The order as given in the clerk's minutes reads as follows:

It is hereby ordered by the Court that the following employees who have passed the age of 65 years be relieved of their duties as of January 1, 1966, with two weeks paid vacation: Norman G. Hodges, Ben Biggs, Ida C. Neill, Jud Brannan, and Fred Gillaspay.

Employment of custodian: It is hereby ordered by the Court that J. B. Dockal be employed as custodian of the courthouse. Memorial building, jail and courtyard at a salary of \$350 per month. His duties are to begin December 15, 1965, under direct supervision of the County Judge.

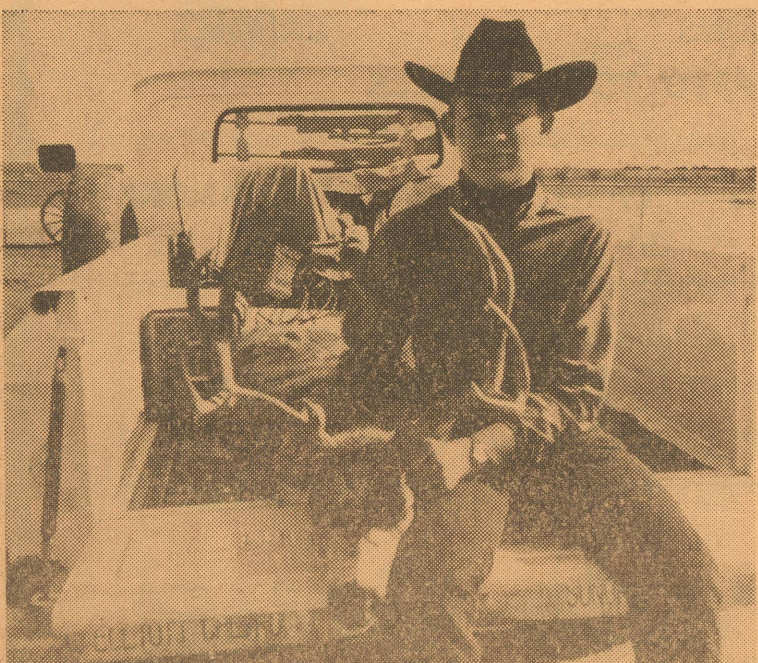

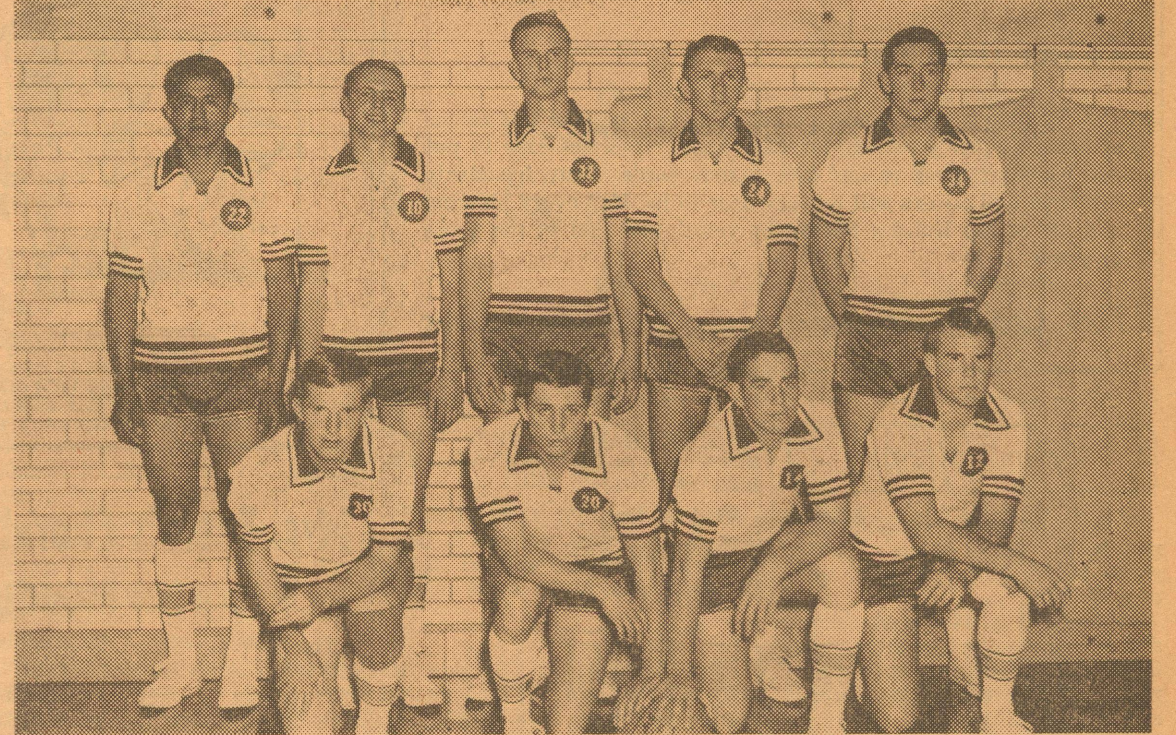

