What can you do to protect your family from this illness? first responsibility lies in the way you handle food as it comes from the grocery store.

Poultry is a common source of salmonella infection; yet by taking routine precautions, the homemaker can protect her family. Poultry can be stored one or two days before using in the coldest part of the refrigerator. The cardboard tray and transparent wrapping should be removed, the giblets should be separated from the cavity, and both should be wrapped loosely to allow for circulation of

For longer storage poultry should be frozen.

Thawing should be done so that the temperature of poultry stays as low as possible to prevent the Bacterial growth of bacteria. growth increases rapidly at temperatures of 40 degrees F. and above, Miss Massey advised.

Thaw in the refrigerator (2 to 3 days for an 18 pound turkey) or in a paper bag at room temperature. The temperature inside the bag is slightly warmer thas the refrigerator, and large turkeys will thaw in about 16 hours.

If thawed at room temperature, the outside is exposed to a high temperature for a long period of time while the inside remains frozen. Poultry can be thawed pantially in the refrigerator and completed by immersing it (in a watertight plastic bag) in cold water.

Commercially frozen stuffed poultry should not be thawed before cooking.

The care of utensils is important when working with poultry. The cutting board, knives, sponges dish cloth and cabinet top should be washed in hot, soapy water.

After cooking, poultry should be refrigerated as soon as possible with any stuffing removed. Keeping cooked turkey (or roast) in the oven or on back of the range between dinner and supper is a dangerous practice.

The first 30 minutes of cooling time is approximately the same in and out of the refrigerator; after that refrigerated food cools much

Bacteria growth will take place much faster at room temperature. These precautions apply whether preparing for Christmas turkey, fried chicken any day or the chicken barbecued outside in the summer. Follow these good habits of personal hygiene and eliminate food borne illness in your family.

Combine ingredients. Pour into pastry lined 9-inch pie pan. Moisten edges of bottom crust. Roll pastry for top crust. Cut out six Christmas designs in top pie crust and remove designs. These could be bells, stars, little trees or such. Space cuttings so that each piece of pie will have a cut out. Place he top crust carefully on fruit filled pie; flute edges. Bake at 450 F. for 15 minutes; reduce heat to 325 F. and bake 20 minutes longer. Serves 6.

All fruit pies freeze very well in the unbaked stage. The thawing and baging process then becomes the same thing.

Make a half dozen this week, put them in the freezer and face the holidays with a great big smile.

The beauty of a fire in the fireplace during the upcoming Holiday Season, can be made even as wood. prettier with the addition of multicolored flames.

Chemical treatment of the mat erial to be burned can result in green, red, blue, orange or purple flames instead of the usual yellow flame from wood.

Calcium chloride can be used to produce orange colored flames, copper chloride, blue; potassium chloride, purple; strontium nitrate, red; lithium chloride, carmine; and copper sulphate, emerald green. Dry pine cones, small chips or blocks of wood can be soaked in these chemicals for multi-colored flames. Most of the chemicals can be purchased from chemical suppliers or drugstores.

To treat the cones or wood, a plastic pail and an onion sack are needed. The cones or chips are placed in the sack and immersed in a solution containing one pound of chemical dissolved thoroughly in one gallon of water. The bag must be weighted so that all of the material is completely covered and the cones and wood should soak for at least 10 minutes.

After soaking, place the treated material on newspapers to dry and then they will be ready to brighten the holiday fireplace.

> These steps are for preparing a motor for winter storage. Clean the air cleaner and fill the oil cup to the proper level with new oil. Change the oil and filter; then idle the engine for a few minutes. Drain the engine block and radia tor or add permanent anti-freeze to protect them. If the motor in drained, the radiator cap and drain plugs should be left open to let moisture fro mcondensation drain. Better tag the machine with a sign, "Don't use—cooling system drained."

> Drain the fuel system to prevent buildup of gum and residue. Flush diesel tanks with a diesel flushing oil and white kerosene. All fuel tanks except LP gas should be left empty during storage. Remove the spark plugs and put two tablespoons of oil into each cylinder. Crank the engine several revolutions to coat the combustion chambers with oil. Clean and replace the plugs.

> Seal the exhaust, air cleaner intake and crankcase breather to prevent the entrance of moisture, dust or other foreign matter. If the notor has a clutch, depress the pelal and fasten it to keep the clutch plate from sticking to the flywheel. Store the battery in a cool, dry palce, where it will not freeze. Take the weight off tires and release the tension on belts.

VELVET CRUMB CAKE 11/3. cups Bisquick 34 cup brown sugar (packed) 1/4 teaspoon baking soda 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon 1/4 teaspoon cloves 1/4 teaspoon allspice 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg

1 egg ½ cup unsweetened apple-sauce 1 teaspoon vanilla 1/3 cup milk

3 tablespoons shortening

Topping (below) Heat oven to 350°. Grease and flour square pan, 8x8x2 inches. In large mixer bowl, stir together dry ingredients. Add shortening, egg, applesauce and vanilla. Beat on low speed 1/2 minute, scraping side and bottom of bowl frequently. Beat 1 minute on medium speed. Stir in milk gradually.

1 cup sugar

Combine cranberries, apples and water; cook until fruit is soft. Put through a colander or strainer; stir in sugar and cook until sugar is dissolved. If desired, sprinkle with grated orange peel.






