Rock Courts & Station Property Purchased By Gatholic Diocese

A major property transaction went through the county clerk's office this week, when the C. C. West Estate conveyed the Rock Station and Courts property on the San Angelo highway to the Diocese of Amarillo of the Roman Catholic Church, to be new location of a Catholic church here in Eldorado.

The property takes in 4.18 acres of land and consideration paid in cash by the diocese was \$12,500. The West Estate heirs as grantors are retaining the mineral rights on the land.

It is understood that the large Rock Courts building is to be remodeled and converted into a church. A truckload of used pews was shipped in a while back and stored in the Roach building on South Main.

The Rock Courts and station buildings have not been in use for a number of years, and are in a state of disrepair.

The property was conveyed to The Most Rev. John L. Morkovsky, D.D. Bishop of the Roman Catholic Diocese of Amarillo and-or his successors in office.

The 4.18 acres of land are in Block 70 of the Town of Eldorado.

John G. Tower was given 221 votes, followed by Jim Wright with 119, when Schleicher county voters went to the polls Tuesday for the special election for U. S. Senate. Blakley followed with 81 and Will Wilson received 44.

On state level, John G. Tower and Bill Blakley emerged as the top two of the 71-candidate slate, and will face a runoff early in June. Considerable interest is seen in Texas during the coming two months in the contest for Lyndon B. Johnson's vacated place in the

Blakley, who is now in the U.S. Senate as interim appointee, is a multi-millionaire Dallas businessman whose interests include holding here in West Texas.

During the recent campaign, John G. Tower claimed he was the "only conservative in the race." He is a college professor at Wichita Falls, and was the only professed Republican running.

It is being subjected to widespread criticism, but Cole, a long-time veteran of the loan regulation effort, declared that no bill ting: was going to satisfy all the interested factions.

Cole's bill sets up a sliding scale that would allow interest rates of just under 40% on loans of \$100 and dropping gradually to about 11% on a \$3,000 loan. It also allows for "reasonable insurance charges" at rates set by the State

Butter Fluff Rolls

Sift 5 cups flour with ½ cup ½ cup butter and mix as ingrediflour and mix until flour is well size. Punch down and place in refrigerators overnight. The rolls

It's time to plant caladiums. For outside planting, place the tubers about 18 inches apart and plant two inches deep. Don't over water; the tubers will decay.



year. We know from experience that the demands will grow year by year. It is conservatively estimated that in another three years the program will cost a billion dollars annually.

Not since the depression days has such latitude been extended to a government agency to loan and give away the people's tax money, without regard to actual need to meet and solve a local problem.

The trouble is that this is an attempt to treat the symptoms, not disease. Why the unemployment in a given area? If a coal mining town, is it due to the mine having to close down while each miner was receiving \$27 a day for his work, thanks to John L. Lewis? Has the coal been replaced by cheaper gas or fuel oil? Why did a certain factory close in another community? Labor costs too high? Taxes too high? Hundreds of textile mills moved south from New England because labor costs got too high, taxes excessive, featherbedding and what have you. In some areas of the south all ad valorem taxes were suspended on new textile plants for five or more

Maybe the new legislation will help a bit here or there. But think of the cost. And like a habitforming drug, think of this new incentive to go to Uncle Sam with hat in hand to alleviate a problem that can and should be handled by local people. At least the states should shoulder the major portion of the job, if local people can't handle it.





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
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
