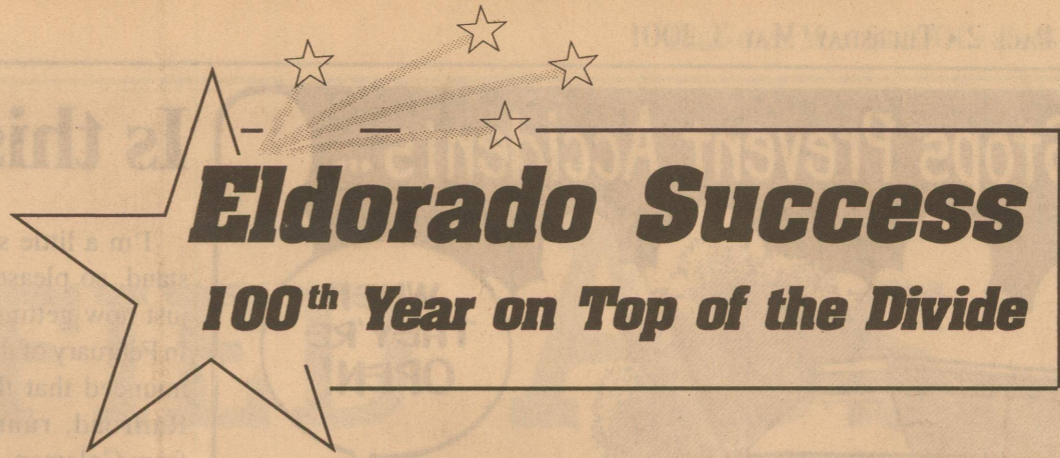
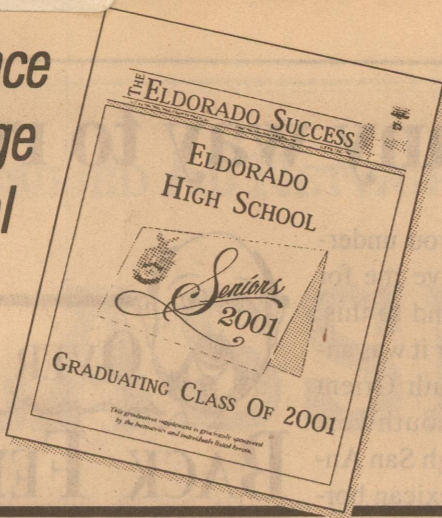

Hospital board eyes threat of lawsuit from former physician

The Schleicher County Medical Center (SCMC) board of trustees went behind closed doors Monday night for a series of three executive sessions. The agenda for the meeting listed the purpose of the executive sessions as being for the discussion of personnel matters, the evaluation of Preferred Management, the company that oversees day-to-day operations of the hospital, and a consultation

with the district's attorney concerning pending litigation. Meeting with the board was attorney James Kosub as well as Andy Freeman of Preferred Management. Also joining in portions of the executive session were Hospital Administrator Ann Fagan-Cook and Assistant Administrator Beverly Minor.

When the board emerged into open session some two and one-half hours later, they voted unanimously to direct attorney Kosub to answer correspondence from a Houston attorney. The Success has learned that former SCMC physician Randall Sloan, through his attorney in Houston, has indicated a desire to sue the district for breach of contract.

Dr. Sloan left SCMC at the end of December, 2000, after his contract with the hospital district reportedly expired. According to story in the April 19, 2001 edition of the Eden Echo newspaper, Dr. Sloan has joined the staff of the Concho County Hospital in Eden.

Next, the board trustees voted to continue negotiations with Dr. Albert Empedrad and to invite him to visit Eldorado and to meet the

board. It was explained that Dr. Empedrad, a native of the Philippines, is working in the United States under a "J-1" visa and currently lives in California. One of the requirements of the J-1 program is that physicians in the program must live and work in a medically underserved area. Schleicher County qualifies as an underserved area under current federal rules.

The meeting was the board's regular monthly session and was called to order by Board President Judy Christian at 6:00 p.m. On hand for the meeting were trustees Shirley Joiner, Lanis Mikeska, John Callison, Jim Marin, Delia Pina and Randy Mankin. After an invocation, led by Jim Martin, the board went immediately into executive session.

