## Five Company Houses at Rancho Station To Be Sold and Moved To Town

As a climax to two years of rumors, the Shell Public Relations department in Houston this week made official announcement that the cottages at the Eldorado Station of the Ranch Pipe Line are to be sold for removal.

In a telephone conversation Tuesday with Mr. McCoy of the company in Houston, Success editors were given the following information:

The company houses at Rancho Station, which were built to furnish immediate housing for their engineers when the station opened nearly six years ago, have been offered for sale. Shell employees who are now occupying them are being given the first purchase option. Bids on the houses must be in by July 16, and any houses remaining at that time will be offered for sale to the public, going to the highest bidder.

The Shell Company expects the houses to be moved within 60 days from Rancho station property. Appraisers were here about two months ago.

The property is being sold because the immediate housing needs of company personnel have ceased to be a problem, and, as McCoy pointed out, Shell Pipe Line is getting out of the housing business at all their stations where ever possible.


The Eldorado station is one of three on the McCamey to Houston Rancho pipeline. The other two stations are at McCamey and Austin and the same system for disposing of excess houses is also going on there.

The houses at the Eldorado station each contain 1500 square feet of floor space, measuring 25½ by 60½ feet. Each house contains a heating and cooling system and each one has an underground fuel storage facility. They will be sold as they are, where they are, with each buyer standing all expenses of moving to new location.

To Mr. McCoy's information, we add the following:

Employees now living in the Rancho houses are George Cales, terminal supervisor; L. L. Arnold, assistant terminal supervisor; Joe Dossett, engineer; Fred Watson, engineer; and T. D. McGill, engineer. Ben Hext, engineer who lives on his farm near here, will be

## Whitten Property Leased With Drilling Contract

In a deal completed this week, Mark Eidelbach, consulting geologist of San Angelo, acquired the lease of 960 acres from a checkerboard pattern in the Whitten Estate.

Drilling clause calls for operations to begin within 60 days from date of conveyance of the 7/8 mineral rights. One deep test will be drilled within a year and one test to 4,800 feet or to production at a lesser depth is called for in the contract.

Acreage involved is from sections 33, 34, 35, and 50, and includes the location of the old Whitten well which caused an oil boom here over 25 years ago, and then was abandoned. It is about 3 miles from Eldorado.

Landowners signing the lease were Mr. and Mrs. D. C. Royster, Lewis Whitten, C. M. Whitten, W. M. Whitten, E. M. Jackson, Geo. H. Neill, and Andrew Moore.

Garrett No. 1 Cecil Meador located 15 miles northeast of Eldorado ran a drillstem test early Wednesday at a depth of 5,144 feet. Recovery was 3,733 feet of salt water. Operator drilling ahead.

Hancock Oil Co. of Midland has

filed application to drill the No. 1 Treadwell as a 1,400 foot north-west offset to Fryer & Hanson No. 1 Callan, recently completed opener and lone producer in the F. & H. (Cisco) field of Schleicher county 12 miles north of Ft. McKavett.

Contract depth is 2,800 feet. The discovery was a re-entered failure and was finalized May 27 for a daily flowing potential of 241 barrels of 39.8 gravity oil, plus 40% water from perforations between 2,614-620 feet with gas-oil ratio too small to measure.

Standard Oil Co. Texas Christina Mittel 3-A, well No. 4 was taking a drill stem test at a depth of 4,175 late Wednesday. This was in the Wolfcamp formation and they had been drilling in lime, chert, and shale.

Ashmund & Hilliard No. 2 Ltd. of Midland will drill the No. 2-B E. Otto Williams as a location east step-out to the Otto (Canyon) field 15 miles northeast of Eldorado. Contract depth is 4,800 feet.

Roads to the new location were being built Wednesday and actual location is expected to be completed this week. West-Tex Drilling Co. has the drilling contract.

## Checks For Right of Way Are Mailed Out This Week

Checks for damages to property owners located on the new highway route through town were in the mail Tuesday. The awards were in amounts ranging from \$7,950 down to \$200.

P. D. Haley received a check for \$3,790 and will keep all equipment and tanks including an underground storage tank. He will begin work on removal of the tank in the near future.

H. L. Hazelwood received a check for \$7,950 with the county and state retaining all property improvements. The state will advertise the improvements for sale to the highest bidder in about 30 days.