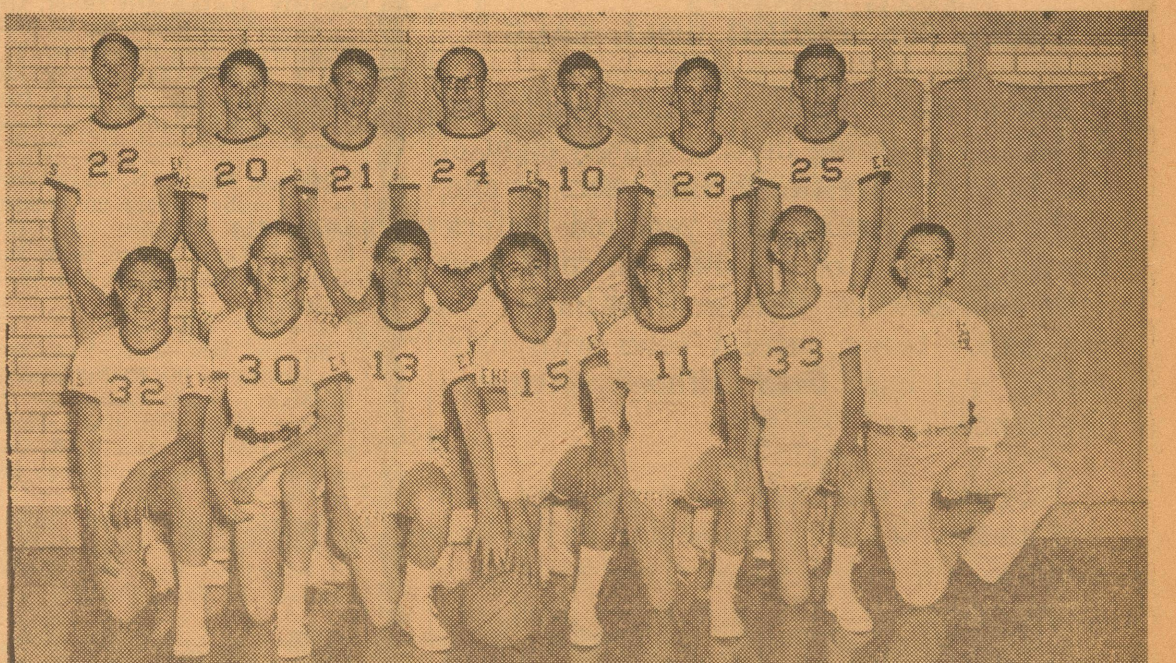

Girls Going To Ozona Tuesday For Game

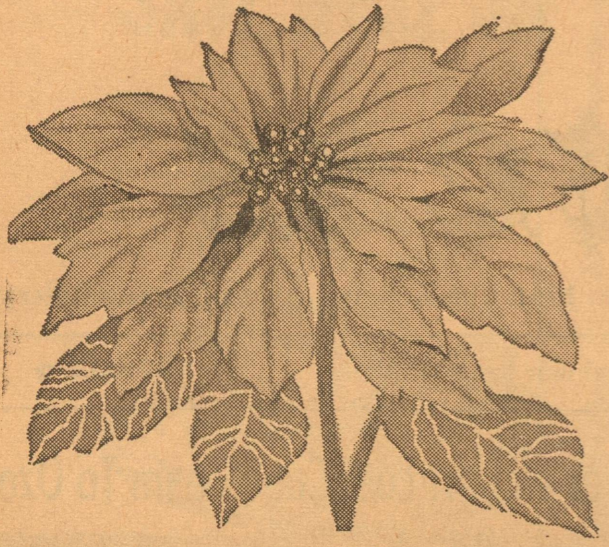
After clubbing Ozona 70-22 a little over a week ago, the girls' basketball team will travel to Ozona for a return match.

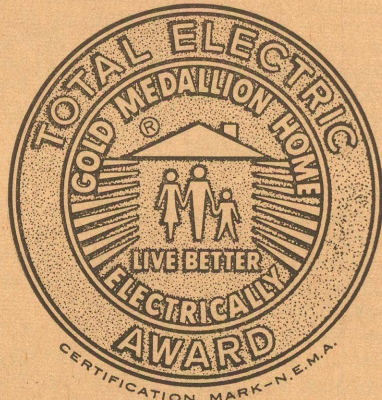
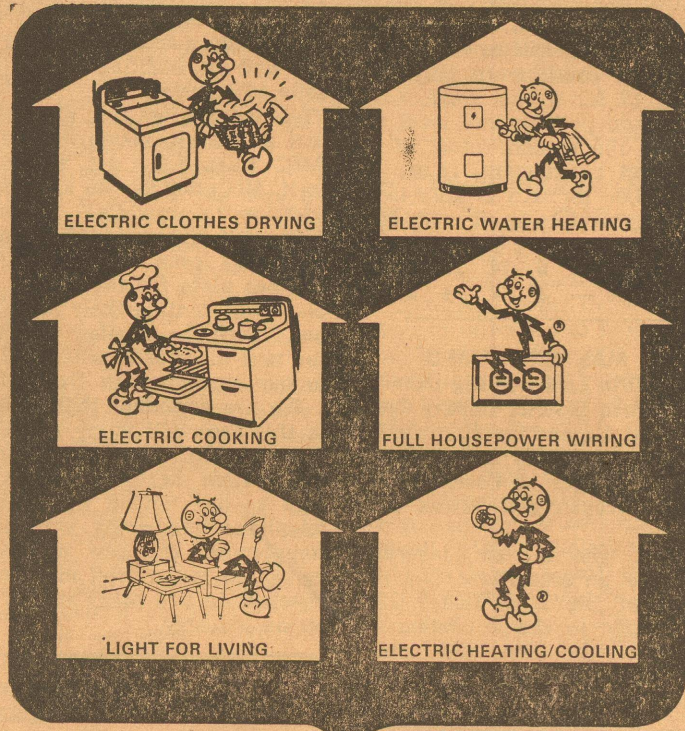

