**Home Demonstration Agent's Column**

By MRS. VIDA KREKLOW

Today when someone speaks of communications we are likely to think of the nation's vast array of radio, television and telegraph systems. Strictly speaking, the word communication denotes the process of talking and being understood. Since most of the world is involved in trying to make itself heard in every spot from the home to the whole universe these principles of communication may be of interest:

1. Listen.
2. Avoid hasty conclusions.
3. Consider the other person's point of view.
4. Keep the person to whom you are speaking in mind.
5. Make your point clear.
6. Allow for two-way communications.
7. Interpret response.

Don't think that these principles apply to the world of public speakers, preachers, teachers, law makers and the others who find themselves speaking to groups in public; they apply equally in how well you get over to your children, your boss, your employee the things you'd like to get across.

If you sew, do it as easily as possible and the job will be much more pleasant as well as easier. Check on the place where you do your sewing and see how many of the following things you have.

Cutting surface or table of elbows height.  
Convenient pressing area; include ironing board, sleeve board and steam iron or electric iron with pressing cloth.  
Sewing machine placed so that light comes over left shoulder.  
Sufficient light, both natural and artificial.

Easily cleaned floor, waste basket near machine.

Adequate storage for patterns, supplies, pressing equipment and yard goods within reach.

Electrical outlets properly placed.

How do you rank in convenience for sewing?

Nutrition not only affects how you grow and develop, it also affects how you look and influences your personality and your ability to work.

Do your spring cleaning a bit at the time and you won't get too tired nor too bored with the job. Tackle one area of the house at once. The inside of the kitchen cabinet might be a good place to start and these might be some good suggestions to follow:

Get rid of (or store some other place) all utensils and supplies you are not using.

Store together the things you use together; for instance, a measuring cup near the sugar.

Put the things you use most often on the easy to reach shelf.

Stack together only things of the same size and kind—example, in the canned foods keep vegetables together, soups, fruits and other classes of foods accordingly.

Arrange your shelves or drawers in such a way that the lids and pans you use daily don't have to be dug out of dozens of others—this saves time and tempers.

## COUNTY AGENT'S COLUMN

County cotton producers are reminded that they have until March 28 to cancel or adjust any application filed under the Acreage Reserve phase of the Soil Bank program.

Producers desiring to cancel or adjust applications on their 1958 cotton allotment acres should contact their local ASC office for complete details.

The choice of leaving acreage applications as it was filed or canceling or making downward adjustment is an important one. Moisture conditions are much improved over former years, but factors such as credit, equipment and labor, other than moisture, enter into the picture.

Get all the facts pro and con and actually set down the figures on income that can be expected from canceling, adjusting downward or leaving the application as filed, before making the final decision.

The final decision is up to each cotton producer. We will be glad to supply cotton growers with information which is available to us on the current cotton situation along with material on varieties and production practices.

April 15, is the final date to make application for the conservation reserve phase of the soil bank program.

A bale of cotton will remove from the soil 38 pounds of nitrogen, 18 pounds of phosphorus and 18 pounds of potash. Numerous soil tests taken on cultivated fields in the county show that the average soil is slightly alkaline, low medium on organic matter, low medium on nitrogen, low to very low on phosphoric acid and very high on potash.

Average fertilizer recommendations will be to chisel 30-30-0 fertilizer per acre before planting, which means you need 30 pounds of nitrogen and 30 pounds of phosphorus before you can expect maximum production, even on dry land farming. For best yields on grain sorghums use 30-30-0 plus 40-0-0 in 35 days. Small grains requirement is 20-40-0, plus 20-0-0 in February.

To apply fertilizer moisture must be present. That is why plowing under a green crop or stubble crop is so important in this county—because we do not have moisture every year to fertilize.

This is the year for dry land

farmers to fertilize—the soil condition is as near perfect as you will ever get it, in regard to moisture.

Soil scientists always remark, "The soils of Schleicher county have enough potash and calcium to last many generations without adding these plant nutrients."