Following the two votes mentioned above, the trustees approved the minutes of the March 26 meeting. They then took up discussion of the district's financial reports. During the review it was noted that the hospital's financial picture continues to improve. It was explained that during March, the district had to use less than half of the budgeted tax subsidy to balance the books. The board reviewed and approved the district's financial statement, check journal, statistics report, cash flow report and bad debt listing.

Hospital Administrator Ann Fagan-Cook reported that the nursing home was currently operating at 93 percent occupancy. She noted one bed was vacant but that she expected it would be filled quickly from a waiting list. Fagan-Cook also reported that the hospital may soon be receiving additional funds following the settlement of a class action lawsuit against two asbestos manufacturers. She told the board that she had been notified that SCMC would be participating in the settlement. However, she said she had no idea when the money would be coming nor how much the district could expect to receive. Three years ago the hospital district received \$440,928.33 as its part of a class action settlement with W.R. Grace Company, another asbestos manufacturer.

Ms. Fagan-Cook also explained that new federal privacy rules went

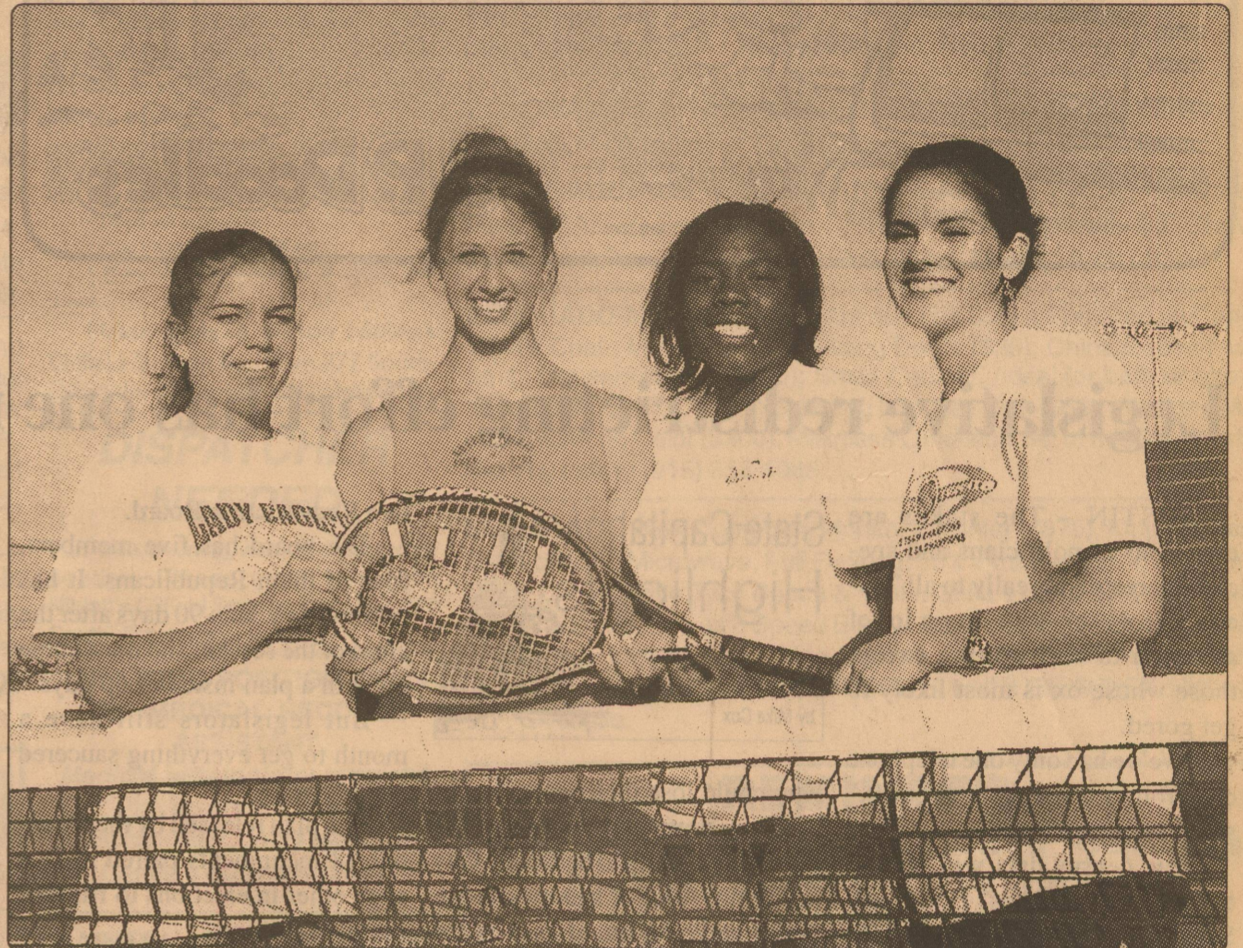

One quarter of the girls doubles teams at the State 2A Tennis Tournament next week will be from Eldorado. The team of Kayla McCravey and Gentry Newman will be there. So will Lindsay Beach and Christina Redish. That after the Eldorado girls dominated the Region 1-2A Tournament in Abilene on Wednesday and Thursday of last week.

