county cotton for 1958 came in to Eldorado about 6:00 p. m., Tuesday.

It came from the farm of W. E. (Elmer) Bruton in the Reynolds community and was brought to the gin by his grand children, Bert Bruton and Betsy Bruton—son and daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ray Bruton.

The load of seed cotton weighed about 1890 pounds, as calculated from pickers' weights at the farm. It was picked from an area of about four acres, and the picking was done by the regular hands on the Bruton farm. It was explained that W. E. Bruton has some of the earliest dryland cotton in his community that it is opening rapidly and picking was continuing—and that several more bales were expected in by last night.

#### PIONEER FARMER

This represents an increase in non-real estate loans of 13% over 1957 and an increase of 4% real estate mortgage credit, or an increase in dollars of 419 million and 754 million. 非米米米

Texas share of savings bonds for 1958 is 175 millions. The first 7 months purchases amounted to 103 million or 59.3% of the total goal. Whereas, 61.6 of the national goal has been met.

Schleicher county goal has not been met for 1958 and is lagging behind 1957, but should surpass the goal by January 1, 1959.

Forty per cent of all Texans derive their livelihood from agricultural industry. Almost twofifths of us are engaged either in farming, in supplying machinery and other farm and ranch needs, or in the processing and distributing of farm and ranch products.

Two changes have occurred since 1940. 34% of all Texans lived on farms whereas today only about 11% live on the farms. This does not mean agriculture is less important, because we have people in town who are a part of our agricultural industry. About 11% Texans are busy supplying farmers as compared to 4% in 1940. About 18% process and distribute agricultural products instead of 7% in 1940.

The average size farm has increased from 367 acres in 1940 to over 500 acres today and the number of farms have decreased 30% Don't forget that agriculture supplies more jobs in town than ever

Today's farmer is farming more land, spending more money and producing more crops and livestock with larger investments than ever before, and his cost of operaever belove, tion is higher.



but on far depleted ranges it's harder to do. On cropland the competition should be shredded, mowed, or poisoned and left on the land for cover and protection of the young grass seedlings. This is the reason our ranges don't come back following the drouth as fast as we would like to see. Competition holds the better plants back and we have no practical way of getting them out of the way on large acreages of rangeland. The better plants will eventually replace the undesirable plants if managed properly, but where they are just left to compete with one another the process is very slow.

Grain Sorghum Stubble left from heavy production of grain sorghum can be put to a good soil and water conservation use by plowing the land so as to have stubble partially on top of the land. This will go a long way toward keeping that field from blowing away next spring, as well as adding organic matter to the soil and making it more productive