Lum Davis will keep his im-

provements and was awarded \$6,120 with the county and state agreeing to fence the right-of-way on both sides of the road going through his property.

The Arthur Henderson estate was awarded \$600 and Mrs. D. W. Smith received \$200 with no improvements involved.

Joe Foy, San Angelo attorney, filed an appeal in behalf of Clyde Keeney with the district and county clerk here early this week, after Keeney appealed an offer of a little over \$1,700 in damages to his property.

All property owners who chose to keep their improvements will have about six weeks to move to new locations.

## Mrs. J. E. Tisdale Funeral Yesterday

Mrs. J. E. Tisdale, 78, a resident of Eldorado since 1901, died Monday at 9:05 p. m. in the Shannon hospital in San Angelo. She had been in failing health over two years and died after undergoing major surgery Sunday. She was a former teacher in the schools of the county.

Funeral services were held Wednesday at 10:00 a. m., from the First Methodist church in Eldorado with Ratliff-Kerbow funeral home in charge of the local arrangements. Rev. Doyle Morton of Sonora was assisted in the services by Rev. R. R. Heaner.

Mrs. Tisdale was born in Travis county on October 19, 1879, and came to Eldorado by stage coach in 1901. She was married to J. E. Tisdale in Eldorado December 17, 1911. Survivors include two daughters, Mrs. Vester T. Hughes of Mertzon and Mrs. A. E. Prugel of Sonora. Also surviving are two brothers, Don and Ren McCormick, both of Eldorado, four grandchildren and three great-grandchildren. A son, Jim, died March 23, 1935 at the age of fourteen. Mr. Tisdale died in 1927.

Mrs. Tisdale was a charter member of the First Methodist church in Eldorado and a charter member of the Eldorado chapter of the Eastern Star, serving as Worthy Matron in 1943-4. She was a member of the Daughters of the American Revolution. At the time of her death she was owner of a ranch east of Eldorado.

Interment was in the Eldorado cemetery.

## Public Invited to Sonora Ordination Tonight

Episcopalians of Eldorado and Sonora state that everyone is invited to ordination services scheduled tonight in Sonora. Lea Roy Aldwell and Clay T. Puckett will be ordained to the Sacred Order of Deacons of the Episcopal Church by the Right Reverend Richard Earl Dicus, D. D., Suffragan Bishop of West Texas. The service and the reception will be held on the lawn of St. John's Church in Sonora beginning at 8:00 o'clock.

Participating in the ceremony of ordination will be the Rev. Joseph H. Fasel, Junction; the Rev. Morris F. Elliott, San Antonio; the Rev. Alanson Brown, Sonora; the Rev. Lee M. Adams, Menard, and the Rev. John E. Winslow, San Benito.

Both Aldwell and Puckett are former Sonorans and Aldwell a native son. He is the son of Mrs. Roy E. Aldwell and the late Mr. Aldwell.

Before entering the ministry, Aldwell was engaged in ranching in Sutton county. He was active in civic and business affairs, having been a vice-president of the First National Bank here for 15 years. He is a former president of the Sonora Lions club, commanding officer of the local Army Reserve unit, a member of the Sutton County ASC committee, and a member at large of the executive board of the Concho Valley Council, Boy Scouts of America.

He is a graduate of Texas A&M college where he studied agriculture and holds a master's degree from Oregon State.

Aldwell has one son, Roy Edward Aldwell, a student at Juillard School of Music, New York. Puckett, former publisher of "The Devil's River News" was born in North Carolina but his parents returned to Texas while he was still an infant. He is a graduate of San Antonio schools and studied journalism at the University of Texas, working part-time for an Austin daily. He and his wife, the former Mary Jack King, bought the Sonora weekly in 1940.

When Puckett entered the Marine Corps as a private in Decem-

ber, 1941, his wife took over management of the weekly and continued to run the paper until his return after the war.

Puckett and his wife and three children, Jackie, 18, David, 8, and Rebecca, 4, will make their home in Corpus Christi where he has been assigned to St. Thomas's

Church.