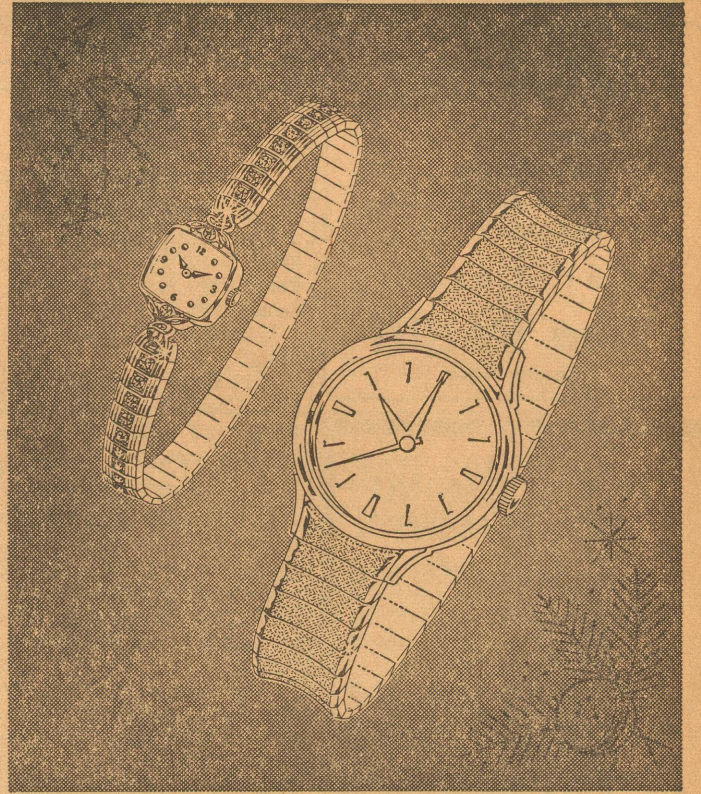

tants while creating less confusion and making for a better show for spectators.

Time of the Showmanship Contest—2:00 p.m., Saturday, December 11, 1965 at the Schleicher County Livestock Pavilion.

General Rules and Showmanship Classes:

1. This contest on showmanship is open to contestants between the ages 8 to 20.
2. Boys and girls competing do not have to be a member of 4-H or FFA but must be enrolled in the Eldorado Independent School District.
3. Boys and girls competing must be neatly dressed—appropriate for the occasion.
4. Livestock shown will not be placed but should be properly groomed and taught to show before the contest.
5. The rules of showmanship will be followed and each contestant judged accordingly.
6. Contestants will observe and show their livestock to the person in the show ring, even though the showmanship judge may be stationed outside of the show ring.
7. Ribbons 1-5 will be presented to contestants in each class.
8. There are 5 classes of showmanship.
 - Class I—1st year showmanship boys and girls who did not show animals in Spring of '65. (Does not have to own animals).
 - Class II—Junior boys and girls that have shown only at one or two county shows but have not shown in major shows.
 - Class III—Senior boys and girls who have shown in county or major shows but have never received a showmanship award.
 - Class IV—Boys and girls who have won showmanship awards regardless of age.
 - Class V—Championship, 1st of each class.

Grooming Contest

It is of utmost importance that 4-H boys and girls and F.F.A. boys learn to groom animals properly so that the animal may be displayed to the best advantage in the show ring. A poorly groomed animal will never place well regardless of quality. The judge feels if you are not interested enough in your project to learn to groom the animal properly, then he should not place your animal above an animal that has almost the same quality and is properly groomed.

The animals used in showmanship contest will be judged prior to showmanship contest Saturday, Dec. 11, 1965 at the Schleicher County Livestock Pavilion.

General Rules and Grooming Classes:

1. This contest on grooming is open to contestant between the ages of 8-20.
 2. Each boy and girl will bring one animal that has already been groomed.
 3. The animal does not have to be owned that you show.
 4. The judges will place the animals and their decision will be final.
 5. Ribbons 1-5 will be presented to contestants in each class.
- Classes are as follows:
- Class I—Boys and girls that have never shown before in a show.
 - Class II—Boys and girls that are in the 8th grade and under that have shown before.
 - Class III—Sr. Boys and girls that have not shown show type animals over two years.
 - Class IV—Sr. Boys and girls that have shown for several years.
 - Class V—First place of all classes.

Home Demonstration Agent's Column

By MRS. VIDA KREKLOW

For months I've meant to give you a marvelous Chocolate Cake recipe. One of those good ones and not too difficult to make. It is one of those cakes which is good enough to serve to family, friends, or plain and fancy company.

Make up a couple and freeze one—after all we can't be cutting on the fruit cake yet.

Martha Lee Meador gave me this recipe after I had the cake at her house and asked for it especially so I could give it to you.

Martha Lee's Chocolate Cake

Melt 1 stick oleo and 1/2 cup cup Crisco in 1 cup water and bring to boil. Pour over the following, which has been measured on wax paper:

- 2 cups sugar
 - 2 cups flour
 - 4 heaping tablespoons cocoa
 - 1 teaspoon soda
 - 1/4 teaspoon salt.
- Mix well and add 2 eggs. Beat well—then add 1/2 cup buttermilk and 1 teaspoon vanilla. Add chopped pecans.

