Austin.--Texas Senate demon strated its faith in the future by passing an appropriation bill without having the money to meet the cbligations.

It calls for spending \$2,496,685 during the next two years. It does not include teacher pay raises or medical care for the aged. Senators agreed that they needed to know how much new money could be raised before making decisions on these.

The measure calls for spending needed to put the Senate appropriation bill into effect, as it is now.

Panel Okays Teacher Pay Raise Senate Education Committee ap-

proved the Hale-Aikin school improvement program which includes an across-the-board \$800 a year raise for public school teachers. Sen. A. M. Aikin Jr. of Paris,

sponsor, said he would not ask for floor passage of the school measure until the general appropria-tions bill has been passed as well as a tax bill that would provide money for it.

Hale-Aikin program would cost and local districts about \$18 a year. It would set the minimum salary for beginning teachers with bachelor's degrees at \$4,014 a year.







#### Darlings of Spangleland With Sterling Bros. Circus Easter Around the World Preparing For Easter

The Easter season actually opens weeks before the joyful Sunday that marks the resurrection.

On Ash Wednesday many Christians begin a time of fast and prayer called Lent. The term comes from the Old English word Lencten, meaning springtime. The early Christians in Rome held a 40-hour fast and vigil in remembrance of Christ's rest in the grave. But the period was later extended to the 40-day Lent, probably as a reminder of the 40 days Christ fasted in the wilderness. In anticipation of this solemn

season, Christians in many parts of the world celebrate with carnivals. In New Orleans, for example, the season of carnival, or farewell to the flesh, lasts from about January 6 to Shrove Tuesday, which is Mardi Gras Day. The French named the holiday Mardi Gras, or fat Tuesday, after the custom of parading a fat ox through the streets of Paris on Shrove Tuesday.

The day is also known as Pancake Day, and every year the women of Olney, England, and Libe-ral, Kansas, compete in a pancake race.

The next day is Ash Wednesday, when the priest makes a cross on the foreheads of the devout with ashes. Since Biblical times, sprink-ling oneself with ashes has expressed sorrow.

The last week of Lent is Holy Week. It begins with Palm Sun-day, named for the palms that lined Christ's path as He made a triumphant entry into Jerusalem. The palms exhibited on this day are later burned and the ashes are used for Ash Wednesday of the following year.

Maundy Thursday commemor-ates the Last Supper and the time when Jesus washed the feet of His disciples as a token of brotherly | For Easter Holidays love. At one time, the king or emperor of Austria, Russia, Portugal and Spain would wash the feet of 12 poor persons.

Good Friday is a day of mourning as the anniversary of Christ's death on the cross, while Holy Saturday is spent in anticipation. Then, at dawn, comes Easter Surday and the happy celebration of the resurrection.

From Paris, Illinois, to Paris, France, from Sweden to Syria, Christians find hope and joy in Easter. They also find different ways to celebrate the holiday. In France and some other European countries, church bells do not

ring from Good Friday to Easter. According to a legend, the bells fly to Rome. On their way back for Easter, they drop the eggs which children find.

Germans color the eggs green on Maundy Thursday and carry them around all day for good luck. The Shrove Tuesday festival is called Fastnacht, or fast night, in Ger-many and Switzerland.

The English are especially care-ful to wear new clothes, because an old rhyme warns, "At Easter let your clothes be new, or else be sure you will it rue." The cus-tem of wearing new clothes come tom of wearing new clothes comes from the early days of Christianity when newly baptized persons were dressed in white linen garments. Easter has always been a favorite time for baptism.

Religious processions mark Good Friday in Spain. Sometimes the processions include pasos, or wooden figures mounted on platforms which represent scenes from the last week in Christ's life. Easter Day is celebrated with dancing and bullfights.

Children in Denmark and Norway trim birch branches with paper streamers on Shrove Tuesday and playfully beat their elders until they receive hot cross buns. During Lent, Swedish people decorate their houses with birth twigs trimmed with chicken feathers.

In Armenia and Syria, church officials wash the feet of beggars on Maundy Thursday, while East-ern Orthodox officials hold a pub-lic foot-washing ceremony in Jerusalem


