60 Attend Safety Meeting Of Service Pipe Line Last Week

Hall Hagler, area foreman for Service Pipe Line and his Eldorado crew were hosts at a district safety meeting of Service Pipe Line employees here last Wednesday night. There were 60 present for the affair and those from out-of-town included C. E. Wilson, division manager and his wife from Lubbock; V. T. Tracy, district superintendent from Snyder; W. A. Colvin, division industrial relations supervisor from Lubbock; and Holley Bradley, safety supervisor from Tulsa, Okla.

The meeting opened at 7:00 p. m., with a barbecue at the Memorial building, followed by introductory remarks by Mr. Tracy and Mr. Colvin. Holley Bradley was the principal speaker and gave an interesting discussion and demonstration of safe driving practices. The Service Pipe Line moved their area offices to down-town Eldorado in February and now occupy quarters formerly used by Wm. Cameron Lumber Co.

The Eldorado establishment is a terminal point for products coming from Huldale and Snyder production and delivered to the Ranch system locally. Their station building is located on the west side of the acreage occupied by Ranch Pipe Line, two miles south of Eldorado.

Hall Hagler is area foreman, E. E. Thompson is connection foreman, and Bill Barr is crew clerk. There are 16 men employed with the company who live here with their families.

Mr. Hagler left Monday morning for Tulsa, Okla., where he is attending a company management conference this week.

Accident Information Is Reported For County

The Texas Department of Public Safety reports that as of March 1, 1958, there have been 218 fatal accidents in Texas claiming the lives of 267 people. This is a decrease of 16% compared to the 319 lives lost for the same period in 1957.

Lt. Watson Howell of the Texas Highway Patrol in San Angelo reports the following accident information for the rural highways of Schleicher and Sutton counties:

Schleicher county, two accidents resulting in the injury of two people and a property damage of \$800, for the month of February. A total of three accidents resulting in the injury of two people and a total property damage of \$1,400 for the year.

Sutton county, one accident resulting in the injury of two people and a property damage of \$1,200, for the month of February. A total of five accidents resulting in the injury of three people, and a total property damage of \$3,700 for the year.

Sales of License Tags Lagging In County

A report from the Sheriff's office shows only 423 license plates sold for all types of vehicles thru last Friday. This is about 200 short of the number sold this time last year. With 1902 tags sold last year, and registrations going so slow now with just two weeks left, every one is urged to get their new tags at once and avoid the last-minute rush.

There is a 10% increase in price of tags this year and the deadline for getting them on your car is April 1st.

Every family in Eldorado is being mailed a religious census blank this week. It will greatly speed up the taking of the census if every family will fill out this blank and pin it to the front door of the house by 1:30 p.m. Sunday. Then when the census taker comes by, he can merely pick up the filled-in blank without disturbing the family.

Workers from all the churches in Eldorado will meet at the First Baptist church at 1:30 to receive instructions and assignments.

The South Huldale field gained its third producer and a location north extension with the completion of Tucker Drilling Co. of San Angelo No. 1 Willie Tisdale. It was finished for a daily flowing potential of 118.88 barrels of 40.2 gravity oil, no water, with gas-oil ratio of 450-1. Production was through a 16/64-inch choke and perforations between 5,719-726 feet which had been washed with 500 gallons of mud acid.

A new location was staked Tuesday afternoon on the Mittel estate in the Neva West field by Pan-American Petroleum Co. Correct designation of the location is unavailable as we go to press.

Miami Petroleum Co. Q- No. 1 Glass was drilling at 4300 feet in lime and shale. A Miami rig has the drilling job.

El Paso Natural Gas Co. No. 1 Treadwell is drilling at 4,925 feet in the Ellenburger. On a drill stem test at 4,300 feet, recovery was 7,600,000 cubic feet of gas with a spray of distillate. Another drill stem test at 4,366-4,496 showed recovery of 370 feet of heavily oil and gas-cut mud. Pico Drilling Co. of Breckenridge has the drilling contract.

Roads and location for El Paso Natural Gas Co. No. 1 Sheen have been built and drilling is scheduled to start immediately. Pico Drilling Co. has the contract.

Standard Oil Co. of Texas 3-5 Wilson in the Neva West field is drilling at 6,163 feet in lime and shale. Tucker Drilling Co. of San Angelo has the drilling contract.

Honolulu No. 1 Hartgraves just south of the Schleicher county line in Sutton county was plugged and abandoned.

Liedtke & Liedtke No. 1 Thomerson set pipe and perforated between 5252-55 feet. After a squeeze job production was found between 5,238-42 feet where it was perforated and washed with acid. Wednesday the well was flowing pipe line oil with no water. No gauges are available, but potential will probably be taken today (Thursday).

