D. C. Hill, 92, retired merchant, prominent Baptist, and resident of the county since 1910, died Monday morning at the hospital of his son, Dr. Malone Hill at Alpine, after a long illness.

Funeral Wednesday

Funeral services were held at 3:00 Wednesday afternoon at the First Baptist Church, of which he was a member, the pastor, Rev. J. C. Hancock, officiating.

The organ prelude was Does Jesus Care, and the postlude, Amazing Grace and How Firm A Foundation. Lavelle Meckel sang a solo, When I Come To The End Of The Way, and the choir sang Abide With Me, Jesus Paid It All, and Shall We Gather At The River. Mrs. John Stigler was organist.

Scripture texts were read from a New Testament which was presented to D. C. Hill's father by the president of the Alabama senate on the date of D. C.'s birth during the days of the Confederacy.

Pall bearers, all of whom are deacons in the First Baptist Church, were Edgar Spencer, Jack Halbert, Sr., T. P. Robinson, Jr., Truett Stanford, Allen Kuyken-dall, George Cales, Perry Mittel, and W. T. Whitten. Interment was in the Eldorado cemetery with Ratliff in charge.

Daniel Chapman Hill was born November 5, 1862, in Jasper, Alabama, the son of Albert and Elizabeth Hill. At the time of his birth two of his brothers were serving with the Confederacy in the Civil

His father, an ordained minister served as a legislator in the Confederacy. After the war one of the older sons, who had been a captain, and a daughter, wife of a minister, moved to Texas, and were joined later by the parents and the other seven children. After the mother's death, the father returned to his old home where he died a few years later

Since the arrival of the family in Houston County, Texas, in 1876 all were closely identified with the life of the state, the father serving various Baptist churches, one of the sons working with an orphanage and others hold places of similar responsibility. D. C. was the last surviving member of the

He attended school at Pennington and received a diploma from Tyler Commercial College. On Alma Amerial Hill in Madison County.

His Various Interests

He operated general merchandise stores in Rogers Prairie and Santa Anna before moving with his family to Eldorado in 1910, where he opened a hardware store, operating it until his retirement in 1927 when he sold it to his son Ernest.

Upon his arrival here he bought a ranch, where the family lived two years, then they moved to Eldorado, purchasing their present residence from the Millard family, who had built it the preceding

Later he disposed of his ranch land, but retained ownership of some of his farm land. He was also director in the First National Bank many years. He was a faithful member of

the Baptist Church 74 years, had been a deacon since 1912 and chairman of the board of deacons many years, and taught a Men's Sunday School class 60 years. He was a Mason 50 years and

a member of the Eastern Star 45 Known as a "good family man" he was also well read, mainly in all phases of history. His outdoor nterest was his yard, especially

the pecans and apples which he had planted. Mr. Hill's death is the first in the family in 60 years.

New Park Superintendent



# In United States

Texans have been accused of using the word "biggest" too frequently or promiscuously. West Texans, however, use it proverbally, and they can back it up with facts about this land of spacious skies and distant horizons.

For instance, West Texas is the argest oil producing area in the United States, and biggest describes oil industry activity in this

The major geologic feature of this large producing area is the Permian Basin. Its easternmost major field is at Big Lake in Reagan County and its westrnmost Texas field at Mason, in Loving County. In between lie such fields as Upton, Church and Fields, Mc-Elroy, Hendricks, and Yates. The basin covers an area equal or greater than several individual states in the nation, and oilmen have found no end to the oil pro-

duction possibilities of the area. In 1953, the area in Texas alone produced about 389,000,000 barrels of crude; as of the first of 1954, its reserve amounted to more than 20 per cent of that of the United

Other highlights of the oil industry's activities during 1953 include the opening of two big pipe line systems out of West Texas. One of these is the Gulf Pipe Line Company's 466-mile crude trunk line from Colorado City, West Texas, to Sour Lake in the Gulf Coast The unit is considered the largest crude oil pipe line in North America. The Rancho Pipe Line System dedicated its 457-mile crude oil line running from McCamey, West Texas, to the Houston refining area in April, 1953.

Operators began in March, 1953, Kelly - Snyder - and Diamond M Fields of Scurry County. This unit operation is the world's largest of its kind-covering 47,000 producing acres. The Scurry Area Canyon Reef Operators Committee escimate an additional recovery of 720,000,000 barrels of oil will re-