Pour mixture in greased floured pans. Bake at 350 F. for 25 to 30 minutes.

While cake is baking, heat following in a saucepan:

- 1 pkg. powdered sugar
- 4 heaping tablespoons cocoa
- 1 stick oleo
- 6 tablespoons milk
- 1 tablespoon vanilla
- 3/4 cup pecans.

This should be hot at time cake is removed from oven. Pour hot icing over cake.

One way for the children to have a little good "clean fun" is to let them make a bowlful of suds-snow. Packaged soap or detergent and a little water is all that is necessary.

Pour a generous "dose" of soap or detergent into a large bowl. The children can use a rotary beater or an electric mixer to whip up mountains of wonderful "suds-snow" that looks for the world like meringue.

One fun thing that children like to do is to paint Santa Claus' whiskers around his own image on his face in a mirror. When the suds-snow dries it will last for days. And when the children and everything else they have decorated need to be cleaned up, they do clean easily.

I have just read the article which follows and it sounds perfectly logical. Now that plastic in many different "weights" or thicknesses can be bought in nearly all department stores, why don't you make yourself one and make one for a gift for somebody. It would be dandy for bathing a baby or doing other drippy things.

Plastic "Work-Skirt" Protects Clothing

Sponge-Clean Overall is inexpensive and Practical. Messy or splashy household jobs—like polishing silver, washing windows, sudsing out hand-washables, and scrubbing floors—may play havoc with the worker's clothes unless she wears some kind of protective cover.

A washable plastic skirt worn over a housedress keeps it clean and also the wearer dry. It is easy to stitch up one of these "clothes-savers" by machine, using a length of inexpensive plastic and any simple, full-skirt pattern. Plain seams are adequate because plastic does not ravel or fray. Sew on strips of ready-made snap-on fasteners for a button-down-the-front skirt. Use a double-fold strip of the plastic as a waistband; the raw edge serves as a satisfactory hem. Just make sure to cut the skirt several inches larger than dress size for adequate protection even while seated.

With this type of plastic cover-all, the wearer can sit down to

polish silver or brass in her lap. This makes it possible to get a good grip on the piece without smearing or staining clothes. The overall can also be slipped on over a party dress when there are last minute kitchen duties to perform before guests arrive.

Splashes of polishes, paint, waxes, and ordinary soil are easy to suds away after each wearing. Just immerse the plastic skirt in warm soap or detergent suds, squish it up and down in the water, rinse it well, and hang it up to drip dry.

Good Idea From A&M

If the Christmas dinner tablecloth must be washed and "done up" before its next use, try this trick.

After laundering the tablecloth, hang it up instead of creasing through folding or rolling it up. Lightly fold the cloth in thirds lengthwise, drape it over the crossbar of a wooden hanger and cover it with a plastic bag. The cross bar of the hanger may be padded with a plastic clothes bag and further reduce the chance of creasing.

This is too funny, thinking how slow one can be. I've been doing this very same thing with bedspreads for years, but never thought of it for a tablecloth. So remember it for spreads too. I'll have to write my friend at A&M about the spread idea now that she has written me about the tablecloth.

Book Series Completed On Texas History

Mrs. J. L. Ratliff received two books recently published by Steck-Vaughn Company, Austin, to complete a six-volume set on Texas history. Her son, Dr. Odie B. Faulk of Tucson, Arizona, is author of one of the volumes and co-author of the other.

A Successful Failure, which he wrote, is a saga of Texas from 1519-1810 when Texas remained a Spanish possession in spite of Indian raids, French efforts to establish a colony, and in face of claims in the United States that Texas was a part of the Louisiana Purchase. Texas After Spindletop (1901-1965) by Seth S. McKay and Odie B. Faulk begins with a gusher in Southeast Texas and ends with an election of a Texan as President of the United States.

