## County OKs Amendment But It Fails Over State

In the special election Tuesday in which Texas voters went to the polls to vote on the proposed amendment to the State Constitution to enlarge the State Senate from 31 to 39 members, Schleicher voters approved the measure 103 to 60, but it failed to carry over the state as a whole.

As predicted, the voter turnout locally and statewide was light.

On November 2nd, Texas voters will again go to the polls to vote on several amendment proposals.

## CAR REGULATIONS IN SCHOOL ZONE TO BE ENFORCED

The Eldorado Parent-Teacher Association and the Sheriff's department are co-operating in urging parents and students to follow the traffic rules and regulations around our school. The parking and "picking up" facilities need to be used properly to insure the safety of our children. We know that the following recommendations will be carried out for the sake of all of our children:

- Do not exceed 20-mile speed limit around school.
- A COMPLETE stop at all stop signs.
- No double parking behind the designated "head-in" parking area on the San Angelo highway. Parents are urged to pick up only 1st, 2nd and 3rd grade students at this entrance.
- Do not drive through area in front of the band hall from 3:30 'til 4:00.
- Cars entering northeast on Hill street will form a single line and make a u-turn picking up children and exit southwest on same street. Fourth, fifth and sixth grade children should be picked up at this entrance.

We owe it to our children to drive as carefully as possible, especially around the school. Let's try to follow the rules and in this way avoid the needless traffic and confusion.

In last week's Success, school enrollment for the present term was reported to total 608. We looked up the paper for September of last year and discovered the total at that time was 596.

So there is a gain of 12 over last year. That doesn't represent a boom, but it is good to know that Eldorado is holding its own—and gaining a little.

Practically all weekly papers that come to our desk from this area gave reports on their total enrollments, too, in their last week's issues. Here are some of them:

Junction—enrollment this year 769; last year it was 816.

Eden—first day count enrollment down 9.

Menard—first day enrollment was 26 less than that of last year. The combined figure Monday was 446, compared with 472 last year and 501 the year before.

Van Horn—842 pupils, 31 below last year and 59 less than expected by school officials.

Fort Stockton—school enrollment up 5% as 2578 register.

Ozona—Overall enrollment of 1,067, an increase of 47 over last year.

Robert Lee—Total of 351 students enrolled, a figure slightly less than the 366 last year.

Iraan—1965 enrollment within three students of the same period last year, and shows promise of going beyond that.

Sonora—Enrollment is down to 840 compared to last year's 872.

Sterling City—244 pupils enrolled first day, compared to 251 last year.

Sanderson—Enrollment 600 this year, up 17 over last year when it was 583.

## Eagles Go to Eden Tomorrow For Second Game of Season

The Eden Bulldogs open their 1965 football season tomorrow night, playing hosts to their old and reliable opponents, the Eldorado Eagles. It's the Bulldogs' first game and the beginning of his last season for their fine quarterback Robert Stansberry.

Last September 11, the Eagles downed Stansberry & associates by a 14-0 score. But Stansberry was operating behind a big tough line made up of seniors and Eden went on to win bi-district honours in their own "B" conference competition.

But Stansberry won't have such lads as Big John Konz disputing hostile Eagles this time. In fact, Eldorado should have proportionately as much advantage in depth

and physical potential tomorrow night as did Crane over the Eagles last Friday night. This should not be interpreted that the Eagles will not be strongly contested tomorrow night, particularly should they be so unwise as to take the Stansberry kennels for granted.

He will operate behind a Bulldog Split-T offense with an Eden line who remember greatness from last year and who will be full of fight and snap to a high degree. The handicap which will dog their efforts is youth and inexperience and 30 pounds more weight almost a man immediately in front of them.

## Jim Nugeni Is In News Media Group

Speaker Ben Barnes recently announced appointment of three representatives to the Committee to Study News Media on Proceedings in Criminal and/or Civil Courts. They are Representatives Bob Armstrong of Austin, David G. Haines of Bryan, and James E. Nugent of Kerrville.