Canoe Trip Beckons Three Explorer Scouts

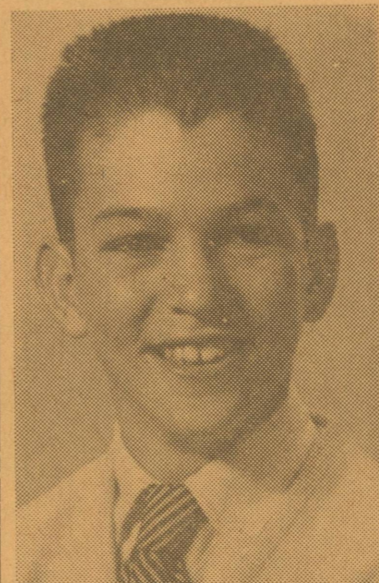

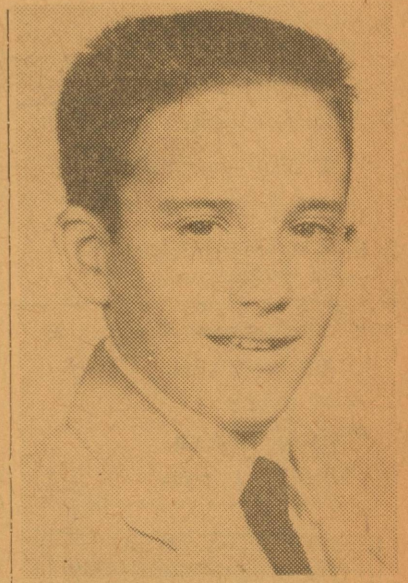
The three are members of the Explorer Scout crew in Troop 18. The Scout troop has been sponsored here for many years by the Lions club.

Leaders of the trip this summer have been announced as Ralph P. Mayer of Sonora, John Slover of San Angelo, and Herbert Fields of Sonora.

While canoe trips have been held by the Concho Valley council the past two years, this will be the first at which Explorer Scouting from Eldorado has been represented.

The contingent of Scouts will leave on an air conditioned bus from Camp Sol Mayer on the morning of August 7, will stay overnight at Vance AFB the first night,

at Offutt AFB the second night, at Minneapolis Municipal Air Port the third night and will arrive at Ely, Minnesota at about noon on August 10.

After checking in at the Charles L. Sommers Canoe Base, which is operated by Region 10 of the Boy Scouts of America, the group will spend 10 adventurous and exciting days camping in the wilds of Canada.

They will start back on their same bus on August 20, following the same route, and will arrive

back at Camp Sol Mayer on the afternoon of August 23.

The \$150 fee assessed each Explorer Scout going on the trip includes the fee at the Canoe base, as well as cost of transportation to and from Minnesota. Included in the camp fee is the use of tents, groundcloths, packsacks, canoes, paddles, cooking gear and all food, and the services of a guide from the time of arrival at the base until departure for home. At the base camp, tents and cots are provided and meals are taken in the lodge dining room.

Yesteryear In Eldorado . . .

Early Resident, Mrs. Whitten Died 50 Years Ago Today

(Ed. Note: Fifty years ago today, on March 13, 1908, death came to an early resident of the county, Mrs. Sara Katherine Whitten. She was born in Fannin County, Texas, while Texas was still a republic. A son, the late J. A. Whitten, was a long-time county judge here and many other descendants of Mrs. Whitten still live in Schleicher county.)

PASSED BEYOND (From the Success, March 20, 1908)

Mrs. Sara Katherine Whitten was born in Fannin county, June 4, 1840, was married to J. A. Whitten when 18 years of age, in Fannin county 1858, died at Eldorado, Schleicher County, Texas, March 13, 1908.

"Smooth the locks of silvery hair, On our mother's brow with tenderest care Gather the robe in final fold Around the form so still and cold; Lay on her bosom, pure as snow, The fairest, sweetest flowers that grow, Kiss her and leave her our hearts' delight."

Her pain is over, she sleeps tonight. Grandma Whitten, as she is known by her many friends, has lived in the West and frontier country all of her early life, and part of the time she was as far as 150 miles from any organized county. She was shut up in her home for over two days at a time, and could not get out on account of the Indians. She holds Indian claim for several thousand dollars; this is for stock driven off and stolen by the Indians. Part of these claims have already been approved. At the age of 16 she gave her heart to God; her maiden name was Young. Two years later she was married to J. A. Whitten and to this union there were born four children of whom

two survive her: a daughter, Mrs. M. A. Ray, N. M., and Judge J. A. Whitten of our city. Her husband died in 1868, ten years after their marriage and left her with four children to battle through life with, and with God's assistance she reached the goal. In 1889 her son J. A. Whitten was married and with him she has lived ever since. After a long, busy and useful life she died as she had lived—honored, trusted and loved. She reared her own monument while she lived in the hearts of all who knew her. Her life was completed if work all done and well done constitutes completion. Her Christian life was beautiful from its beginning to its close, and through all the vicissitude and sorrows that she met in the way, her faith in God never wavered. But she has left us and today the flowers grow around another grave that hides from our sight all that is mortal of a true and noble woman. Funeral services were held at the Baptist church at 3 o'clock Saturday by Rev. J. M. Earls. Her remains were followed to the city cemetery by her many friends and was a large procession.

The Success with many others extends condolence to the surviving relatives and can only say

"But now she sleeps where the daisies nod, And the clover hangs its head, Where the wild birds come and the wild bees hum, Above her lonely bed, She fought the fight, she kept the faith, Her fame shines bright and clear, Which will hold it ever dear."

