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

Almost two-thirds of all the oil thus far brought from the ground has been produced in the United States. Texans can proudly say that their state has been the largest oil-producing state since 1928.

The oil industry consists of over 200,000 oil businesses engaged in production, refining, transportation, and marketing of its prosizes, from small to large. An overwhelming majority engage in only one or another of the industry's main functions.

There are thousands of independent jobbers and wholesalers in the industry. They are marketers who buy their products from refining companies in bulk lots. They maintain their own storage tanks and warehouses and usually operate a fleet of tank trucks for making deliveries to retail dealers and commercial customers. About 95% of service stations are operated by independent businessmen.

The oil industry is one of the largest and most important factors in our economy. It is exceeded only by investments in farms, in railroads, and in electric and gas utility companies.

Today almost two million Americans are employed in the oil business. They are among the highest paid employees of any American industry. These employees enjoy such benefits as paid vacations, retirement, insurance and savings plans, and sickness benefits. The oil industry affords a greater overall job security than does any oth-

The industry is a large source of government revenue. Almost all petroleum products are taxed. These taxes include federal, state, and local taxes on gasoline. Much of this money is used to finance the nation's schools and highways.

In every community where the oil industry is active there are large numbers of employees of the industry who take an active part in the affairs of the community. In every city and town there are service station operators who are among the more arduous citizens of our great country.

Since the first well was drilled in 1859, thousands of ways have been found to make oil serve human beings. The invention of the automobile brought an increasing demand for gasoline and lubricating oil. This led the petroleum chemists and technologists to devise an improved process of refining crude oil. The products that resulted from these improvements include aviation and automotive gasolines, kerosenes, napthas, fuel oils, lubricants, asphalt, waxes, road oils, printers' inks, detergents, medicinal oils, bases for cosmetics, synthetic rubber, electrical insulating oils, plastics, and numerous others.

The oil industry provides products that enlarge our activities and improve our standard of living in countless different ways. Indeed, without oil, modern civilization as we know it could not exist. The oil industry is truly a friend and citizen.