Aldwell will be assigned to St. Mary's Church, Eldorado. Their ordination takes place after both have spent three years in seminaries, Puckett at the Protestant Episcopal Theological Seminary, Alexandria, Virginia, and Aldwell at the Episcopal Theological Seminary of the Southwest, Austin, Texas.

## COUNTY AGENT'S COLUMN

The new systemic insecticide Co-Ral, or known to county agents as 21/199 is being tried in this county on a limited scale.

Co-Ral is an organic phosphorus insecticide that kills cattle grubs, ticks, lice, horn flies, screw worms, and shows promise of controlling sheep nose bot and sorehead in sheep. It also shows promise against some gastrointestinal worm parasites. Co-Ral is sprayed at 250 pounds pressure; the animal must be wet to the hide. The insecticide is absorbed and circulates with body fluids, destroying the above parasites of sheep and cattle.

Co-Ral comes in a 25% powder and must be used at a 0.5% strength for cattle, horses, and swine. Sheep and goats being more sensitive must receive not more than 0.25% strength. It would take four pounds of Co-Ral to 25 gallons of water to treat cattle and two pounds to 25 gallons of water to treat sheep and goats.

One of the best times for spraying cattle would be after the heel fly season for sheep and goats out of the shearing pen.

Co-Ral may seem expensive. The thing to remember is: one or maybe two sprayings a year controls all parasites listed for the year. Rain effects the absorption of the insecticide by the animal up till 24 hours. The effectiveness to a great extent is going to depend upon thoroughly wetting the animal with the proper mix with 250 lbs. of pressure.

Question: An insecticide that is that powerful must be dangerous to me?

Answer: Any insecticide is dangerous when improperly used. Follow the precautions when using any insecticide. When using Co-Ral if the insecticide comes in contact with the skin, use soap and warm water. Do not breathe or inhale the mist and fumes from Co-Ral over an excessive period of time. Stay on the windward side of the animal. Remove clothing wet with Co-Ral. The usual precautions make Co-Ral a safe insecticide.

Quality: Is the challenge for all cotton growers in 1958.

The damaging effect of weather to last year's cotton crop has caused widespread concern. Quality was so seriously impaired that there is alarm over the long-run effect on the demand for cotton. Low grade cotton is a handicap in meeting competition for market at home and abroad.

While there is a surplus of cotton in terms of quantity, the cotton supply is badly out of balance. Mills are forced to substitute low grades for high; the high grades demand handsome premiums and low grades are being heavily discounted.

Producers having high grade cotton in 1958 will benefit by premiums. As the grades drop the waste increases. Here is the grade and percent waste in cotton: strict middling, 7.2% waste; middling, 8.1; strict low middling, 9.3; low middling, 12.5; strict good ordinary, 15.6 and good ordinary, 18.3.

Some stock troughs and reservoirs are becoming covered with green scum or slime. One level teaspoonful of bluestone per 1500 gallons of water will kill green scum or slime.

Grasshoppers have reached the damaging stage on the Raymond Mittel farm. Raymond sprays with toxaphene at the rate of 1-2 quarts per acre. Producers can expect some grasshopper damage to the foliage of field crops in the near future. Hoppers of the differential type are hatching in weeds and tall grass bordering fields in large numbers. They will first feed on weeds and grass before migrating to field crops.

Toxaphene, heptachlor, aldrin or dieldrin is used in differential hopper control.

Baits are preferred for control of "Jumbo" hoppers. Don't forget the malathion for control of aphids, white flies, and all scale insects such as mealy scale and obtuse scale on your oriental shrubs. They are very prevalent this time of year.

## Turkey Market Outlook Improves

College Station.—Present indications point to slightly better turkey prices in the fall of 1958 than in the fall of 1957, according to F. Z. Beanblossom, extension poultry marketing specialist. Beanblossom bases this prediction mainly on the outlook for about a 14 per cent drop in the 1958 crop in the U. S. It now appears that a drop from the 1957 record output of 81 million birds is certain and this should help prices. However, he points out, the price rise will be tempered by large storage stocks. Too, the paying prices that storers will be willing to offer for 15 to 20 per cent of the crop which normally goes into long-time storage will be tempered by business men's judgments of the price that will prevail at the time the stored turkeys would normally be resold.

The use of turkeys from storage since January has been greater than any preceding year, says the specialist. However, storage stocks are still large and on May 1 amounted to 104 million pounds compared to 109 million pounds on the same date last year and the 1947-56 average of only 67 million pounds.