The committee, authorized by concurrent resolution during the legislative session this year, will make a complete study of problems relating to the rights of news media in reporting information about an accused person in custody or on bail and proceedings in the criminal and civil courts. The problem was raised by provisions included in the new Code of Criminal Procedure passed this session and which becomes effective on January 1.

The House members named by Speaker Barnes will work with 3 Senators appointed by the Lieutenant Governor, three representatives of the news media, and two representatives of the State Bar of Texas, the latter five appointed by the Governor.

On The Screen . . .

Civil War Picture, 'Major Dundee', Coming To Local Theater Saturday

A lusty cavalry vs. Indians outdoor epic is "Major Dundee" which will be shown on the screen of the Eagle Drive-In Theatre Saturday night, with Charlton Heston in the leading role. The film is in color and never lacks for action.

Heston, grimy and bearded, takes arrows in the legs and punches in the jaw as the hard-nosed Union Army major who recruits a prison yard of post-Civil War Rebel prisoners to chase Indians in trade for freedom.

His Southern counterpart, Rebel officer Richard Harris, is the pivotal player of the piece—the man who honors his pledge to serve, but vows to kill Heston "once this is all over." Harris is a fine actor.

There is a slightly new twist to the inevitable brash, young lieutenant, as portrayed by Jim Hutton. The twist is comic, and it wears well against the posturing of Heston and Harris.

"Major Dundee" is an all-man picture, thick with dust and blood, and unalleviated by the brief appearance of actress Senta Berger as romantic interest along the trail of the Apache chase.

Suitable performances are turned in by James Coburn as a scout; Michael Anderson Jr., as the young bugler; Ben Johnson, as a southern sergeant, and Brock Peters, as the Union Army Negro who has his troubles with the Rebel "draftees."

There appears to be a story about Heston and Harris, but you never get it. We guess that once they were friends; now they are foes. Somewhere in their past was West Point with Harris going about his business like a Southern gentleman and Heston going about his like a book soldier.

Things almost come to a head over a dancing widow in a Mexican village played by Austrian actress Senta Berger in fair English.

She adorns fiestas and moonlight trysts. She is also medically useful when Heston is wounded.

She trips easily out of his life, though, when she concludes that he won't "negotiate" a peace.

Possibly she should, as his command is all but wiped out.

This is savage, all right. Director Peckinpah exploits his color camera to make all gore tomato-red. An old Apache custom of hanging whites by their feet and puncturing them with arrowheads is conveyed realistically.

The director yields to a rhythmic sense of pace. While the progress of the picture is detailed, it does have progress.

When he was a year old his family moved to Mills county. Later Mr. Pfluger lived in Eden, Eldorado and finally moved to San Angelo.

He owned extensive farming and ranching interests in Mills, Concho, Schleicher, Irion and Tom Green counties.

