R. L. Henderson, in 1210-TT-TCRR, northwest Schleicher County Pennsylvanian sand gas-distillate discovery 25 miles north of Eldorado, flowed 100 barrels of load oil and 40 barrels of new oil in 22 hours, plus gas at the daily rate of 4,074,-000 cubic feet daily.

Flow was through a 20/64-inch choke and perforations between 6,512-32 feet. Tubing pressure was 1,900 pounds; casing pressure,

On a previous 26-hour test thru 20/64-inch choke, it flowed 164 barrels of load oil, with gas gauge unreported. Tubing pressure was 1,920 pounds; casing pressure was 2,250 pounds.

Eldorado-Divide Soil Conservation District News

District Now 20 Years Old The Eldorado-Divide Soil Conservation District, which is composed of all of Schleicher county and that part of Tom Green county drained by the South Concho river will be 20 years old Friday, June

The board of supervisors, or governing body of the district elected by landowners living in the district are: J. Forrest Runge, chairman; B. E. Moore, vice chairman; Ben Hext, secretary; all of these in Schleicher county; and Doyle Johnson and M. G. Shurley representing the part of the district in Tom Green county. Runge and Moore have served as district supervisors for 20 years. All sup ervisors aer farmers or ranchers and are vitally interested in soil, water, and plant conservation.

Soon after the district was org anized the supervisors requested and received assistance from the Soil Conservation Service, with the work unit office at Eldorado work ing in Schleicher county, and the work unit office at San Angelo working in Tom Green county The Soil Conservation Service was to assist farmers and ranchers of the district to plan and apply a well rounded soil, water and plant conservation plan on their place. The objective of the Soil Conservation Service is to assist every farmer and rancher to plan and apply a conservation plan on their land, whereby each acre of agricultural land treated in accordance with its needs for protection and improvement.

Farmers and ranchers demonstrated by their eagerness to plan and apply a conservation plan on their places, in that they recognized the need of soil, water and plant conservation. By June 24, 1942, after field work was started in March 1942, soil and water conservation plans had been developed on 42 Schleicher County rarms and ranches, which totaled For the fiscal year ending June 30, 1961, nine farmers and ranchers were assisted in preparing a conservation plan for their place. Revision of conservation plans was made on 17 farms and ranches this year. Total conservation plans to date are 230 on 518,580 acres. Some of the conservation practices that were applied are: new lines contour farming, 660 acres; conservation crop rotation, 1623 acres; crop residue use, 8782 acres; cover crops, 3155 acres; and terraces, 11 miles. To date 597 miles of terraces and 27 miles of field diversion terraces have been cons-

Rangeland practices applied in fiscal 1961 was 121,308 acres of proper range use, 66,619 acres of deferred grazing, 8022 acres of brush control, and 200 acres range

After 20 years and with the co-operation of a big percentage of the farmers and ranchers in the district, much progress has been made. However the job ahead remains a big one. The goal of the district and the Soil Conservation Service assisting the district is, every farmer and rancher a district co-operator and applying and maintaining the needed soil, water and plant conservation practices needed on their land.





In these areas, except where a very popular Democrat is entrenched, the Republicans can be expected to bid for places in Congress, the Legislature and even county jobs.

First test is due in Bexar county where Congressman Paul Kilday is due to resign to become judge of the Court of Military Appeals. Bexar county went for Tower last
