

"But, technology has its limits. In the end, you still have to cover the news and get it down on paper," Mankin continued.

Mankin expressed his appreciation to the Success' loyal readers and advertisers. "We couldn't do what we do if it weren't for all the support we get. In a way, it is our readers and advertisers who have won today."

Founded by R.L. Carruthers in 1901, the Success is the oldest business in Schleicher County. The next publisher of the Success was A.T. Wright, early day pioneer of the county. Wright, and his family controlled the paper until the 1940's. In 1945 Fred Gunstead purchased the newspaper from W. Irl Breedlove. Gunstead published the Success until 1977. In the ensuing years, the Success has had a number of owners. On April 29, 1994, Randy and Kathy Mankin purchased the newspaper and are currently in their sixth year as owners.
