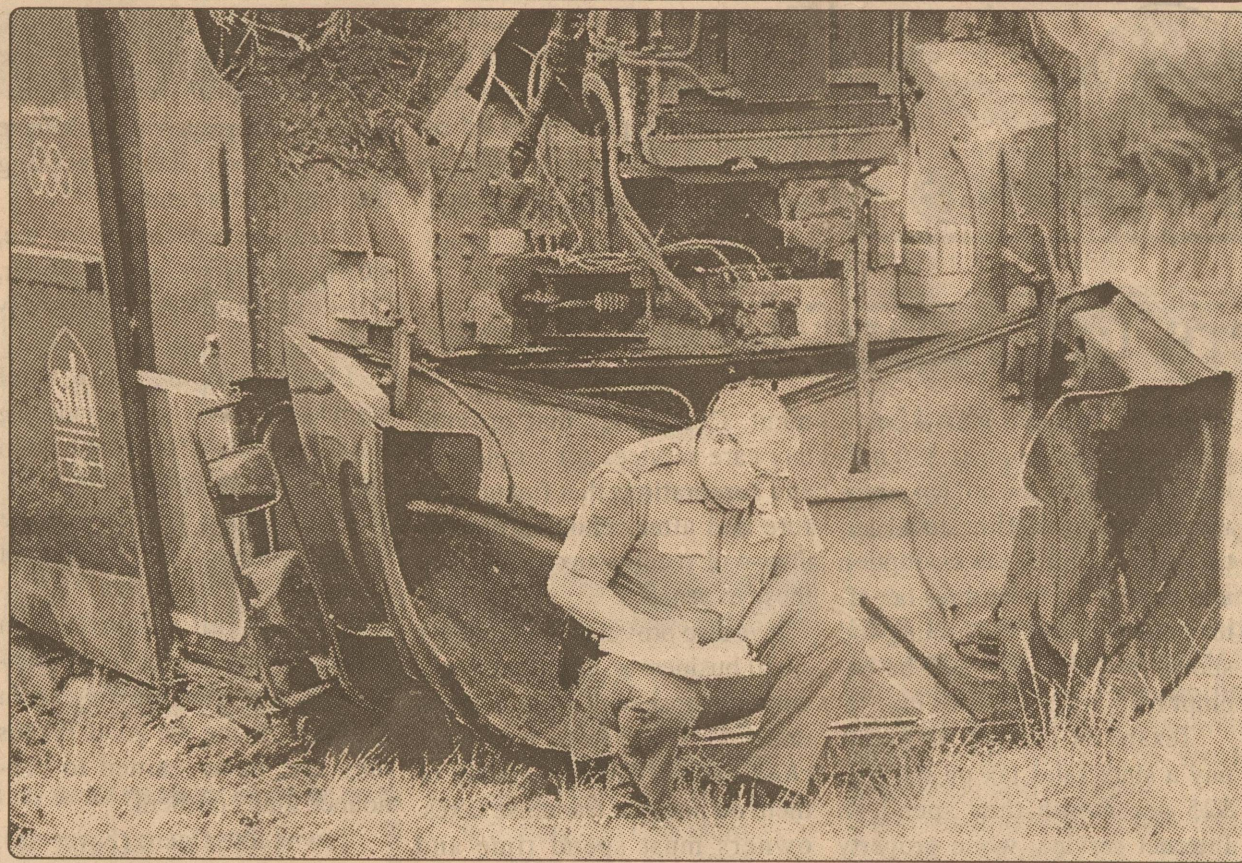

Eldorado Success wins Sweepstakes Award at Texas Press Association's summer convention

The Eldorado Success received six awards at the Texas Press Association (TPA) convention in Galveston on Saturday, June 19th, including the prestigious Sweepstakes Award, the highest honor given by the state association in the field of journalism. The Success claimed 1st Place Awards in the Column Writing, Page Design and General Excellence categories. Also, 2nd Place awards in Photography and Editorial Writing. The awards were presented in conjunction with the TPA's annual "Better Newspaper Contest".

In all, nine newspapers from across the state, ranging from large daily papers to the smallest weeklies were singled out for Sweepstakes Awards in their circulation divisions. The newspapers were judged by members of the Tennessee Press Association with the points accumulated in individual categories being used to determine the Sweepstakes winners. Joining the Eldorado Success on the award

stand were: the San Antonio Express-News; the Beaumont Enterprise; the Texas City Sun; the Hood County News; the Rockwall Texas Success; the Park Cities People; the News & Times of Grapevine, Colleyville & Southlake; and the Community News of Aledo. Each of the nine newspapers received a plaque bearing a laser-engraved likeness of their newspaper's front page.