Other books in the series include: The Revolutionary Decades (1810-1836) by David M. Vigness; Adventure in Glory (1836-1849), by Seymour V. Conner; Texas in Turmoil (1849-1875), by Ernest Wallace; and the Search for Maturity (1875-1900) by Billy Jones.

Dr. Faulk's first publication, Tom Green: A Fightin' Texan, was written as his thesis while at San Angelo College. He is the author of The Last Years of Spanish Texas and co-author of Government by the People, and Lancers for the King.

Odie B. Faulk received B. S., M. A. and Ph. D. degrees from Texas Technological College at Lubbock. He taught history at Tex. A&M University and has been assistant editor of Arizona and the West, a newspaper published at Arizona State University, Tucson.

He is well into his second year with a television program on Arizona history which is very popular in Arizona, as Arizona history is not taught in most Arizona schools. He is in great demand as a public speaker all over the state.

Dr. Faulk was appointed recently to the Committee on Landmarks for the State of Arizona by Governor Goddard.

He is married and has two children.

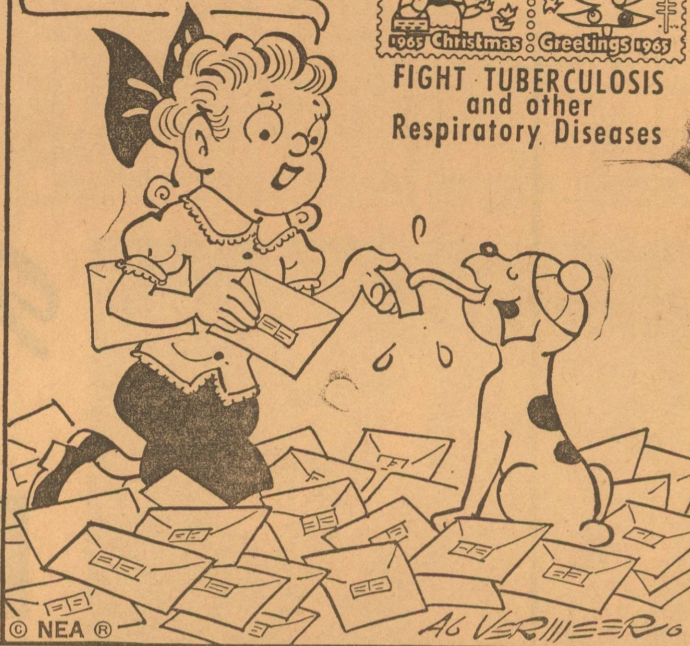

Austin.—Fate of Texas' 63-year-old poll tax as a voting requirement rests in the hands of a three-judge federal court. They heard four hours of arguments here last week in an historic case to abolish the levy.

Judges announced that no immediate ruling would be made. They advised Texans who want to be eligible to vote next year to pay the \$1.75 fee before the January 31 deadline.

In frequent questions during the arguments, the judges indicated

concern over several complex legal points.

Circuit Judge John R. Brown reportedly speculated on the court's earlier position, in assessing an apparently unsupported congressional finding in the 1965 voting rights act, that the Texas levy discriminates against Negroes.

"How do we go about reviewing the basis for a congressional finding?" Brown wondered aloud. "Or does the case come to us as though Congress had not made these findings? This is a very unusual point of law."

Texas Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr maintained that Congress had made its finding "without so much as a scintilla of evidence." He pointed out that U.S. Atty. Gen. Nicholas Katzenbach himself had testified before a Senate committee that he had no complaints of voter discrimination in this state. Katzenbach later filed the suit under terms of the voting rights act.

U. S. Justice Department Atty. Stephen J. Pollak, acknowledges that there is no overt refusal to give Texas Negroes voting rights,

argued that due to basically inferior education, income of Negroes is lower and the tax, therefore, falls heavier on them.

One judge wondered, perhaps hopefully, if the U. S. Supreme Court might rule on some of the questions submitted in an earlier Virginia case before federal judges in Texas have to hand down their decision.