McCravey and Newman won the Regional doubles title by defeating their teammates Beach and Redish in the finals. Not to worry though, both teams are headed to

the State Tourney in Austin. But a controversy over the State Tournament bracket unfolded this week after it was learned that the tournament organizers had broken with tradition and placed both Eldorado teams on the same side of the tourney bracket. That would force the two teams to play one another in the second round, provided they both advanced past their first round opponents. It would also eliminate the possibility of an all Eldorado final.

EHS head tennis coach Matt Rutherford is complaining to ev-

Bullard earns 3rd trip to State Track Meet

Saturday was a gorgeous day for a track meet and EHS senior Joey Bullard made the best of it, notching up a leap of 46-7 to win the Triple-Jump event at the Region 1-2A Track Meet in Abilene. The jump was Bullard's personal best and it earned for him yet another trip to the State Track Meet in Austin. Bullard's first appearance in the big show came in his sophomore year in 1999. Last year Bullard made a return trip, placing 5th with a jump of 44-10.

Bullard also competed in the 800 Meter Run at the Regional Meet. He finished, 6th with a time of 2:04.56.

The two-day meet was held in Abilene Christian University's Elmer Gray Stadium. On Friday, April 27, EHS senior Stacy Nicholson won a 3rd Place Bronze Medal in the Shot Put with a toss of 39-9. Leandra Tate of Albany won the event with a distance of 44-3.5, shattering the old meet record of 41-1, previously set by Celinda Whisenant of Dublin in 1995. Sophomore Christina Redish placed 6th with a personal best throw of 34-0.5.

