A large and appreciative crowd of men from the various churches of the town heard an address delivered Monday night in the Presbyterian church by Andrew Edington, president of Schreiner Institute at Kerrville. The address was preceded by a barbecue in the church basement served by Presbyterian Men.

"Texas Presbyterians Together for Christ" was mentioned by Dr. Edington as a great Christian work, but that the fact that \$51/2 million would be raised was secondary to the "togetherness" the members would experience.

He cited as being wrong the common belief that Christian education takes place only in the church school. All educational processes contribute, he pointed out, adding that one of the greatest dangers lies in loss of Christian teachers.
