On March 6, 1917, he was married in Fort Stockton to Josephine Murchison and was employed for a while as bookkeeper in the bank at Mertzon. In August 1918 he was elected as bookkeeper for the First National Bank here in Eldorado and from that time he was identified with that institution. Bank directors' minutes reveal that he was elected assistant cashier in January 1919 and as a vice president in January 1926.

Mr. Hill was elected president of the bank following the death of Mr. J. W. Christian in 1952. He was a charter member of the Eldorado Lions club, a director of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association, and a trustee of the Eldorado First Methodist church.

"He was always good to me," was one of the common remarks heard on the street here Tuesday when his death became known.



ton Referendum will be conducted in the Schleicher County ASCS office. To be eligible to vote, you must have been engaged in the production of upland cotton in 1963.

If at least 2/3 of the eligible voters approve marketing quotas for the 1964 crop, price supports | will be available to growers who apply to any excess cotton produced on a farm.

If quotas are not approved, there will be no quotas or penalties, but acreage allotments will remain in effect. Price support will be 50% of parity and available only to farmers who comply with their allotment.



The cotton referendum will be held in the County ASCS office December 10, 1963. Mr. Mittel, office manager, states "that producers who planted cotton in 1963 or released their allotment will be eligible to vote." If this referendum carries by 2/3 vote marketing quotas will be in effect and price supports for those planting within their cotton acreage allotments. Should the referendum not carry 50% of parity will be available for those planting within acreage al-

Mr. Mittel states that application for wool and lamb incentives will be taken beginning the month of December and continue through January 31, 1964. He asks that all producers bring proof of sales or sales slips to support incentive applications.

Walt Disney's motion picture from Kate Douglas Wiggins' oncepopular novel, "Mother Carey's Chickens" is easy to take but at times hard to believe.

The story of "Summer Magic" concerns the Widow Carey, suddenly impoverished by her husband's death, who takes her three children from their comfortable Boston home to less expensive living in a Maine village.

The cast is headlined by Hayley Mills as the daughter, along with Dorothy McGuire as the widow, Eddie Hodges and Jimmy Mathers as her sons, Deborah Walley as an ipstaging cousin, Burl Ives as the kindly postmaster who lets the Careys have the house and Una Merkel as his grim wife.

The picture is handsomely mounted, as are most Disney films. There are picturesque settings and sets, the costumes are somewhat sumptuous but in keeping with the turn of the century times. There are lilting songs, of which more can be expected via the nation's disc jockeys.

"Summer Magic" has, to be quite frank, most of the elements of entertainment uncomplicated by messages and problems, social problems that is. It should be a oy to the younger set and the local drive-in should rock with youngish laughter. Older folks would certainly not be harmed by exposure to its simple story.

This is a story of bucolic life n Maine in about 1910. Presumably, the mother and three children are reduced to living on about \$50 a month. Admittedly \$50 was really \$50 some 50 years ago, but t would still hardly buy all the elegance that the Carevs enjoy in their rural retreat. This doesn't mean that Disney should have attired his leading players in rags. but the shine could have been toned down somewhat with a more convincing result.

"Summer Magic" comes a musical film. Disney, never one to overlook the value of music and songs in making a film more attractive, has gone just a bit overboard in this one and the the Twin Mountain District of the players burst out into songs at the unlikeliest times.

Even Chief Justice Warren got into the act. He issued a statement associating the President's tragic death with "racial bigotry

The fact is that Oswald acted as chairman of the Fair Play for Cuba Committee, a well known Communist organization, in New Orleans until late August when he moved to Dallas. Following that he made a trip to Mexico City, visited the Cuban embassy there, and sought a visa to Russia via Havana, but it was either delayed or denied. Oswald was without funds and it may be that Castro's embassy didn't want to put up the money for the trip. Or the embassy may have decided they could make better use of him in

The murderer spent nearly three years in Russia, returning to the U.S.A. in 1962, and in New Orleans boasted of being a Marxist-Leninist and a profound follower of Fidel Castro. Before the murder Oswald applied for membership in the Dallas chapter of the left-wing American Civil Liberties Union. After his arrest he said he wanted a Mr. Abt, a New York attorney to represent him. Abt is notorious for having represented Communists in the past.

The hope we expressed in this space last time that the daughter of Prince de Polignac, the Frenchborn Confederate general who led Texas troops in the Battle of Mansfield, be invited to participate in the 100th anniversary commemoration of that battle, seems about to become a reality.

