Eagles Blanked By Wink

The Eldorado Eagles ran into a superior Wink football team Friday night in Rankin and were defeated to the score of 32-0.

The half time score was 8-0 and the Eagles played their best ball of the season in this first half. The score at the end of three quarters was 14-0 but the Wildcats scored 18 points in the fourth quarter to make the score a little more one-sided than the game actually was.

This game closed out a successful season for the Eagles in which they won six games and lost five. The district co-championship was

the first championship of any kind in football for the Eagles since 1950.

3396 Bales Total At Gin Here Wednesday

A total of 3396 bales had been processed at the gin here up to Wednesday morning—which was an increase of 274 bales over Wednesday of last week.

There is still a lot of "scrapping" to be done over the county, and in a few instances there is some good picking left.

Most of the Braceros have left and the remaining cotton harvest will depend upon how close it is gathered, and that, in turn, will depend on the weather from here on out.

BALES ON FIRE

The bales were moved over in the field, away from the other cotton, and they were continuing to smolder Wednesday morning.

Attention GOC Volunteers!

Mrs. R. N. McDonald, supervisor for the past year of the Ground Observer post here in Eldorado, has been notified of inactivation of the GOC on January 31.

From the Air Defense Command at Colorado Springs, Col., Lt. Gen. J. H. Atkinson recently wrote Mrs. McDonald:

The Ground Observer Corps will be inactivated on 31 January, 1959. The decision to relieve you from active participation on the air defense team is based on the following three considerations:

1. The present radar network.
2. The increasing speeds of potential enemy bombers.
3. Air Force recognition of its responsibility to relieve the volunteers of a heavy burden of duties when the effectiveness of the electronic air surveillance system will permit.

I salute and commend all volunteers for a job well done. The Air Force, the Air Defense Command and, indeed, all American citizens owe a great debt of gratitude to you for your help in providing air defense to deter aggression. I hope that the Air Force will continue to merit the confidence and support you have so generously given during the past.

CHRISTMAS MAILING NOW URGED BY POSTMASTER

Postmaster Bernard Carr says it is less than a month until Christmas and now is the time to start your Christmas mailings. The earlier you get them mailed the surer you are in their reaching their destination in good condition and on time. The cooperation of the public in mailing early the past few years has made it possible for the post office department to give them much better service.

Wrap all your packages in sturdy corrugated cartons and heavy wrapping paper. Tie them securely with plenty of heavy cord, and address them correctly and clearly.

It isn't too early to start mailing your Christmas cards now, the postmaster says. Unsealed Christmas cards with your name signed only will go anywhere for 3c each. Sealed Xmas cards are 1st class letters and you can include a message. First class cards can be forwarded or returned to you if they are undeliverable; at the regular first-class rate of 4c.

Cards for delivery in local post office boxes, sealed or unsealed, are 3c each.

Please put your return address on all cards. This is not only helpful to you and your friends, but it is also socially correct. Christmas cards and packages for distant places should be mailed before December 10th.

Beginning December 8th the PO will be open until 5:00 p. m., each day and will be open all until 5:00 p. m. on both Saturdays preceding Christmas—Dec. 13 and 20.

You will save yourself time and confusion if you start now with your Christmas mailings. Your cooperation will be appreciated. — Postmaster.

A challenge to Eldorado not to go the way other small towns which have been obliterated by progress, was given by Delbert Downing at the first annual meeting and banquet of the Schleicher County Chamber of Commerce here Thursday night.

Mr. Downing is manager of the Midland Chamber of Commerce. He spoke to a gathering of about 100 C of C members and their ladies.

Pointing out that within the past 25 years, at least 500 small communities in Texas the size of Eldorado, had passed out of existence, Mr. Downing made the prediction that the trend would continue in the future.

He stated that small communities were dying because better roads and cars had made the larger shopping centers more accessible. This could lead ultimately to half a dozen shopping areas in the state, he said, with no part of the state more than half an hour away from one of them.

"Five hundred more little communities will die in the next 25 years," Downing said. "I wonder whose they will be?" He went on to point out that towns live as long as people appreciate and use them, and that the creation of city appreciation is the important job of a young chamber of commerce.

It was just a year ago that the C of C was organized here in the county.

Mr. Downing challenged the local chamber to foster an attitude of civic loyalty. Local firms should provide goods and services equal to those found elsewhere, he said, pointing out that merchants should be ashamed to try to sell last year's fashions to local people.