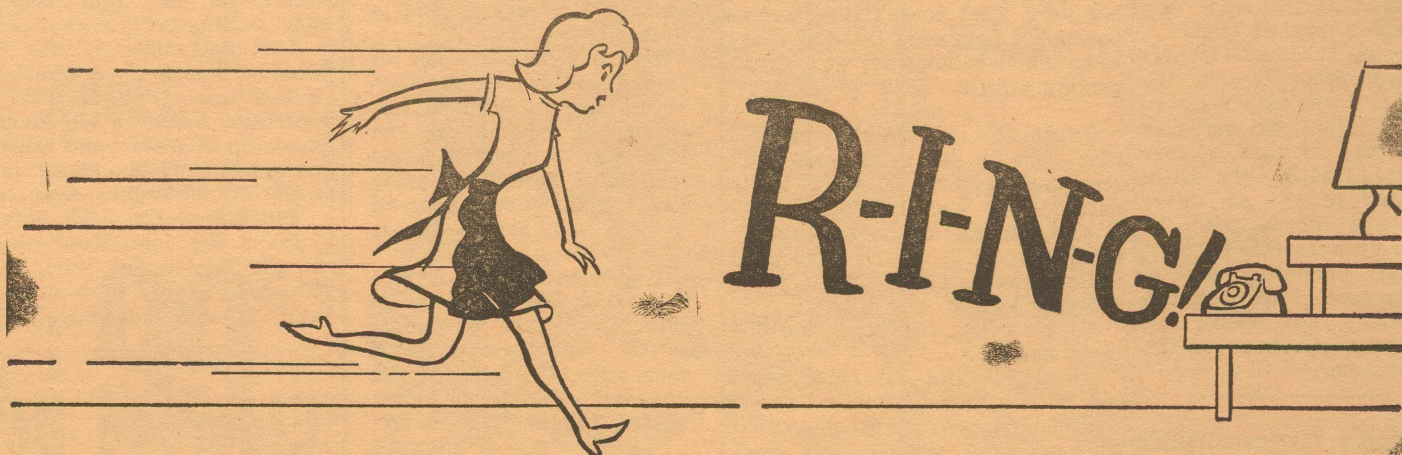

## Ben Brooks Dies

Funeral services were held Saturday in the Tennyson Baptist church for Ben Brooks, 70, father of Mrs. Albert McGinnes of Eldorado.

Mr. Brooks died at his home in Sterling City Thursday morning apparently after a heart attack. He had lived in Sterling City 20 months, having moved there from Tennyson where he had lived since 1908 and operated a stock farm.

He was a former Coke County Commissioner, was a veteran of World War I, member of the American Legion, served as county school trustee and trustee of the Tennyson School Board.

Survivors include his wife; one son, W. R. Brooks of Sterling City; three daughters, Mrs. Albert McGinnes of Eldorado, Mrs. H. J. Hamiter of Phoenix, Arizona, and Mrs. Billy J. Hawkins of San Angelo; three brothers, Eugene and C. J. Brooks, both of Robert Lee, and C. P. Brooks of Philadelphia, Pa.; one sister, Mrs. W. J. Palmer of Grape Creek; and 10 grandchildren.

The McGinnes families of Eldorado attended the funeral services for Mr. Brooks.



Austin, Tex.—Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr came up with some interesting arguments in answer to the Federal suit which attacks the Texas poll tax.

Suit filed by the U. S. Justice Department seeks to get the poll tax ruled invalid as a requirement for voting. Contentions is that the poll tax discriminates against Negroes.

That isn't so, Carr argued Friday in a pre-trial hearing before U. S. District Judge Adrian Spears. Carr claimed that a survey this spring by the Southern Regional Council showed that 57.7% of the Negroes in Texas eligible to vote paid poll taxes and registered to vote, but only 53.2% of the Caucasians registered in that fashion.

Carr also contended that the \$1.50 State poll tax, levied in 1837 as a "head tax," was tied to the right to vote in 1902 not to keep Negroes from voting, but to assure collection of the head tax. He added that revenue from the present \$1.75 poll tax goes to the Available School Fund of the state, amounting to more than \$2 million last year.

The Federal suit citation—which centers on an all-white Austin precinct—was filed under the new federal voting rights act. Carr noted that the U. S. Commission on Civil Rights in 1961 found no discriminatory disenfranchisement. Poll tax procedure is the only

form of voter registration in Texas. So, a Federal court invalidation of the poll tax would mean a special session of the Legislature for the purpose of enacting a new voter registration law.

Carr also asked the court to order U. S. Atty. Gen. Nicholas Katzenbach to clarify whether his suit is aimed at striking down requirements that only property owners may vote in bond elections.

## Robert Lee Dam Authorized

First action of the new State Water Rights Commission was to solve a long-standing problem. It approved the Colorado River Municipal Water District's application to locate its next dam at Robert Lee in Coke county, instead of the earlier authorized site in Mitchell county.

Proposed dam will boost the water supply of Big Spring, Odessa, Snyder, Midland and other areas of West Texas.

Reservoir on the Colorado River will have a 439,000 acre-foot capacity with 40,000 acre feet of water annually diverted for municipal use, 8,000 acre feet for oil well flooding and 2,000 acre feet for industrial plants.

Commission specified that use must come first from existing Lake J. B. Thomas and total diversion from new dam and lake J. B. Thomas will be limited to 73,000 acre feet a year.

LCRA General Manager Sim Gideon praised the commission's order and said the compromise would effect better use of Colorado River water.