Hearing here was the first of four cases brought by the justice department, under congressional direction, to challenge poll tax validity head-on. Others will be held in Mississippi on December 10; Alabama on December 20; and Virginia on January 17.

Pollution Program

Gov. John Connally has advised John Gardner, U.S. Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare, that Texas plans to control pollution on its streams and in its coastal waters.

Such a certification is required by the new federal law aimed at stopping pollution of public waters throughout the United States. If states fail to get pollution control programs in operation by June 30, 1967, then Uncle Sam will take over and adopt its own programs and rules.

Connally's formal certification came as the Texas Water Pollution Control took its biggest step yet. It adopted rules and standards for discharges of municipal and industrial waste into the Houston Ship Channel. Industry spokesmen at the public hearing estimated Ship Channel industry will have to spend between \$50 million and \$100 million for treatment facilities to meet these standards.

Even then, Joe G. Moore, Jr., chairman of the board, estimated that the new requirements would eliminate only half the pollution in the Channel.

Mayor Seaborn Cravey of Baytown strongly protested against the Board plan to allow more pollution in the mid-Channel area above Baytown. He fears fish kills which sometimes make living unbearable in Baytown will continue when rains wash slugs of polluted water down the Channel.

But the Board unanimously adopted its three-zone plan, effective immediately.

A seventh member was added to the Board by Connally's selection of Howard Rose of Midland, his former administrative assistant. He will represent the public.

News Committee Meets

A nine-member committee studying the role of the press in crime and court news coverage declared its opposition to legislation that would restrict news reporters in covering stories.

Lawmakers and news executives serve on committee set up by last Legislature. Group selected Felix McKnight, Dallas Times Herald editor, as chairman.

McKnight said the Committee hopes to establish guidelines to protect the rights of individuals named in court charges; also to preserve freedom of the press; and to avoid a fight over legislation.

Courts Speak

State Supreme Court refused to review a case involving the will of the late Mrs. Sarida Kenedy East, estimated at \$300 million. Court also refused to grant a writ of error to the group contesting the will. Contest has never been tried.

Court of Criminal Appeals reversed Houston and Bryan murder convictions because of improper questioning and insufficient circumstantial evidence in trial courts.

Appointments

William A. Hazlewood Jr. of Abilene is the new assistant veterans employment representative with the Texas Employment Commission. He will work out of Dallas.

Salt Water Pollution Committee of the House of Representatives held its first meeting here. Rep. Renal Rosson of Snyder is chairman. Members include Reps. John Allen of Longview, Temple Dickson of Sweetwater, Tom Holmes of Granbury and Felix McDonald of Edinburg. Also Joe Kilgore of Austin, Harry Loftis of Tyler, Charles P. McGaha of Wichita Falls, Judge W. H. Rampy of Winters and John Ben Shepperd of Odessa.

Land Program Ends

State Veterans Land Program ended November 30 when the last commitment for purchase of property was issued.

Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler said 35,500 Texas veterans bought over 3-million acres of land at average price of \$81 an acre. On November 2 Texas voters turned down a constitutional amendment proposal designed to extend the long-term, low-interest, land land purchase program.

Aggie Coeds?

Board members of Texas A&M University denied a report that they voted to admit girls to the virtually all-male school on a non-discriminatory basis.

Chairman later said qualified women should be admitted if they could not get degrees at another university in fields they want to pursue. He said A&M Pres. Earl Rudder was asked to study every

coed application in order to guard against discrimination. He revealed that a committee will report its findings on the question of co-education next April.

Attorney General Carr recently declared that present policies of admitting only women who are wives, daughters or widows of faculty members and students would be difficult to defend in court. He proposed that A&M either limit its enrollment to men only or become fully co-educational.

Attorney General Rules

University faculty members may serve unpaid on state or federal boards or commissions not exercising sovereign powers, subject to Board of Regents' approval, Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr held.

In other opinions, Carr concluded: A person must be present in person to enter a plea of guilty to misdemeanor charges punishable by jail sentence. An appropriation to the Upper Red River Flood Control and Irrigation District, for a water gauging station at Prairie Dog Fork Bridge in Hall county, is valid.
