

There is romance for the first time and her first real kiss from the opposite sex. It remains to be seen (by viewing the picture) just how far Hayley has advanced from the little-girl characterizations into the area of voung womanhood.

"The Moon-Spinners" is Walt Disney's first foray into the field of mystery-suspense and for this initial exploration he has chosen the story originally written as a novel by Mary Stewart. The story reads well and it has all the elements that go into top quality mystery and suspense films. There are the good guys and the bad guys, intrigue, gunplay, romance, sinister plots and all.

In addition to Hayley, the star cast personally selected by Disney includes Eli Wallach, Pola Negri, Irene Papas, Joan Greenwood and Peter McEnery.

This cast divides out with Hayley, Miss Greenwood as Hayley's aunt and McEnery as the object of Hayley's affections on one side and with Miss Wallach, Miss Negri and Miss Papas, all members of a Cretan family involved in varying degrees in the jewel theft, on the

Interesting in this casting is the return of Miss Negri to films after an absence of 20 years. The oldsters will remember her as the vamp of the silent film era, the flame of Rudolf Valentino. Miss Negri made her last film, "Hey Diddle Diddle," in 1943, just a few months after the Nazis had driven her from her native Poland by confiscating all the property she owned. She has been living in San Antonio for the last six

Approximately 71% of the new farm to market roads approved last week by the Commission presently are in use as school bus routes, and 68% are used by rural

Through the use of these state rural paved roads mail service is improved and children are transported to school more safely and over greater distances at lower cost.