Commission also authorized construction of a system of low-flow diversion works in the Colorado River channel in Scurry and Mitchell counties as a salt water pollution control measure and to divert waters for industrial and mining purposes.

## College Super-Board Named

Gov. John Connally appointed the 18 members of the new Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System and handed it the expected assignment to make Texas higher education second to none.

John Gray of Beaumont, who served on the Governor's Committee on Education Beyond the High School which recommended the

"Super-Board", was named chairman.

Other new Coordinating Board members who served on that study committee are Dr. D. M. Wiggins, Lubbock; H. B. Zachry, San Antonio; Tom Sealy, Midland; and M. Harvey Weil, Corpus Christi.

Coordinating Board appointees who have been on the Texas Commission on Higher Education are Dr. Joaquin Cigarroa, Laredo; J. C. Looney, Edinburg; Dan Williams, Dallas; and Charles Prothro, Wichita Falls.

## Mexican Cotton Banned

Texas border will be sealed to free movement of Mexican cotton beginning September 25, Agriculture Commissioner John C. White has announced.

White said late cotton plantings in excess of 6,000 acres and "abandonment of mutual cultural practices against the destructive pink bollworm in Mexico" required the border control action. Pink bollworm has destroyed as much as \$4 million of Rio Grande Valley cotton in one season alone, the commissioner stated.

At its first meeting, new Board for Mental Health and Mental Retardation named Dr. Horace Cromer of Austin its president and Dr. C. J. Ruilman as acting commissioner.

Tuberculosis Advisory Committee elected Arthur H. Dilly of Corpus Christi acting chairman during its first meeting. Committee also recommended appointment of Dr. Roger Smyth as acting director for tuberculosis services and Dr. James Schless as acting assistant director for tuberculosis hospitals.