Randy and Kathy Mankin attended the convention and were on hand to accept the awards. Presenting the plaques on behalf of the TPA was Phil Major, publisher of the Clay County Leader, chairman of this year's contest.

"The Eldorado Success has truly become one of the best newspapers in the state," Major said. "Randy and Kathy Mankin have made great strides in improving the Success. Eldorado can be proud of its hometown newspaper."

When asked about the awards after the ceremony, Randy Mankin

commented, "I am delighted about this, of course. But I am especially happy that Kathy's photography was recognized. We've both worked hard to make the Success a strong visual newspaper...good photos are essential to that. Her work directly impacted the page design and general excellence awards."

The Mankins purchased The Eldorado Success in 1995. Since that time they have redesigned the newspaper's layout and upgraded computer equipment to keep up with the times.

"We did not have backgrounds in journalism when we bought the newspaper," Mankin stated. "I've often told people that it made for a very steep learning curve."

Mankin noted that being new to the business also has its benefits. "We're not married to the old way of doing things," he stated. Mankin said that while some newspapers have been hesitant to make use of new technology, the Success has

City Council appoints Sudduth to fill open seat

By a unanimous vote, the Eldorado City Council voted Monday evening, June 21st, to appoint Toni Sudduth to fill a vacant seat on the council in Ward #2. The seat became vacant when council member Robert Bybee moved his home to Ward #1. Bybee stood for election in his new ward and was returned to the council by the voters. Bybee then resigned his old seat which has remained vacant until now.

Contacted by the Success for comment, Sudduth said she planned to serve the citizens of Ward #2 to the best of her ability. Sudduth said she hoped her skills as a good listener would serve her well on the council.

Sudduth is a graduate of Marfa High School. She attended Angelo State University where she studied chemistry and mathematics. In 1983, she married William "Rabbit" Sudduth. They moved to Eldorado in 1991. Together they have two children, a son, Dest, 15 and a daughter, Ridge Ann, age 11. Sudduth is employed by First National Bank of Eldorado.

Present for the meeting were council members Tommy Minor, Sherry Lux, Robert Bybee, Richard Mendez and Eddie Rodriguez. Mayor John Nikolauk was absent and Tommy Minor, the council's Mayor Pro Tem presided in his absence.

In other business, the council amended the city's budget to make

\$25,000.00 available to repair two of the city's water pumps. They also voted to contract with Divide Enterprises to haul 2,250 yards of caliche to street repair jobs on East Street and on West Fields Street. Divide's bid of \$5.50 per yard was lower than two other bids the city

had received, including a bid of \$6.00 per yard from Schleicher County.

It was noted that work on West Fields Street, near the school administration building is progressing, while work on East Street is due to begin soon. The council asked it's engineer to amend the plans to the East Street job to reflect the fact that the city will provide caliche for the project. Seidel Construction was awarded the contract to perform the work.

In other business the council voted to pay half of a \$1,300.87 assessment for participation in the "Port-to-Plains" coalition. That group is attempting to convince state and federal officials to link Del Rio, San Angelo, Lubbock, Amarillo and Denver with a 4-lane highway. Eldorado would be included in that route, it was explained. It was also noted that Schleicher County is paying the other half of the \$1,300.87 assessment.

Hospital to move ahead with asbestos abatement

The Schleicher County Hospital District board of trustees met Monday evening, June 21st and voted to proceed with removal of asbestos from the local hospital. An motion offered by Randy Mankin to perform only the work necessary to satisfy a "life-safety code deficiency" and maintain the remaining asbestos in place, failed on a 6-1 vote. Mankin had expressed his concern that the proposed full-blown abatement project couldn't be completed within the budget outlined by the

district's architect and asbestos consultant.

A second motion offered by Brian Edmiston to proceed with removing asbestos from the hospital then passed on a unanimous vote.

Work on the abatement project is slated to begin very soon. In fact, the hospital's emergency room has already been moved to the east end of the hospital wing. Administrator Ann Fagan-Cook said the E.R. had been moved a bit early to al-

