Seventeen of the school's typewriters and one electric adding machine were stolen here on the night of Sept. 20, meeting.

Local law enforcement officers broadcast the loss and on Monday Sheriff Sweatt received word from Eastland that Rodgers had been picked up and some of the machines located. On Tuesday further information came that all the machines had been found-5 in Oklahoma City and the remainder in Dallas.

Sheriff Sweatt was told that all of the stolen goods would be assembled in Eastland, where he would be able to pick them up in a few days.

These are FM Road 1962, starting at the Sutton County line and running northeast to the end of FM 864 at the Menard County line, a distance of nine miles; and U S Highway 277 three miles south of Eldorado west a distance of eight

Surveyors have been at work on the Bailey Ranch road, and will lay out several possible routes before final selection is made. Both projects may be under way at the same time.

Insurance Overcharges Hit

A Texas Insurance Commission report claiming "millions of dollars" in excess charges collected by a New York automobile insurance company may touch off a nationwide investigation.

Commr. J. Byron Saunders reported Texas' findings at a zone meeting of insurance commissioners from six states. All indicated they would start inquiries.

Service Fire Insurance Company of New York overcharged, Saunders said, by putting policy holders in a higher bracket than necessary. He reported that so far the company had refunded \$89,000 on the policies checked by the commission.

Attorneys for the company said that if there were excess insurance charges, they were offset by an undercharge on financing.

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

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
