



and equine influenza. The veterinarian can also give advice on which vaccines to use and when and how often. Of primary importance is the time of the year and the repeat or follow-up of necessary injections to make the immunization program successful.

In the case of encephalomylitis, it is the common practice to wait until a case has been reported in the area before vaccinating. But this is an unwise practice because the first case could be your horse.

Two injections of tetanus toxoid, given 4 to 8 weeks apart, will protect your horse for approximately one year from a disease that is usually fatal. Infection can come from the horse stepping on a nail, receiving a puncture wound or lacration which may go unnoticed until the animal has a case tetanus. An annual booster shot

will maintain the animal's immun-

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


When growing these tubers indoors, they should be started in small 2¹/₂ inch clay pots, with a rich soil mixture. Plants should be transplanted only when their roots have filled the pot, and then always into the next larger pot. When a begonia is overpotted it can easily become water-logged. Most of the flowering bego-

nias need a minimum of three or four hours sunlight but no sunrays; for increased bloom and stronger plants, the camellia-flowered variety should re-ceive added artificial light. And to keep begonias flourishing, fertilizing is important. This is especially so during active | of glorious bloom.



Succulent Salmon Poached in Beer

It's almost uncanny the way two cooks can begin with the same basic ingredients, and end up with such different results. Part of the explanation, of course, can be a difference in skill or experience. But far more often it's a matter of attitude. The successful cook is more adventurous about seasonings, and realizes that small changes can have a startling effect on flavor.

A perfect example is the poaching of fish. Fish has an unusual capacity to pick up flavors from its "surroundings"; whether it does or not depends on the character of the cooking liquid, and that's where imagination comes in. In the hands of a clever cook, poaching can work very nearly a miracle.

One cue any cook can profitably pick up is the use of beer as a poaching liquid for fish. It's a trick that comes well recommended-chefs have been relying on it for years. Take salmon steaks, for example. Poaching salmon in beer gives a subtly different taste which truly flatters this lovely, pink-fleshed delicacy. With this truly spring-like meal, no beverage is quite as compatible as cold, sparkling beer.

BEER POACHED SALMON

- 4 fresh or frozen salmon steaks
- 1 tablespoon whole pickling spice
- 1 (12 oz.) can or bottle beer
- 1 lemon, sliced
- 1 large onion, sliced
- Salt


Defrost salmon if frozen. Arrange salmon steaks in single layer in a large skillet. Add pickling spice and enough beer to half cover the salmon. Place lemon and onion slices on top of salmon. Sprinkle with salt. Cover tightly. Bring to a boil, lower heat and simmer gently until fish flakes, about 15-20 minutes. Remove steaks with a slotted spatula and place on a warm serving platter. Spoon hot Soubise Sauce over steaks.



- 3 tablespoons butter or margarine 1 pound onions, finely chopped 3 tablespoons flour 3/4 cup milk

Melt butter; add onions and saute over low heat, stirring occasionally, until onions are very tender and mushy. Press butter and onions through a sieve or whirl in a blender. Return puree to pan and stir in flour. Gradually stir in milk and cream. Cook over low heat, stirring constantly, until smooth and thick. Season to taste with salt and white pepper. Yield: About 2 cups.




Penny Pennington checks line-up of posts at Roping Arena

Austin, Tex.—After a slow Monday to Wednesday, legislators wound up last week in a blaze of speed, turning out more than 100 bills on a climactic Thursday.

Senate passage of a much-amended \$1.25 an hour minimum wage bill, with a push from Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes, highlighted the action. Bill survived Senate filibusters. Now it goes to the House where Speaker Gus Mutscher reports its fate will be decided in a floor battle.

Also triumphant over filibusters was the bill to set up Texas State Screwworm Cases Few Technical Institute under a separate governing board with authority to operate facilities in Waco, Harlingen and Amarillo areas. It now is known as James Connally Technical Institute and is under the Texas A&M University Sys-tem. Only those courses which area unior collges can't or won't offer could be taught in this job preparation field. Bill goes to Gov. Preston Smith for signature.



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

Home Demonstration Agent's Column By MRS. VIDA KREKLOW

Along about this time ever Spring I look at the calendar and see the days begin to be squeezed together and then I try to figure how we can beat the time game.

The time game is hard to play; it doesn't make any difference whether it is daylight saving or day. light losing, it is how much we get done that makes the score. If I feel the push then I just wonder what the mothers of the graduates and brides must feel.

Regardless of the calendar, cook ing and eating must go on in every home. I am firmly convinced that 30 minutes of thinking and planning is worth hours of frantic activity. The saying of "work smarter not harder" applies here, at least to see what you can do to improve your situation.

Plan ways to make your freezer work for you. I use the 1-2-3 system; I prepare three casseroles. freeze two and eat one. It isn't much more trouble, just takes a bigger mixing bowl is about all. The same oven heat will do three meat loaves, three casseroles, or three pans of baked beans. Two roasts cost no more than one roast twice. Fire up the grill and barbe cue 4 chickens at once. Chicken is still the cheapest and best meat. Don't just make cookies, make a lot of cookies. And don't make dropped or rolled cookies, make the kind which can be baked in a sheet and cut while warm.

Make sauerkraut salad instead of potato salad. Kraut doesn't have to be cooked and peeled. Besides that kraut salad can be kept for a week without any fear of spoilage If you like kraut salad it is very good-of course if nobody in the house will eat it, then don't bother, but make macaroni salad instead. Recipes for both follow in case you don't have them handy.

German Sauerkraut Salad

- 1 cup sugar
- 1/2 cup vinegar 1 no. 21/2 can kraut, drained
- 1/2 cup chopped green pepper 1/2 cup chopped onion cup thinly sliced celery
- 2 tablespoons pimentos 1 teaspoon dill seed
- 1/4 cup salad oil.