Any increase in demand for turkeys over 1957 is not in the picture. Consumers may not have as many dollars available for turkeys in the fall of 1958 as in the fall of 1957. Other factors which the specialist says may affect prices are the present outlook for increased broiler production over 1957 and larger supplies of other competing meats.

## Peaches and Ice Cream On July Plentiful List

College Station.—July is peach and ice cream time. However, in the past few years there has been a scarcity of peaches to go with our plentiful supply of ice cream, says the U. S. Department of Agriculture. Good news this year is that the largest peach crop since 1947 will move to market in July to team up with ice cream. This is why these foods are featured items on the July plentiful foods list.

The forecast of the 1958 peach crop in the nine Southern States, which produce the bulk of the nation's early peaches, is 44 per cent larger than the 1957 production, and also 53 per cent above the 1947-1956 average.

Other foods considered in plentiful enough supply to rate spots on the July plentiful list are watermelons, fresh and processed lemons, potatoes, summer vegetables and vegetable fats and oils.

Among the summer vegetables expected to be in good supply are such items as sweet corn, tomatoes, cabbage, green beans, lettuce, cucumbers, green peppers and onions. USDA determines what foods are plentiful every month by a survey of the major food suppliers in this area.

## LET'S TALK LIVESTOCK BY TED GOULDY



Fort Worth.—Cattle and calves cleared at fully steady to strong prices at Fort Worth Monday. Receipts were the smallest since early spring due to storms and heavy rainfall in the territory. Trade was extremely active and most sales indicated some advances in prices as compared with late last week, especially on stocker calves and cattle. Exception to higher prices were plain short-fed steers.

Visitors to the market were in agreement that the rains of the past few days have assured pasture and stock water in most sections of the State until late summer or fall. The rains were deemed certain to increase the demand for stocker cattle in virtually all parts of the Southwest immediately.

Typical of the strong action on stockers was the sale of 77 light-weight steer and heifer calves consigned by W. H. Cooper of Eastland. The calves weighed about 300 pounds and drew \$35 per hundred. Their mothers sold at \$18.25, with 10 cows at \$17.

Good to choice slaughter steers and yearlings cashed at \$24 to \$27.50, and common and medium offerings cleared at \$16 to \$24. Fat cows ranged from \$18 to \$21, and canners and cutters drew \$13 to \$18. Bulls brought \$17 to \$22.

Good and choice stocker calves sold from \$27 to \$35 and stocker and feeder steers and yearlings cashed at \$22 to \$27. Medium stockers sold around \$22 to \$25.

**Home Demonstration Agent's Column**

By MRS. VIDA KREKLCV

I'm going to grant that times are not like they used to be (they never were). And I'm going to grant that the average boy and girl growing up don't do as much work as they used to do. But there are still a few boys and girls around who do as much as anybody used to do.

I have in mind right now Kathy Sauer, a Reynolds 4-H club girl. Kathy is 13. Her mother has been called to San Angelo because of illness in the family and has been gone several days. Kathy has a baby sister, Koy, who is just past 2. Then there is her father Victor and two brothers, Duwain and Ronnie. These three are farming like beavers. They are irrigating cotton and breaking oat stubble. Those of you who know about these activities need no further descriptions of what goes on.

Kathy is doing all the cooking, washing, ironing, plus baby sitting for the five who are at home. When she has a little more time she makes virtually all of her own clothes. I've just talked to her to see how she is getting along. She said just fine and that she was glad I had called because she had a lot of green snap beans to put in the home freezer and she had forgotten how long to blanch them. Too, she said that she had just killed a couple of chickens and she was a little worried; she was afraid they weren't cut into the right pieces.

No—not all of the young people have gone to the dogs—some of them have gone to work.

Working on the theory that most home freezers are not being used to entire capacity, demonstrations are being given to H. D. clubs this month on "Getting the Most from Your Home Freezer."

A period of the time has been given during the meetings for members to plan the contents of their freezers. Included in these plans are complete meals, or nearly so, which can be kept on hand against the day when cooking is not convenient.

- Green Beans (from freezer)
- Spiced Peaches
- Hot Rolls or Cornbread (freezer)




