties.

The varieties were designated by the Agricultural Research Service after consultation with state agricultural experiment station personnel, agronomists, cereal chemists and other qualified technicians on state and Federal staffs.

The price-supoprt regulations for 1956 will provide for producer certification, that is, the identification of the variety of wheat going under price support will be the

The 23 varieties listed accounted for only 31 million bushels of the 1954 production and 3.7% of the '54 wheat acreage. The varieties shown on the list included seven which are planted in Texas. All are hard red winter wheats and are Red Chief, Jed Jacket, Kanking, Chiefkan, Early Blackhull, New Chief and Yogo.

USDA officials state that this change in the price-support program for wheat is designed to encourage the production of more desirable varieties and lessen the possibility of U.S. wheat of inferior quality finding its way into domestic and export channels.

Strong backing, say the officials, has come from crop improvement associations.

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
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
