

'George M' To Be State Fair Musical

"George M"—the new musical about that famous Yankee Doodle dandy, the beloved American showman, George M. Cohan—will be the 1969 State Fair of Texas Show at the Music Hall.

"George M!" will play Oct. 3-19. Joel Gray, who took the title role in the Broadway production, will head the touring company.

The score of "George M!" was adapted from the familiar songs penned by Cohan himself: I'm a Yankee Doodle Dandy, Over There, Mary (Is a Grand Old Name), Give My Regards to Broadway, and You're a Grand Old Flag.

George M. Cohan (1878-1942) was one of the leading figures in popular music and the American musical theater in the early 20th century. He was a song-and-dance man, actor, producer, and composer.

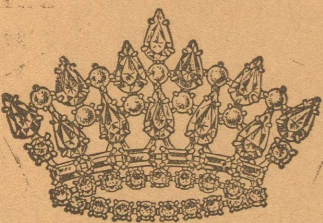

Oh yes, one other argument advanced is that there is a possibility of a cut in the Federal surtax and a more favorable "view" of Federal-State revenue sharing by the Federal Government. In my opinion, there is about as much chance for this to happen as there is for the lion to lie down with the lamb. —Hilary B. Doran, Jr.

During the business session the club voted to make a contribution of \$50.00 to the hospital.

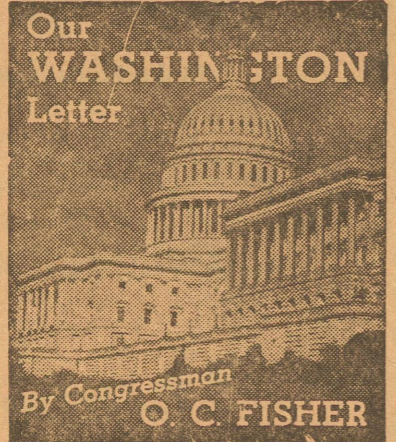
Mrs. Jess Koy was introduced as a new member.

Should we or should we not deploy anti-ballistic missiles, designed to intercept and destroy nuclear-laden hostile missiles?

President Nixon has called for such deployment, known as Safeguard, initially limited to protection of our great Minutemen long range missile sites, at a cost of some five or six billion dollars. I support the President's recommendation.

Actually, the ABM proposal is nothing new. During some 15 years we have spent \$3-billion on research and development in an effort to perfect a weapon which with sophisticated radar and advanced electronic devices would be capable of such interceptions.

Obviously, only the experts are qualified to decide the justification for such deployment. Our most respected experts assure us such interception is in fact feasible, and while by no means 100% successful, many enemy missiles could be destroyed. Repeated tests have demonstrated this fact.

The Russians are now deploying their third generation ABM, and are sparing no expense in further research and development. Can we afford to do less? In addition, it is now known the Soviets are pushing a 25-megaton long range missile, which experts insist would lend itself primarily to the sole mission of hopefully knocking out our missile sites and our capacity to retaliate following a first strike—if one should come.

It would seem, therefore, that we can ill afford to relax, sit back and in this respect becoming a second rate power, while the Soviets—and later the Chinese—might succeed in developing an effective defense against our missile striking capability.

Wouldn't it be better to have it and not need it than to need it and not have it?

Late Blooming Beauties

Some flowers that are planted in the spring often won't show their first bloom until summer. But they are usually blooms worth the wait. For instance, tubers, such as the Belgian Begonia, blossom all summer long, instead of blooming and dying in a matter of days. And begonias not only make beautiful additions to home gardens, they also comprise one of the largest groups of indoor plants. One of the most popular in the wide variety of begonias are the Camellia-flowered, a group that has been developed over the years by dedicated hybridizers in Belgium. This unusually beautiful tuber has breath-taking camellia-shaped flowers that often grow to ten inches in diameter.

When growing these tubers indoors, they should be started in small 2 1/2 inch clay pots, with a rich soil mixture. Plants should be transplanted only when their roots have filled the pot, and then always into the next larger pot. When a begonia is over-potted it can easily become water-logged.

Most of the flowering begonias need a minimum of three or four hours sunlight but no sunrays; for increased bloom and stronger plants, the camellia-flowered variety should receive added artificial light. And, to keep begonias flourishing, fertilizing is important. This is especially so during active growing periods when the plants have reached large size.

The home grower can also transplant his begonias outdoors when the sprouts are two or three inches high—but only after the last frost. And when planting outdoors it's important to consider the position of the beds and the soil. Begonias like lots of sunlight—but never direct sunrays and loose soil with coarse sand for maximum drainage. If the soil is too heavy, loosen it with sand and peat moss.

Outdoors or indoors this hearty flower needs a minimum of care. And what care you do give them is certainly small compensation for their months of glorious bloom.

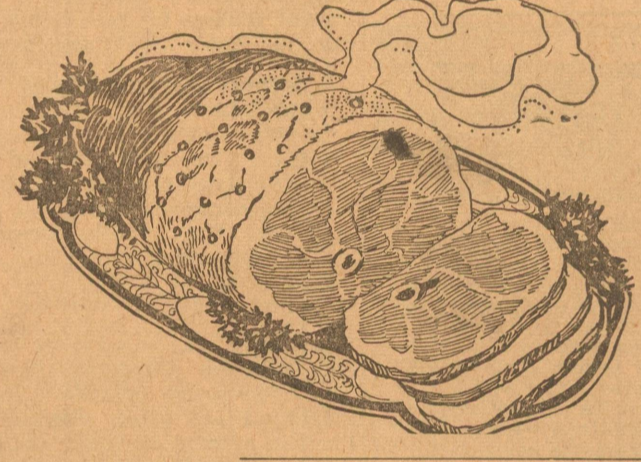
