Total Bales Reach 3537 Yesterday

At noon yesterday the Mikeska gin here had a total of 3537 bales, and the harvest was getting into the "scrapping" stage. 141 bales were ginned during the past week.

From here on out there would pickers to stay on the job and there was no way to estimate how much of the remaining crop would be gathered.

There were a large number of with their bundles packed, getting paid off and waiting for transporation to Old Mexico.

Moore Bros. were paying them off, and Henry Moore reported that only 14 hands remained at he farm. "All we're doing now is scrapping . . . we could get 20 or 30 more bales, but you can't tell.

A review of the Moore operation as of noon yesterday provides the following figures: 683 bales ginned, which came from 600 acres; 280 of these acres were irrigated, the rest were dryland. If weather and labor conditions remain favorable they can expect to finish the season with better than 700 bales

First make: French Dressing.

1/3 cup vinegar. 2/3 cup oil.

½ teaspoon salt

½ teaspoon sugar. 1/4 teasp Colman's dry mustard.

Put dry ingredients into a pint jar with the vinegar. Mix by shaking jar. Add oil and shake jar again. This is a basic French dressing so goon on green salads, same

FOR GARDENERS

Here's a job for a winter evening spring and summer.

It's a frame built of 1x2-inch lumber, made a foot wide and as long as you can conveniently build it. The inside of the frame is cov -ered with 2-inch mesh chicken wire. The legs are of such lengths that the frame can be set either 4 inches above the ground, or 10 inches by inverting it.

The frame can be used for several purposes. When flower seedlings are first set out, the frame can be set 4 inches above the ground and covered with a onefoot wide length of canvas to pro tect the flower plants from the sun and driving rain. As the plants grow up, the frame is inverted and the canvas again placed over the frame to provide protection. Being 10 inches above the ground, morning and evening sun can reach the plants, but protection is given during midday

As the plants continue to grow, the canvas is removed and the plants will grow through the wire mesh. Tall growing plants are kept off of the groun dand flower stems will grow straight. Rows of flowers 18 inches apart will allow 6 inches of walking space between the

Watering of flowers can be uniform if a canvas soaker hose is run along the top side of the frame. This has an advantage when flower chemical change it becomes more rank to be reached with a soaker





Cannibalism Can Be Problem With Poultry

best of poultry families, a bad Mrs. Glenn McDonald and Mrs. Roy may develop. And once cannibalistic habit is acquired, there's trouble ahead unless the delinquent is given immediate attention, says Ben Wormeli, exten-

sion poultry husbandman. There are several things which may cause feather - picking or eannibalism in a poultry flock. Limited feeding and watering space, crowding, lack of proper ventilation, irritation caused by ice or mites or the energy level of the diet and the form in which it is fed, may all be factors in

causing the trouble. At this season when pullets are being housed, a careful watch for feather pickers or for those being attacked should be kept, advises the specialist. There are some management practices which will tend to keep the trouble at a minimum and these are listed by Wormeli as a comfortable, well - ventilated house; plenty of well distributed feed and water space; no external parasites; feeding diets higher in fiber, and the feeding mash instead of an all-pellet ration.

The surest way to combat the trouble is to debeak the birds. Wormeli suggests that the local county agent be contacted for details on carrying out this operation



Horehound

Several inquiries have been irrigated land, some type of fertimade in regard to horehound. This is to advise that horehound is a perennial (comes back from old root stalk each year) which grows throughout Texas. It thrives in waste places and on open ground. The plant is invariably dense in cattle and sheep pens. In late fall, the leaves die and fall off and the stems wither and look dead, but in early January little, spidery, buds appear and soon form new branches. The plant flowers in June to August and seeds from August to September.



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