Senior, Sammy Cabrera, a

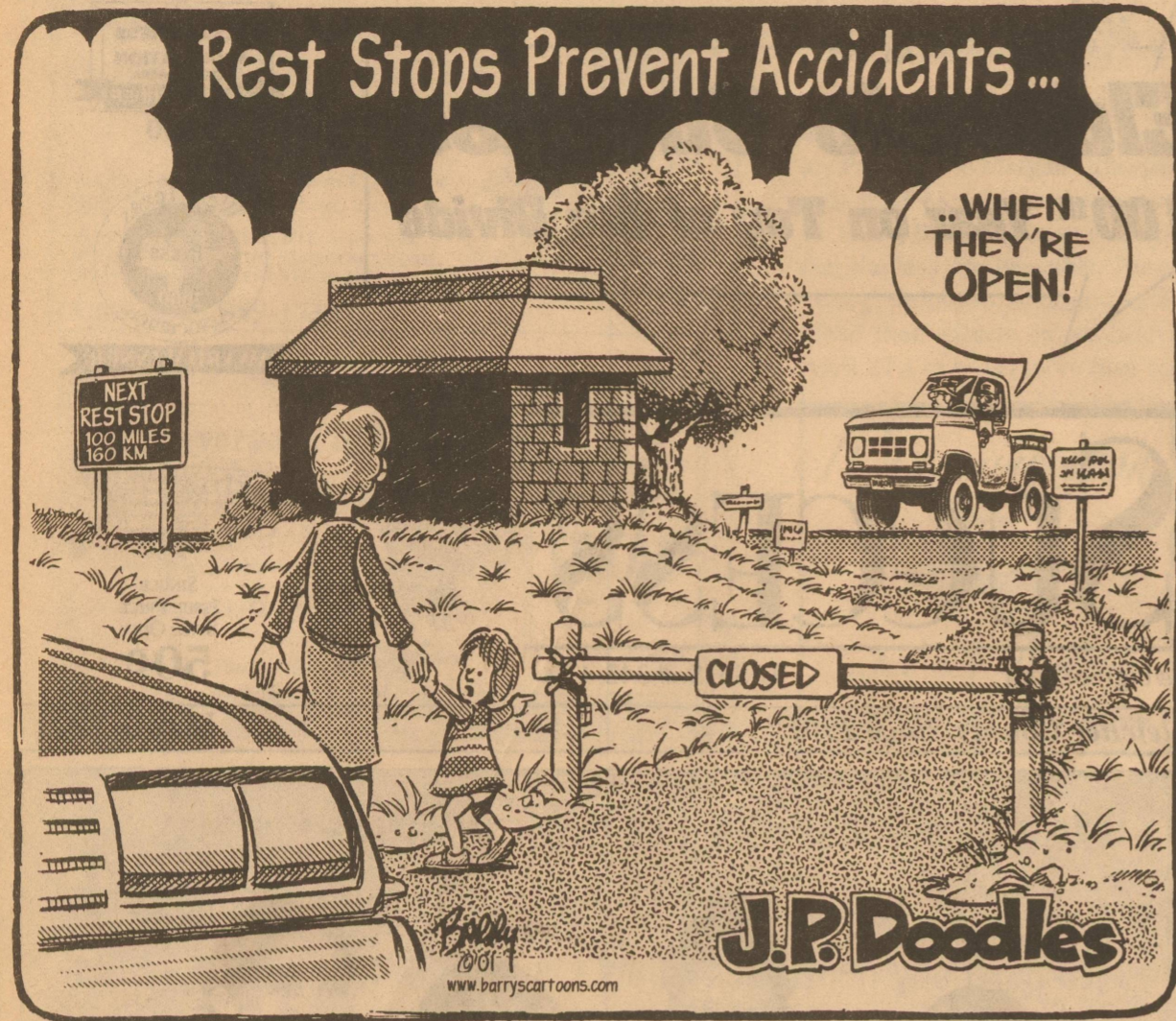
state cross county medalist, also competed in the Regional Meet. He closed out an outstanding high school career by placing 5th in the 1600 Meter Run with a time of 4:44.93 and 10th in the 3200 Meter Run with a time of 10:35.16.

The State Track Meet will be held on Friday and Saturday, May 11 & 12 in Mike Meyers Stadium on the campus of the University of Texas. Joey Bullard will be competing in the Triple Jump at 3:00 p.m. on Friday afternoon, May 11th.

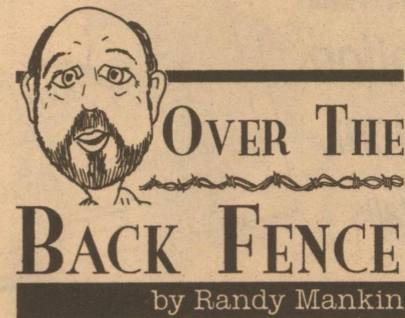

Is this any way to run a railroad?



I'm a little slow, you understand, so please forgive me for just now getting around to this. In February of this year it was announced that the South Orient Railroad, running southwest from Coleman, through San Angelo and on to the Mexican border, is being taken over by the State of Texas. For a mere \$9.5 million we citizens of the Lone Star State have purchased an international railway, and we're placing it in the hands of the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT).

Okay, you ask, so what's the big deal? Well, it occurred to me that one of Texas' largest and most powerful state agencies is the Texas Railroad Commission (RRC). It was formed specifically to oversee the railroad industry. So why then wasn't the RRC

chosen to take over and operate the South Orient Railroad Line? So, I called Austin and started asking questions.

My call was bounced from one bureaucrat to another until I reached one who seemed to have the answer. He pointed out that, by their very nature, railroads are in the business of transporting goods. Therefore, he said, TxDOT was the obvious choice since it is the agency responsible for transportation.

