

some of the outstanding men of man. the Confederacy. Among these is the old home of Joseph D. Sayers who served Texas as governor from 1899 to 1903 and is considered by most to be Bastrop's most distinguished citizen both from a military and political

liewpoint. Sayers enlisted as a private in the Fifth Texas Mounted Volunteers commanded in 1861 by Col. Thomas Green. He was appointed first lieutenant in September of 1861 and participated in the Battle of Val Verde in February of 1862. Because of his bravery during the battle, Sayers was promoted to captain and appointed commander of a new battery of field artillery to be armed with the cannon cap-

tured from the Yankees. The unit became known as the Val Verde Battery and later, during the Red River Campaign in Louisiana, the unit achieved great fame and notoriety as one of the best in the Confederate army.

Sayers was promoted to major in 1864 and that same year became a member of the staff of Gen. Richard Taylor, the Confederate son of former president Zachary Taylor. Twice wounded, once during the Battle of Mansfield, Louisiana, Sayers returned to Bastrop after the war and served as state senator, lieutenant governor, United States Congressman, and finally as

governor. He died in 1929 and is buried in the Sayers Family cemetery at Fairview, near Bastrop. His old home is now owned by W. S. Millington of Bastrop.





SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 19 proposing an amendment to Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas to add a new Section to be known as Section 1-A which permits the Legislature to delegate certain zoning powers to the governing body of any county bordering on the Gulf of Mexico or the tidewater limits thereof.

shall not be invalid by reason of its anticipatory character."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the Girst Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1962, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"Section 1. That Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section, immediately following Section 1, to be known as Section 1-A which shall read as follows:

"Section 1-A. The Legislature may authorize the governing body of any county bordering on the Gulf of Mexico or the tidewater limits thereof to regulate and restrict the speed, parking and travel of motor vehicles on beaches available to the public by virtue of public right and the littering of such beaches.

"Nothing in this amendment shall increase the rights of any riparian or littoral landowner with regard to beaches available to the public by virtue of public right or submerged lands.