Insect enemies of peaches and plums include peach twig borer which feeds on the tender growth in the spring and on the young fruit later on. The plum curculis is a worm that feeds on the young fruit. There are a number of insects similar to stink bugs that damage fruit. Brown rot fungus attacks blooms, twigs and fruit.

To control these insects peach and plum trees should be sprayed several times during the growing season. The spray to use is 1 pound of 25% wettable dieldrin to 6 pounds of wettable sulphur to 100 gallons of water.

A regular spray schedule should be followed. Apply first when 75% of petals have fallen, followed 10 days later when the bloom is in the shuck. A third spraying should follow in two or three weeks.

Major poisonous range plants that are present in Schleicher are: bitter weed, broad leaf milk weed, shinnery oak, cockle bur, and oak. Others could be present such as riddell groundsel, thread leaf groundsel, payless goldenrod and threadleaf broomweed.

L-114, Major poisonous range plants, is yours for the asking at the county agent's office. This leaflet gives the stages of growth that these plants are poisonous, or most poisonous and the type of animal affected, etc.

Two inches of rain has been gaged up to March 25th, bringing the total for 1958 to 9.08. If we were in a normal rainfall year the total would read 2.63 or approximately only one-third of this year's precipitation.

### THAD HUTCHESON IS STILL PROMINENT IN REPUBLICAN POLITICS ON ANNIVERSARY OF SPECIAL ELECTION FOR U. S. SENATE

The first anniversary of the special senate election, in which Ralph Yarborough was swept to victory to win the unexpired term of Price Daniel, will find Thad Hutcheson still prominent in Republican circles of the state of Texas. Hutcheson was the lone Republican candidate in the special election of one year ago.

Interest ran high in the campaign because of the nearly even division of Republicans and Democrats in the U. S. Senate at that time. Nation-wide attention was centered on the campaign in Texas.

Out of state car owners are advised that it will be necessary for you to have your motor number checked by an officer of the law before you can register your car for the first time in this state.

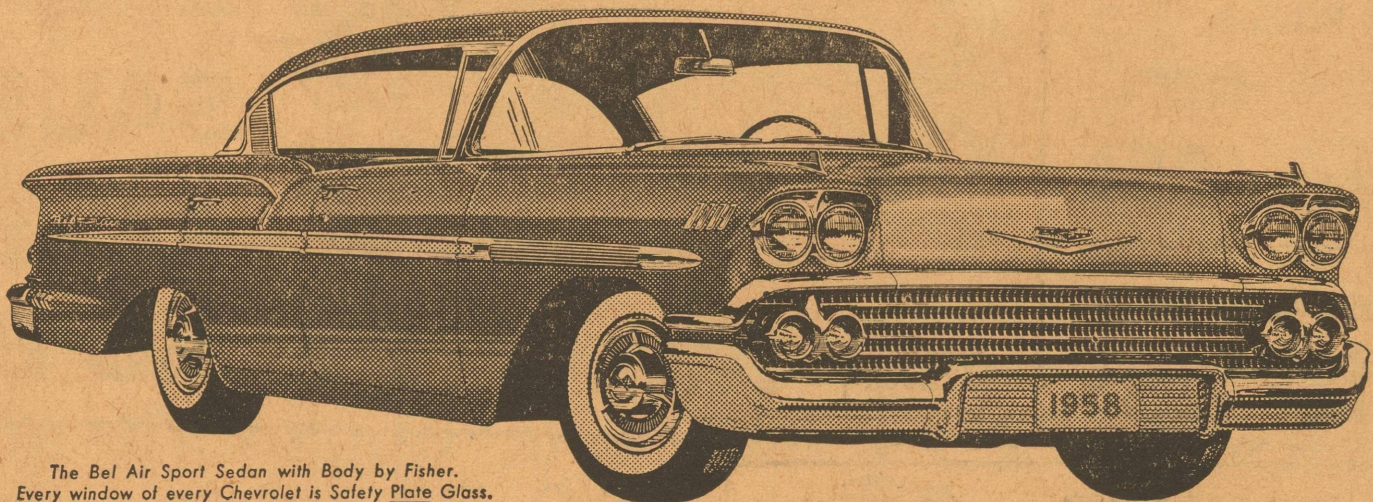