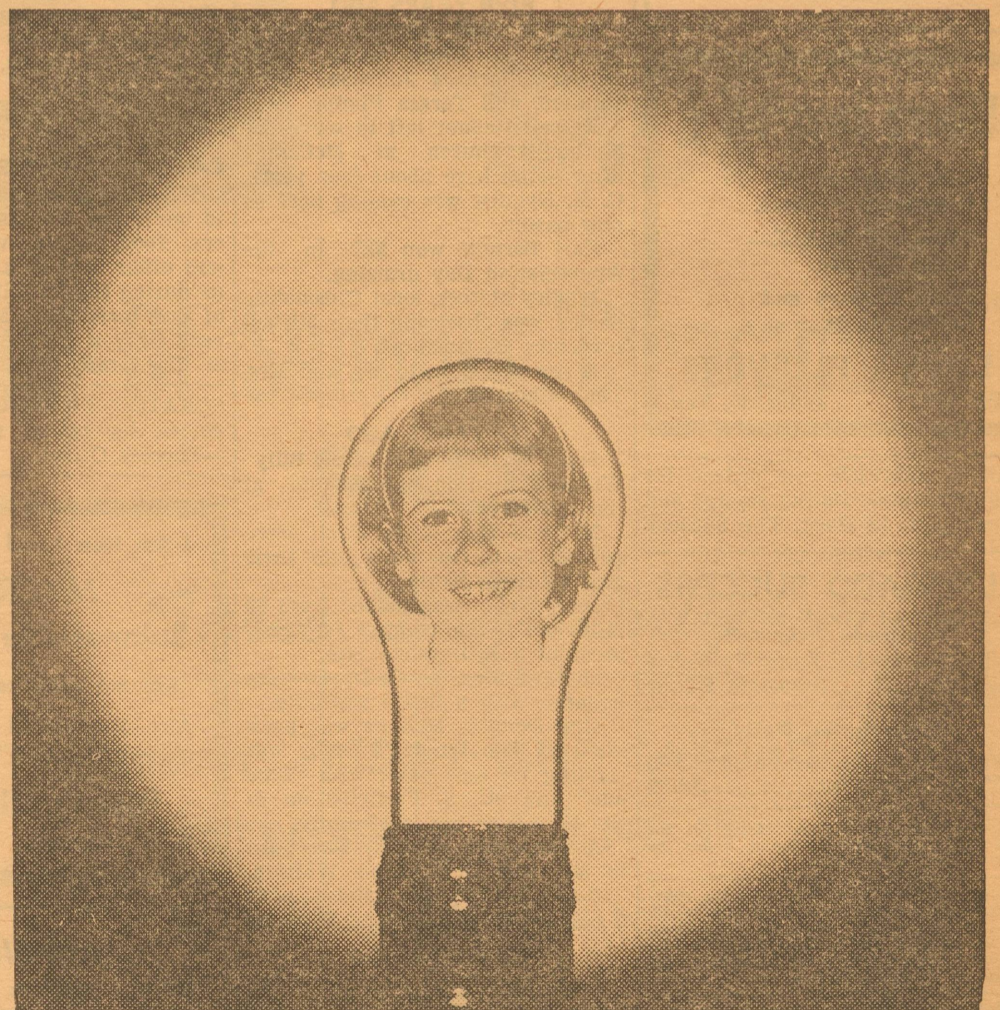

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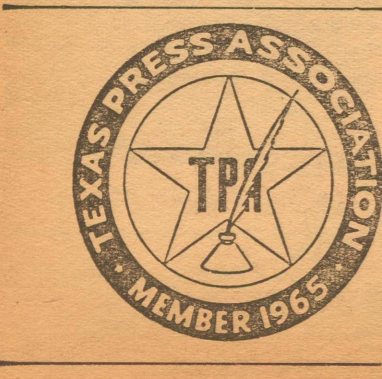

Clark Cites Means To Attract Industry

Harry Clark, executive director of the Texas Industrial Commission, was the speaker at the Lions club met Tuesday at noon in the Memorial Building.

Introduced by Mayor Eldon Calk, Mr. Clark gave an interesting presentation of factors involved when towns wish to attract new income through new industry and payroll.

The three major sources of money in small towns as well as large ones were cited by Mr. Clark as being, first, natural resources, or income from agricultural crops which the farmers spend; second, the money that transients spend whenever they stop in a town; and third, income spent from industrial payroll. That is "new money" which is brought into a town, and differs from "old money" already there which the local people spend with each other.

All towns and cities are competing now for new industry, Mr. Clark pointed out, and major factors considered by any company in locating a new plant are dependent, first, on being able to make a profit in the town in which it locates, and deciding on what town is in turn dependent on more intangible factors.

Mr. Clark went on to cite Research and Analysis regarding the local available supply, schools, churches, housing, etc., and how a new plant can fit in; finance, done by the company, the city, or both working together; sites available in a town, varying from small to large, and availability of utilities and other needs; and finally, the prospects that Eldorado and other small towns can exploit to attract new industry.

Mr. Clark went on to describe prospects for new industry as coming from several sources in Eldorado or any town. Local industries, already here, are in position to know the local situations and what new businesses might "make a go of it." Second, some local promoters may come up with original ideas regarding new enterprise.

Third, there are allies such as the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, the utility companies, and the Texas Industrial Commission which will aid any community which puts forth effort. Fourth, Texas manufacturers themselves are in position to know in advance of expansion plans of many firms, and fifth, local people can do all in their power to exploit all possible contacts through their jobs and businesses.

Mr. Clark cited the well-known statistic that in the past 35 years over a hundred small communities in Texas have vanished, and that in the coming 35, about that many more will also probably go by the wayside. Small towns got their start as rural trading centers, but with modern transportation and easy means of transportation to larger trading centers, communities everywhere are having to try to attract additional payroll thru new industry.

Post-war expansion of the gross national product has affected all lines of manufacture. It is expected that by 1975, the value of manufactured products will be twice what it was in 1950.

Mr. Clark's talk was well received by the club, and he went on to Midland that night to give another talk.

He had a good mention for El Dorado Woolens which has been reorganized and expanded the past two years and which held open house in their fine new building just this past April.

Ray Boyer presided at the Lions club meeting, and guests were E. C. Peters, Jimmy Powell, and Tom Wallace, all of Eldorado.

It was announced that there will be no meeting of the Lions club on September 22nd, while the Rileys are away on a trip.
