A program that had been arranged with sheep and goat men of the industry and co-ordinated by the local Sheep and Goat Improvement committee, did not receive co-operation from the weatherman here last Saturday. Efforts are being made to have lesser demonstrations in different parts of the county. These will be announced later.

The preparation of wool for market is a phase of sheep production often neglected. Many ranchers excel in all other phases of ranching but fail to put their clip up in an attractive manner.

Preparing wool for market be gins with a breeding program. A sheep cannot exceed its inherited ability to produce wool, even with superior feed and management.

A rancher should select his sheep for uniformity of fineness and length, maintaining his size. Ranchers should contact their shearing capitans and explain how they want their wool prepared. They should explain in detail and not leave it up to the capitan, and should be able to demonstrate certain steps. The fleece should be rolled with the flesh side out. The pick-up boy should start at the neck and keep folding the belly and back wool under and rolling it towards him-self. When the fleece has been rolled in this manner the britch wool comes up last and permits removal of tags or coarse portions. If the fleece has been properly rolled, the side wool, which represents the largest part of the fleece, will be exposed for buyer examination. This method is the most practical and permits the 'pick-up boy" to start rolling the fleece before the shearer has finished. The buyer wants to see the largest and best part of the fleece -he knows the belly and leg wool is present.

The fleece is laid on the tying board for tying. The twine should be placed under the fleece from corner to corner, crossed, and then include the other corners and tied only moderately tight.

If a loaf or patty is your usual way of serving ground meat, here's an idea to put to immediate use. Shape the meat around wooden skewers to resemble drumsticks and, after baking, add decentive paper frills

The drumsticks are seasoned in the Swedish manner with nutmeg and paprika. To follow the Swedish theme, round out the menu with tangy beer, whole boiled potatoes, buttered beets and a relish tray of dill pickle strips and black olives.

Ground Meat Drumsticks

1½ pounds ground veal ½ pound ground fresh pork 1½ teaspoons salt

1/8 teaspoon pepper 1/2 teaspoon paprika 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg

1 egg, beaten
2 tablespoons water
1 cup dry bread crumbs
(about)

Combine veal, pork, salt, pepper, paprika and nutmeg. Mix lightly. Divide mixture into 8 portions and form into the shape of chicken drumsticks. Insert a wooden skewer into the narrow end of each. Combine beaten egg and water. Dip drumsticks in egg mixture, then in bread crumbs. Place on a cooky sheet and bake in a moderate oven, 350 degrees, 30 minutes. Makes 8 servings