Chales James (Vilha) Wilha

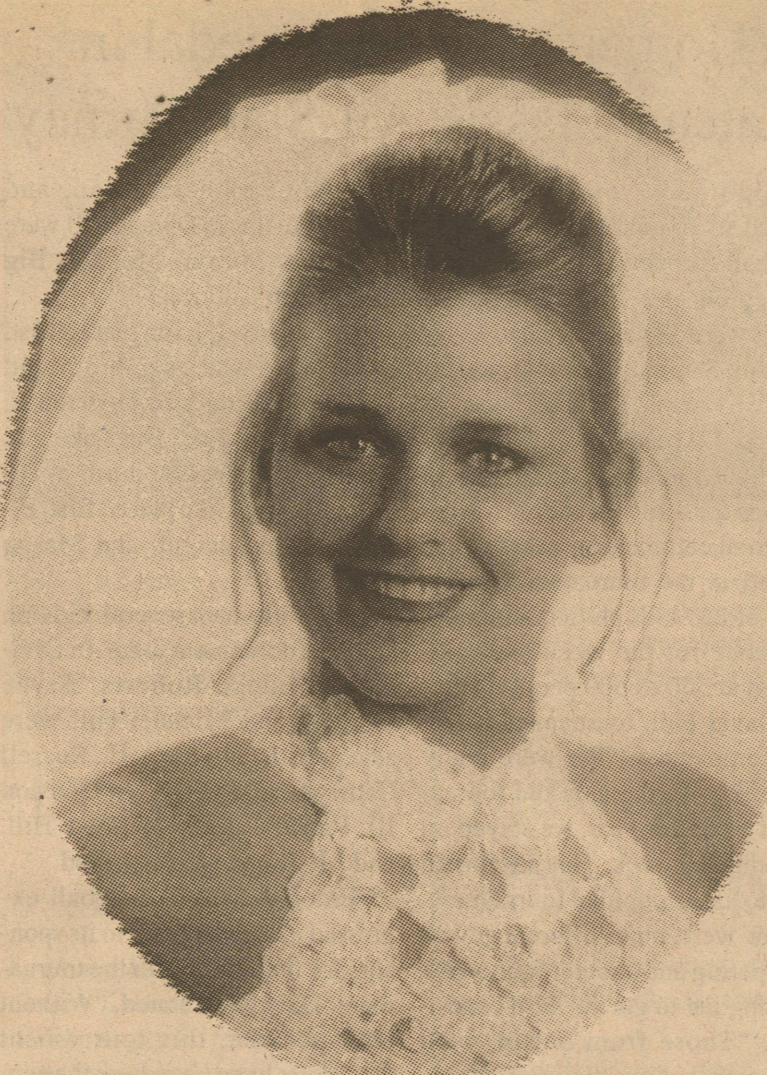

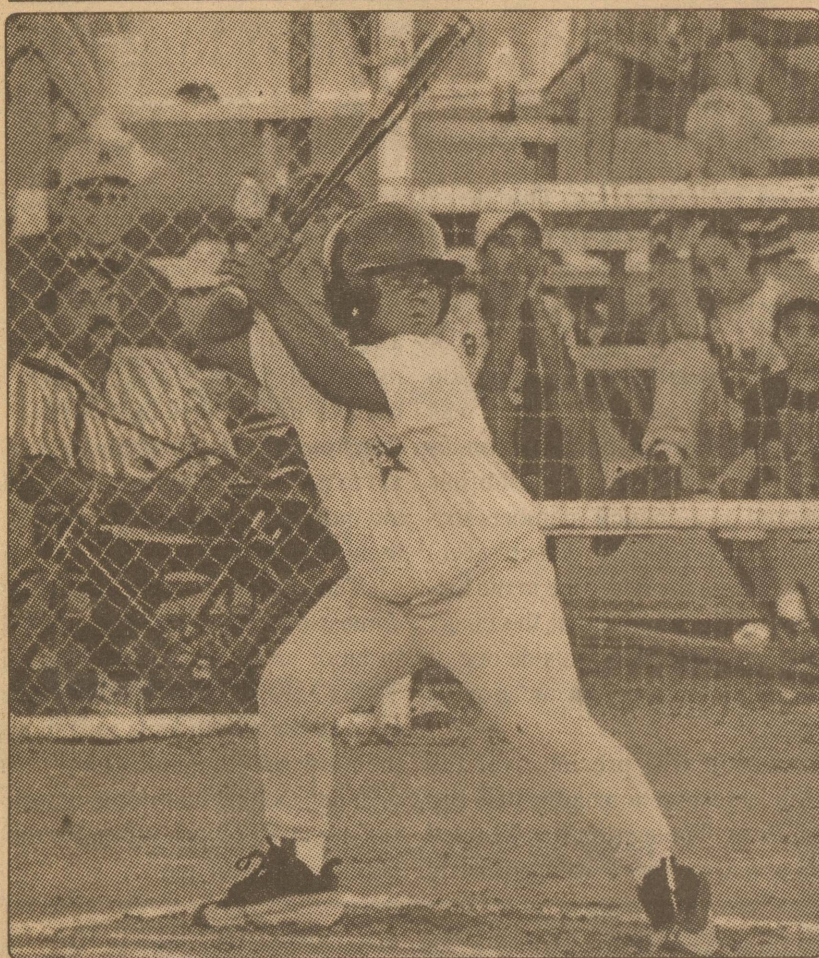