Allright, I said. Why is it that the trucking industry, which is also involved in transporting goods, is regulated by the Railroad Commission?

There was a long pause, then the voice on the other end of the line said he would have to forward my call to someone else.

After wandering around in a maze of voice mail messages for several minutes, my call was finally taken by a lady who seemed genuinely interested in my question. So, I repeated it...Why isn't the Railroad Commission going to operate the South Orient Line?

Her answer was virtually the same as I had received from the

earlier gentleman, TxDOT is charged with regulating transportation and since railroads are involved in transportation, well...it's only natural.

So, I repeated my second question. Why then is the trucking industry, which is also involved in transportation, regulated by the RRC?

Again, there was a long pause. Finally the woman replied, "That's a very good question."

Before she could transfer my call to anyone else I jumped in with a third question, "And, I would like to know why it is that the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission does not regulate the production of natural resources like oil and natural gas?"

"It doesn't?" she was now asking me questions.

"Nope," I replied. "The name implies that it does but it doesn't."

"Well, who does?" was her next question.

"You're not going to believe it," I told her.

Once more, there was a long pause then she said, "Don't tell me..."

"Yep," I said, "the oilfield is regulated by the Texas Railroad Commission. Does that make any sense?"

Just before she hung up on me the woman replied, "Sir, nobody ever said that government had to make sense. Have a nice day!"

Legislative redistricting effort has one month to go

AUSTIN - The stakes are enormous to politicians and special interests and really to all Texans, but no one's paying a lot of attention to redistricting except those whose ox is most likely to get gored.

"We've had only one telephone call from a constituent about it," said one House member's staffer.

New census data will change the makeup of Texas' House and Senate districts, not to mention the states' Congressional districts. But those who are the most intensely interested in the process are those

who could lose their seats over it. From now until the end of the session, it's going to be Dodge City in Austin. A lot of shooting is going to be going on, at least in the figurative sense.

If a redistricting plan does not get out of the Legislature, the matter falls into the lap of the Legisla-

tive Redistricting Board.

The board has five members, four of them Republicans. It has to convene within 90 days after the close of the session and must come up with a plan inside of 60 days.

But legislators still have a month to get everything sauced and blowed.

The plan released by the House has 18 incumbents paired to face each other in elections to fill nine redrawn districts.

Gambling bill comes up 7s

The House has approved a bill that amounts to a good roll of the dice for Indian gambling interests in Texas.

McAllen Democrat Juan Hinojosa's House Bill 514 would legalize casinos operated by the Kickapoo in Eagle Pass and the Tiguas in El Paso. It also would load the dice in favor of the Alabama Coushatta's aspirations to open a casino in East Texas.

Hinojosa says the casinos are good for tourism and have created jobs for Indians. Prior to the opening of the Tigua casino in 1993, he said, the tribe's suicide rate was three times higher than the national average.

Opponents maintain that the bill is a first step toward legalized gambling statewide.

While the 82-60 vote moving this bill out of the House amounts to a nice cut of the cards for those supporting Indian gaming, the

jackpot remains up for grabs.

Similar legislation still has to make it through the Senate. And still pending is a lawsuit filed by the Attorney General's Office that would shut down the Tigua casino.

Dallas needs the water

Years ago, the story goes, the men's room in the old Fort Worth Press had a chain pull toilet with an overhead tank.

Written on the tank was this slam: "Pull the chain. Dallas needs the water."

The Trinity River, of course, flows through Fort Worth before it gets to Big D.

Maybe the late Tom Landry can help ease the long-standing rivalry between the two cities.

The House has passed a bill that would name a portion of Interstate 30 between Fort Worth and Dallas in honor of the former head coach of the Dallas Cowboys.

Speaking in favor of the bill, Fort Worth Rep. Anna Mowery said it was "one of the very few things Dallas and Fort Worth agree completely about."

Rep. Tony Goolsby of Dallas, the bill's sponsor, put the measure in even sharper perspective: "It is my hope the long feud between Dallas and Fort Worth can be mended and brought together by this great gentleman."

A companion bill is still pending in the Senate.