A long letter from John Ben Sheppard of Odessa, chairman of the thousands of Texans who were the Texas Civil War Centennial members of the Confederate force Advisory Committee, outlined for us the rather ambitious plans for the centennial ceremonies next out recently in Tyler in a joint on April 4 of next year. meeting with delegates from Louisiana and include a provision that the daughter and any other known descendants of General Polignac be extended an invitation to attend the ceremonies.

> Until now no marker has called attention to the fact that approximately 40% of the troops at Mansfield were from East Texas alone and that additional Texans were present from other sections of the state. We first suggested in this space in 1961, following a visit to Mansfield as consultant to the Texas Civil War Centennial Commission, that a marker ought to be erected there.



Peace Corps Test Set For This Saturday

The Peace Corps has announced that Saturday, December 7, is the last opportunity this year to take the Placement Test and qualify for Gilbert and Gillespie counties and the spring training programs. The non-competitive aptitude tests will be administered at about 860 locations (post offices and federal buildings) in principal cities in the United States, beginning at 8:30 a.m., including room 324 of the Federal Building in San An-

For most applicants, the Placement Test wlil take about 11/2 hours. Those who claim a knowledge of Spanish or French will be asked to take an additional one-hour language achievement test.

To become a Volunteer, an applicant must not only take the test but submit a Peace Corps Questionnaire. Those who have not done so will be asked to complete one immediately after the testing. No applicant may take the test for a second time without special authority from the Peace Corps. There are no passing or failing marks on the Placement Test. The scores are used, along with other criteria, to aid in the selection process.

Over 6,000 new opportunities in the Peace Corps are now open in Africa, Asia and Latin-America. India is asking for nurses, Thailand for English teachers, Turkey for social workers, Gabon for carpenters, Brazil wants more community development workers. Dozens of countries are asking for Peace Corps for Volunteers for hundreds of different jobs-especially in fields of engineering, agriculture, health, construction, and education.

Liberal arts college graduates and others with no special "skills" have been found highly useful overseas in the fields of teaching and community development programs. A college education is not required. To qualify to take the Placement Test applicants must be American citizens at least 18 years old. Married couples are eligible if both qualify and have no dependents under 18.



AIRLINE SALUTES PIONEER PILOTS

EL PASO, Tex.—Most famous of the nation's pioneer airliners, a 35-year old Ford Tri-Motor, paid a flying tribute recently past a memorial to pioneer pilots located near here.

The memorial was placed five years ago atop Guadalupe Peak, highest point in Texas, by American Airlines. Guadalupe and companion peaks, notably El Capitan, represented a formidable challenge to the early airmen who flew the mails in the late 20s and early 30s for American's predecessor companies.

The salute by the Ford came exactly five years to the day after the six ft. pyramidal monument was dedicated (September 29). The Ford used for the salute appropriately was one which actually flew for American's immediate predecessor, American Airways. It was restored by the company for eventual presentation to the Smithsonian Institution's new National Air Museum. Meanwhile, it has been making a number of airport visits and was purposely routed through El Paso to pay the tribute.

The Tri-Motor then went on to Renton, Wash., where it took part in the rollout from the Boeing Company plant of American's first 727 Astrojet. The 727 is the first three-engined airliner built in the U.S. since the 30s.

Poll tax repeal was defeated resoundingly by Texans in a constitutional amendment election on November 9. Only one of four proposed amendments carried.

Vote on poll tax repeal was 316,775 against to 243,120 for in the official canvass announced by Secretary of State Crawford C.

Only amendment which carried was the increase in welfare assist ance payments. The vote here was 330,922 for to 192,050 against.

Proposed increase in the Veterans Land Fund authorization failed 258,433 to 250,556. The Jefferson ounty retirement, disability and death compensation fund program for public officials was defeated 250,415 to 218,712.



and Qualify yourself to vote in 1964, since state voters rejected the proposed amendment that would have abolished the poll tax. You will need a valid poll tax receipt next year to vote in the Democratic or Republican primary, elections for school trustees and city aldermen, and any special elections that might be called. People over 60 years of age in this county do not have to have an exemption; 21-yearolds can get their exemption now or in anticipation they will be 21. They must have the exemption 30 days before any election they wish to vote in. Deadline for paying your poll tax is January 31, 1964.

A Reminder: If you have not already paid your County and State taxes, a 1% discount is allowed when payment is made in December.