Orland Harris served a barbecued chicken dinner. Ed Meador was master of ceremonies of the program, and the invocation was given by the Rev. James L. Spencer pastor of the First Presbyterian church of Eldorado.

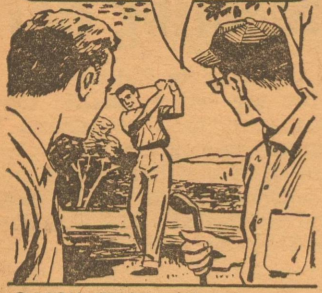

The chaplain, Mrs. V. G. Tisdale, opened the meeting by reading a scripture from the book of Psalms.

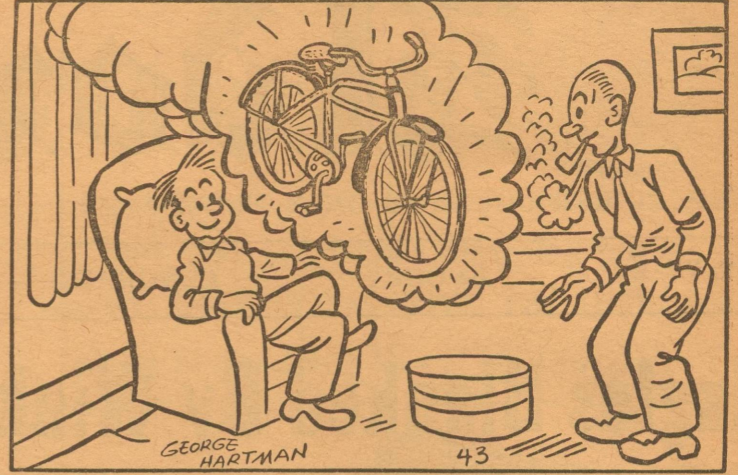

- 1 cup fine graham cracker crumbs
- 1/4 cup melted butter or margarine
- 1/2 cup PET Evaporated Milk
- 1 1/2 pkg. unflavored gelatin
- 2/3 cup water
- 2 eggs, separated
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 Tablespoon vanilla
- 1/4 teaspoon rum flavoring (can omit)
- 1/2 cup PET Evaporated Milk

Press mixture of crumbs and butter on bottom and sides of 9-in. pie pan. Chill until needed. Chill 1/2 cup PET Milk in ice tray until almost frozen around edges. Meanwhile, soften gelatin in 1/2 cup cold water. Stir in 1/2 cup boiling water until gelatin dissolves. In 1 1/2-qt. bowl mix slightly beaten egg yolks, sugar, salt, vanilla, rum flavoring and 1/2 cup PET Milk. Stir in dissolved gelatin gradually. Chill until very thick, but not set, stirring now and then. Put egg whites and chilled PET Milk into cold 1-qt. bowl. Whip with cold rotary beater by hand, or with electric beater at high speed, until stiff. Beat in chilled gelatin mixture gradually, until smooth and creamy. Put into crumb crust. Chill until firm, about 2 hrs., and ready to serve.

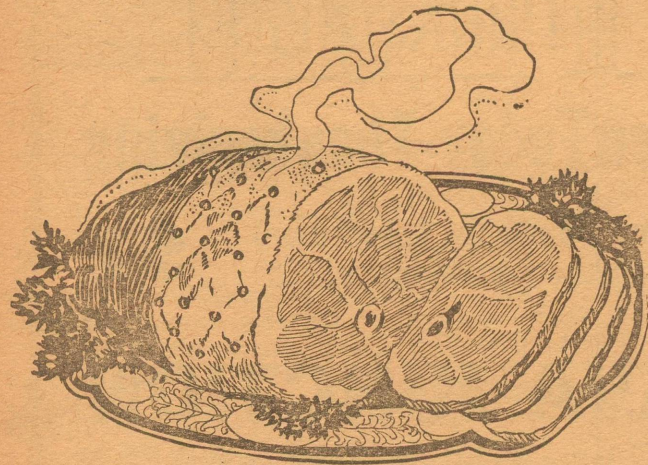

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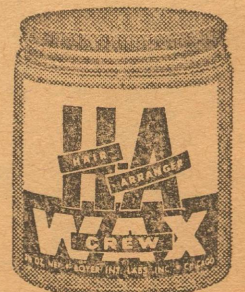