Setting the Stage for the Big Entertainers

When I first knew Charles Sweeney he was in high school and his nickname was Chip. He got involved in radio news in Houston and people started calling him Scoop. He now lives in California and has a website called Stage Dude. He works in concert production, stage managing major acts all over northern California. For a really big show, his work starts a month or two in advance.

"Basically, my responsibility is to pull together all the pieces that will one day make the show happen: lighting, sound, staging, hiring stage hands, dealing with security companies, all sorts of things. It's like building a small city that's gonna be there for a day, then will go away."

For a really big show, five or six eighteen-wheelers will pull up to the concert site. They're full of band instruments and lighting and sound equipment.

"I'm always the first one there and I enjoy seeing the empty lot just before dawn. I try to picture what it's going to look like. By noon you've got security, a medical operation, fencing, caterers, vendors, the stage area. It's like a little village. Then around midnight they start tearing down and within a few hours it's an empty lot again. It's an interesting life."

He says Chris LeDoux always has a bunch of fireworks and flowers. "He shows up with full pyrotechnics which takes a whole day to set up. He has a pyro-technician who travels with him. We set up charges that makes the place look

like World War Three when Chris hits them during his show. We have to bring in fire marshals, put up danger zone signs. It's an intense thing."

Chris has to have fifty red carnations and fifty white carnations before every show.

"Basically, he just grabs them and throws them out to the fans. Here I am, spending a couple of hours in the middle of Nowhere, California trying to find carnations, which is a major challenge. The whole purpose is for Chris LeDoux to take them and throw them away. But that's show business."

Scoop really dreads to hear Chris do the song, "Copenhagen." But the crowd loves it.

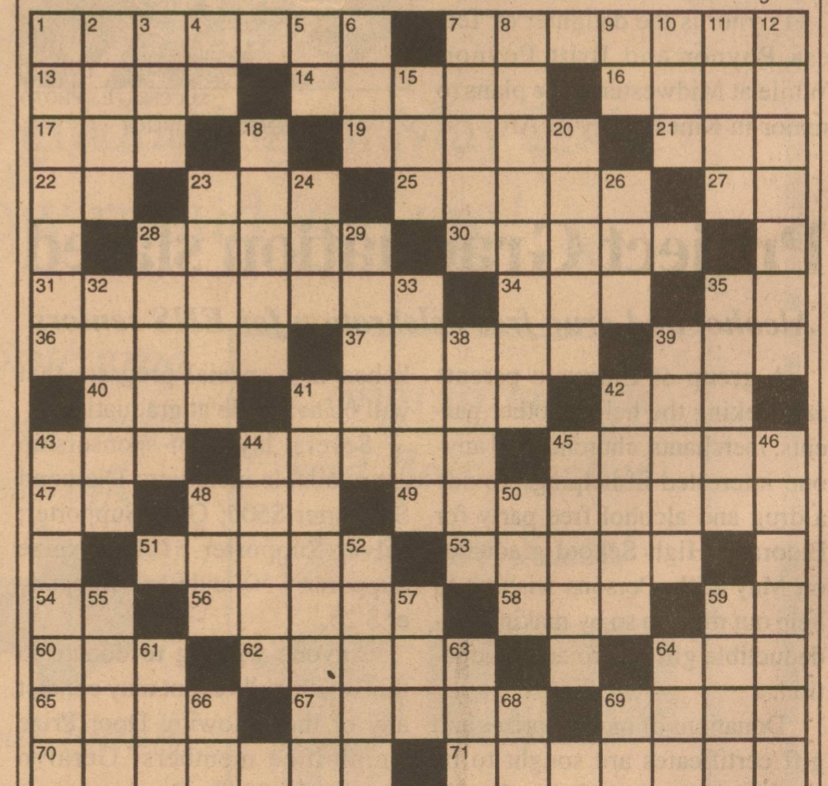
"On the first note of that song, you'll see fifty Copenhagen cans come flying through the air. Chris never seems to get hit, but all the other poor guys on stage do. You've got Copenhagen cans bouncing off guitars and drums and the musicians' foreheads. On a few shows we've actually had to string up a net to catch the stuff to protect the performers."