COUNTY AGENT'S COLUMN

Schleicher County Agricultural Agent

At the Balmorhea Agricultural Experiment field day, March 4, were found prominent Schleicher county Hereford breeders, Martin and Martin in the spotlight.

Martin and Martin had six Hereford bulls entered in the improvement through selection of performance tested and progeny-tested breeding stock on feed at Balmorhea in cooperating with the Texas Agricultural Experiment station and the Agricultural Research, USDA.

Mischief Return 14 owned by Martin and Martin sired the top bull of the performance testing. This bull was 334 days of age at the finish of test gaining a total of 432 pounds with a gain ratio of 129 and an average daily gain of 3.1 pounds daily. His conformation graded 53 at the start and a choice 70 at the finish of the performance.

Martin and Martin had a bull, Colorado Real Prince, whose son placed 6th in performance testing and a pen of four bulls placing 4th overall with an average daily gain of 2.6 pounds per day. The gain ratio was 106.

All bulls were fed the same ration, 15% corn, 15% ground alfalfa meal, 70% ground hegar bundles.

The purpose of these tests is to identify and evaluate the higher gaining individuals and blood lines. Gaining ability has been found to be highly heritable and independent of conformation; thus, ability to gain is another important tool to be used in selecting quality beef cattle.

The vaccination of ewes before lambing for enero-toxemia is gaining favor within the county. The vaccine administered to the ewe some 30 days before lambing makes the lamb immune from the so called "milk colic" which is also known as "over eating." The lamb receives its immunity from the mother's milk.

Lambs are born with the germ in the intestines and when the situation is favorable the germ becomes active in the digestive system causing inflammation and "rottening" of the intestine. The germ is activated when the ewe is giving the most milk and feed is plentiful. This is the general situation. This condition can and did exist during the drouth, so there is no "rule of thumb" to follow on "milk colic" on lambs or other age sheep. Sheep of all ages are subject to enero-toxemia.

For many years, before vaccine and the cause was traced, this was called "feed lot disease."

Generally speaking the loss runs from a few head to 10-15% of the total lamb crop or lambs on feed.

In case ranchers have not vaccinated the lambs or ewes and do not intend to, changing the ewes from one pasture to another, or marking at this critical time, or penning the ewes and lambs at night proves effective. What is happening, the lambs are being withheld from milk and grazing. This gives the germ in the intestine less chance to become active.

Vaccine is available from local merchants. How active enero-toxemia in lambs will be this spring—would be a guess.

Dry land farmers have an excellent chance to increase crop yields this year by using commercial fertilizers. We know that moisture is the first requirement for the application of commercial fertilizers. We have an abundance of moisture that will be sufficient for applying commercial fertilizer. The fertilizer will not be lost this year—cause when moisture is available the fertilizer will be stored in the soil until used by the plant. There is no chance of "burning" the plant if proper recommendations are followed.

This is the year for application of commercial fertilizers. Get in touch with your fertilizer dealer or your county agent.

There are five ways to apply commercial fertilizers. Broadcasting, side dressing, dissolving in water, applying at the time of planting and applying at the time of land preparation.

Applications for 1957 wool incentive must be filed with your county ASC office by April 30, 1958. The wool marketing year ends March 31.

Lambs that have been sold should be turned in at the same time. You will need your weight certificates to support your claim on lambs.

A fishing partner tells me about a fellow going fishing down east, without any bait, but happened upon a snake with a small frog in

its mouth. He put a foot on the snake's neck and attempted to pull the frog out so he could use it for bait. The snake wouldn't let go.

In desperation, our fisherman pulled a bottle of whiskey and poured some down the snake's throat and finally got the frog loose. Later, as he sat by the side of the creek fishing, he felt a soft tapping on his leg. Looking down he saw the snake weaving gently back and forth—and holding another frog in its mouth.

With the coming of spring, many grasses and other plants will appear in pastures over the county not common. Some of these plants in your pasture may be poisonous, but in most instances not dangerous.

You may also be wondering just what plants are poisonous in this particular area, besides bitterweed. There is a leaflet listing all major poisonous range plants known in this area. You can get this leaflet at your county agent's office.

You're never too old to learn but you do get more selective about what's worth learning.

TRAPPER HIRED

Coke County has hired a government trapper in an effort to stop the increase of predatory animals which are causing wide damage to sheep, goats and poultry.

Final action on the matter was taken at a Commissioners Court session Monday when a delegation of thirty ranchers met with county officials. The county agreed to pay \$100 per month toward the trapper's salary and an equal amount will be made up by ranchmen. His additional pay comes from state and federal funds.—The Bronte Enterprise.

COKE HAS SURPLUS

Coke county wound up the year of 1957 with a cash balance on hand of \$12,000 more than the previous year. During the period \$102,000 was paid out for bond retirement and interest. These figures appear in the county's tabulated report. In other words the county spent about \$12,000 less than it took in, which may be something to marvel at in these days of deficit government spending.—The Robert Lee Observer.