Scoop works with country groups. He says they're more family-oriented. "I took the pledge. I swore off doing rap shows just because the music is too strange. I guess maybe I'm too old to get the purpose of it. I can't understand the lyrics and when I do, I really don't want to know those lyrics. It's a different world and I'm sure they have a message. I just haven't figured it out. Besides that, I just got tired of getting shot at."

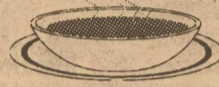

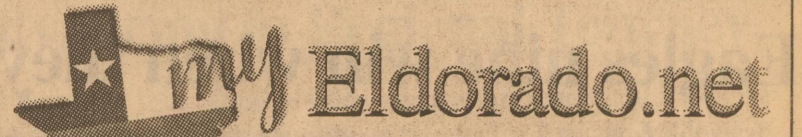

Mayor's Reply

Dear Stephen:

Thank you, for your letter and your interest in our town. I think your stationary bicycle tour is a wonderful idea and I applaud your teacher for using such an imaginative approach to familiarize you with the geography of our great nation.

As you know, Stephen, Eldorado is the county seat of Schleicher County, Texas. The town was established in 1895 on the Edwards Plateau after innovations in windmill technology made it possible to pump water from the vast Edwards-Trinity Aquifer, some 400 feet below the surface. This was particularly important since there are no rivers or lakes in the area.

You asked what our fifth grade students do for fun. I am forwarding a copy of your letter to Eldorado Middle School in hopes that some of those students may write to you with details about their lives.

Stephen, our courthouse is almost eighty years old and was built of native limestone. Eldorado has other historic landmarks including the old First National Bank building, built in 1907, and the Eldorado Woolen Mill, constructed in 1940. Interestingly, our mill supplied the majority of woolen army blankets used by American troops in World War II. It was the first full-process woolen mill west of the Mississippi River and remains today as the only operational woolen mill in the southwest United States.

As you may have guessed from the fact that we are home to a woolen mill, Eldorado lies in the heart of Texas sheep and goat raising country. There is also a lot of oil and gas produced in the area.

Stephen, I'm sorry that our trip through Eldorado was imaginary since, at the very time you were pedaling the stationary bike, the countryside around town was adorned with wildflowers, particularly Texas Bluebonnets. The bluebonnet is the Texas State Flower and this year the crop of flowers has been breathtakingly beautiful. I am enclosing a color photo of the bluebonnets that was taken only a few miles from Eldorado.

To answer your question, yes, Eldorado is named after the mythical City of Gold. While there are several theories as to why the name was chosen, no one can be certain. We do know that there was an attempt to name the town Wallick. However, the name was rejected by the Post Office since there was already a town in Texas with that name. Regardless, we are all very happy that the name Eldorado was the one that was picked.

I have served as Eldorado's mayor for 10 years. In that time, I have responded to hundreds of letters about a myriad of subjects. But, none of those letters was nearly as much fun to answer as yours. You see, I'm always happy to tell people about Eldorado and I am particularly glad you wrote.

Stephen, be sure to stop by City Hall if you ever pass this way. I would be delighted to show you around town.

into force on April 14th. She noted that many of the rules have already been implemented locally and that the district will have two years to come into complete compliance. As part of the new rules, the hospital must develop a method of storing records off-site, while still maintaining confidentiality and privacy standards. She said a method of encrypting computer data is also required in the rules.

The date for the hospital's annual barbecue had been tentatively set for June 30, however a conflict with the yearly meeting of the Mias Amigas Club prompted the

board to ask that another date be chosen. The trustees will give final approval to the date at their next meeting on May 21. The board also discussed scheduling an annual Strategic Planning meeting.

Under new business on the agenda, the board reappointed Dr. Gordy Day to the hospital's medical staff. They also approved the purchase of an oxygen concentrator and approved payment for decorating services in the Schleicher County Family Clinic. The trustees also okayed the purchase of a riding lawn mower, which had been previously authorized in the budget.

The board then voted to amend the district's bylaws to allow for the payment of recurring expenses in a timely manner in an effort to avoid late charges. They also amended the section that required two signatures on hospital district checks. Now, checks exceeding \$1,500.00 will require two signatures, with at least one of those signatures being from a member of the board of trustees.

There being no further business the meeting adjourned at 10:35 p.m.
